To get "Something for Nothing"

The railroads have received 44 "rules" demands from the leaders of the operating unions... representing engineers, firemen, conductors, trainmen and switchmen. They say they are seeking only changes in working conditions—NOT a wage increase.

More Money For Less Work
But what kind of rules are being asked for? Twenty-eight of them would compel railroads to pay more money for the same, or less work; 7 would require additional and unnecessary men to do the same work; the rest would bring about changes in operating practices at increased cost.

For Instance:
The Union leaders demand additional train and engine crews on Diesel-powered trains - one for crew for every power unit on a locomotive. A freight train hauled by a 4-unit Diesel would have to carry 4 engineers, 4 firemen, 4 conductors, and at least 8 brakemen, or a total of 20 men instead of 5.

"Made Work"—Sheer Waste
The Union leaders demand that full-length freight trains be cut to about half their length, even though such trains are most efficient for low-cost service to you. This rule would call for twice as many locomotives, would double the number of trains, and make accidents more likely.
Additional equipment, yards, and other facilities required to take care of these short trains would cost hundreds of millions. What the Union leaders really want is to make more jobs.
The Union leaders demand that when a crew in one class of service perform incidental service of another class, they will be paid not less than a day's pay for each class, even though all service is performed as a part of the same day's work. The crew would get at least two days' pay for one day's work.
The Union leaders demand that the present basic day for passenger conductors and trainmen be reduced from 150 to 100 miles, which would have the effect of increasing their pay 50%. Such a run often takes only two or three hours!

You Can't Afford This Waste
Demands like these are against the interests of the whole American people, who depend on railroad service for nearly everything they eat, wear and use.
These rules would cost a BILLION DOLLARS annually—a gigantic waste which neither the railroads nor the country can afford.
Railroad workers are good citizens and good employees, with pride in their calling. Their record during the war was outstanding. We do not believe they fully understand the "feathered" rules which the Union leaders are demanding. We do not believe they understand the harmful results which these rules would have to the railroad industry, to the millions of men and women dependent on railroads for their livelihood, and to the shipping and consuming public.
The great strength of America is in production—an honest day's work for an honest day's pay.
For only through greater production can we hope to stop the steady upward surge of living costs.
Surely, if ever there was a time in our history when we needed to work, not waste, this is it.

ceived from his white Leghorn flock. Many farmers were impressed by the well arranged, and well kept farmstead of Arthur Brown, where they saw bluegrass, Alfalfa, Ky. 31, fescue and sweet clover.

After lunching at Brodhead the tour was halted at the A. M. Hiatt farm, where Mr. Hiatt gave an explanation of the soil treatments used on his hybrid corn, tobacco, alfalfa and Ky. 31 fescue. Oscar Saylor showed the farmers 13 pigs which are competing in the State-Litter Litter contest. Wesley Lambert, a Future Farmer, showed his Brown Swiss bull and heifers, and 5 acres of corn that has been entered in the Ky. Corn

On the neat farm of W. A. Richmond, a storage cellar, forestry project and corn entered in the Ky. Derby were shown the farmers. Mr. Richmond raised 112.6 bushel of corn per acre last year.

Mrs. John Payne and daughters, Sue and Betty, refreshed the group with lemonade and cookies, before showing what R.E.A. electricity, a water system and planned arrangements can mean to a farm home. Stephen Bullen a Future Farmer who is working toward the State Farm Degree showed his beef cattle, hogs, Derby corn, palmetto filly and pasture improvement program. At the close of the tour on the farms of Willie Bullen and W. S. Stewart, the farmers saw the tobacco. Purebred beef cattle and hogs, and what can be done toward pasture development.

Tomato Blight
Tomato Blight has been the main issue for tomato growers for the last two or three weeks. The blight continues to get worse. This weather is ideal for it. After the blight starts on tomatoes it is hard to control. Tomatoes should be sprayed before the blight hits the crop and kept every week in rainy weather and in dry weather the crop should be sprayed every ten days or two weeks.

The best thing we can do now, after the blight has hit our crop, is to spray with Bordeaux mixture which is made from Bluestone, Hydrated lime and water.

stone in about a quart of water. Use a fruit or milk bottle to dissolve the bluestone, since it "eats" metal. Then dissolve 4 ounces of hydrated lime in a quart of water. Mix these two mixtures together in the spray pump and add 3 gallons of water. This will give you 3 gallons of Bordeaux mixture.

Spray the tomatoes from top to bottom on top and under side of the leaves. Spray once a week if it rains. If dry spray every 10 days to two weeks.

Poultry Pointers For July
How about those pullets, are they getting all of the feed they can eat, are they on ground that has not been used by old hens, have they been vaccinated? Your answer to these questions may determine the egg production this fall when

Pullets should have been vaccinated for chicken pox earlier, but you still have time to vaccinate. They should be vaccinated ready for the laying house on September 1st.

It is never too late to improve our management practices, so if your pullets are not on good pasture, move them to one as soon as possible. One or more feeders is a good investment and a water barrel is an almost-essential piece of equipment. Your pullets are not growing as they should unless water is available at all times. Pullets require much water during the growing season and unless adequate provision is made for at least a days supply, many times the pullets will be without water.

Remember we want our pullets in the laying house by September 1 and if they are not growing as they should, they must be given good attention now and through August 1.

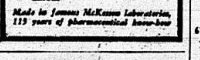

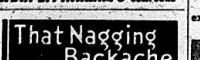

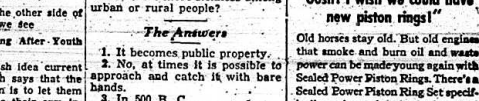
