Dressmaking Tricks Remove Traces of Last Year's Styles

IF YOUR clothes are snappy and well fitting, if you keep well groomed and dress becomingly to suit your type, most people won't know whether you're wearing this year's dress or last year's.

That, at least, is the consensus of clothes and beauty editors. If you know that attractive on you, you clothes that is what people notice more than high style, or the last word in fashion.

One of the newest things that has come about this season is the longer hemline, and hems will require adjusting so they look fashionable. But most of you find that hems in many cases can be let out the necessary inch or two for the new hemline.

Before we get deep into the subject of alterations, let's consider what clothing should be altered, for there are basic features for such a project.

Make certain the original fabric is good enough to warrant and survive the change. If the dress is worn thin under the arms and in the skirt, there's no point in waiting the time required for restyling.

Work with a color that's becoming to you; otherwise consider dyeing. Some styles are not adapted to change. This is true of very extreme clothes, and if there is only a limited amount of fabric, or if the actual style of the complete dress, is worn thin under the arms and in the skirt, there's no point in waiting the time required for restyling.

When you do make changes in the actual style of the complete dress, be smart and use a regular pattern. When you choose a pattern, though, be sure to mind the lines of the original garment.

The parts you recut should be ripped and pressed flat, then folded as new fabric. If you choose a contrasting color or print to add to the original dress.

Never discard clothing until... have something that is suitable and becoming. It's hard to match the weave, so it's usually best to choose a plain contrast.

How to Alter Your Hems Take the old hem out carefully, being careful not to cut the fabric or to pull a thread. This may be done by pulling a thread or cutting the threads with a small pair of scissors or a razor blade, but this requires care.

Press the crease mark from the old hem carefully by laying a damp cloth over the markings and pressing with an iron. Repeat this procedure until the crease disappears completely. If the material on the outside has faded and does not match that part which was folded under, the dress will probably have to be dyed.

If there is enough of the original material to be turned under for a matching top, if the skirt is full draped or flared—you'll need only a narrow tape.

Adjust the Waistline If Too Large of Low If the waistline of a dress is too low, put it on and mark the waistline where it fits best and looker best. This is best marked with pins, then basted when the dress is taken apart.

COURTHOUSE LEE: Heat Was On

The heat was on, but good, for Lt. Col. John C. H. Lee, commander of the 1st Cavalry Division at Leghorn, Italy.

In a series of articles, Robert C. Ruark, Scripps-Hawley correspondent, sharply criticized Lee.

Lee's complaint was linked with the justice department's newly announced investigation of food, clothing and shelter prices in that the department may seek anti-trust actions against Lee because of its importance in construction costs.

MIETARY OIL: Alarm Modified

Alarm military, which over the possibility that armed forces use of petroleum products would have to be sharply curtailed this year has been considerably modified by assurances from the industry that military and naval requirements will be given priority over civilian requirements.

Whether or not this prospective action will leave the civilian motorist high and dry is still a moot point.

Immediate result is that the program which the government was planning to send to the industry regarding fulfillment of the military and naval needs has been modified because of voluntary industry cooperation.

Drastic government action still remains a possibility, however, if the petroleum industry's promises are not fulfilled or if supplies were further curtailed to meet military and naval demands.

The government's official point of view was that fuel oil and aviation gasoline requirements for defense purposes would be met regardless of how the domestic economy is affected.

HOLIDAY: Labor Protest

Ten million workers will register en masse their protest against the 1947-Harley labor law by taking a work holiday on election day, William Green, American Federation of Labor president, has announced.

Outlining the most intensive program of political action in the history of the AFL, Green said the work holiday will be taken as a protest against the new election day law.

He predicted defeat for most of the anti-labor proposals which he had never seen America's workers "so aroused."

Branching out from domestic waters, Green described labor as being apprehensive about world peace negotiations and U. S. foreign relations. He foresaw a United Nations report on the Big Four veto power unless Russia changes its own consistently negative stand.

PRICE WAR: First Attack

First blow in the government's avowed fight against rising prices was a blow leveled at the nation's huge, tough steel industry.

Nature of the action followed a previously announced pattern. The federal trade commission charged the steelmakers with conspiring to fix prices and to rig the market.

The FTC charged that by "destroying price competition" steel producers are able to "dominate and manipulate the market" and which their unorganized customers and consumers must buy.

No immediate comment was forthcoming from the industry which had already gone on record as inviting investigation of its price.

Population Gains Nine Million Since 1940

Marking an approximate gain of 9.1 million in the seven years since 1940, population of the U. S. has increased to 141,228,093, on the basis of a recent census bureau estimate.

Washington Digest Government Runs Unique Breeding Farm in Vermont

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Some time ago the world was startled to learn from Pravda, the official communist party newspaper in Moscow, that it was a Russian who discovered "wireless" (as radio was called in its youth), and as if that weren't enough, it was announced later by the same authority that the electric light, which poor Thomas Edison certainly thought he had something to do with, was likewise a Russian invention.

If I ever read, as some day I shall, that ice-cream sodas and hot-dogs were first discovered on a pleasant afternoon by some mysterious Muscovite as he strolled on the back steps, I shall announce that hot-bath and vodka are American products and that the Volga basin were simply a protogal local of the CIO maritime union.

Meanwhile, however, I am reminded by the department of agriculture that one thing which is as American as apple pie is a horse, and which no foreigner had better try to appropriate as a home-grown product before the return of the good old-fashioned dress. Justin Morgan is immortalized in bronze in the town of Middlebury, Vermont, where you can see him today standing on his pedestal before the entrance to the stable of the United States Morgan horse farm, which covers about a square mile of rolling, wooded country two miles north of Middlebury, Vt.

The original farm of 400 acres was presented to the United States department of agriculture by Joseph Battell, Colonel Battell had long been an admirer and breeder of Morgan horses, and had founded the American Morgan register. The farm was established in 1907.

The area was increased by an additional gift of about 35 acres by Colonel Battell in 1908, and by purchase of about 500 acres from Middlebury College in 1917. The land, underlain by limestone, is well adapted to the production of horses.

In the selection of foundation breeding stock, and in planning subsequent matings, emphasis was placed on the quality and ability to perform the three gait, walk, trot and canter. These points continue to be emphasized. Every effort has been made to preserve adequate matings and to produce desirable temperaments.

The sturdy stables, original of the farm, were designed for the best of a single schoolmaster, and in 1922, he (I mean the stallion) had a romantic career and he is the progenitor of the breed, which is the department of agriculture says, is one of the few breeds of horses developed in the United States. Justin was a "real active animal of great power and endurance, with the top usually about forty-five hours under test.

According to the official description of the breeding program, the calls for "the measurement of each youngster at one year of age, at two years, and at three years. All are trained under saddle and in harness and are put through controlled performance and endurance trials from about three years old. The data thus obtained are the permanent records of the individuals. They are used also in studies of the heredity of the breed and as criteria for formulation of the breeder's breeding program. For the tests of three-year olds the department has employed a special method of specific trials to measure the walking and trotting gaits and the horses' endurance in harness and under the saddle."

Always versatile, the Morgan was as a chopper when he went to the meeting house on Sunday to pull the survey with the fringe on the top as it was weekdays when it could drag a load of sawmill timber, or take a team of his big brothers to budge. And when bugles still used, you'd often find a Morgan between the stables and in the use on the trail, too, for his forte these days seems to be under the saddle.

The Morgan horses have found homes far from the shadow of their native Green Mountains and today the breed is being increased more rapidly in California than anywhere in the East. I regret to say that on my last trip to Vermont this summer, though Mount Mansfield looked up at the heavens with the same stern profile that it did "when I first panted, paddled to its top, the maple sugar tasted as good (though it cost too much), the mist still held the peak of Killington as gently as ever the wind buffeted its fingers. But I took the quick tattoo of those small strong hooves on the hard high-grooved, blue-hooped of an archer bent against the sky above a mountain pasture.

I'm glad that Uncle Sam is doing his part in the breeding program, to perpetuate the breed that is "just like us," as Joel said.

WATCH THAT SURPLUS!

The President's announcement of a \$4,700,000,000 surplus for the current fiscal year has reopened all argument over tax cuts. Republicans are saying that the President's figure only goes to prove that taxes could and should have been cut. The Democrats say that the surplus — if not absorbed by unexpected expenditures — should be used for debt reduction.

There is also lively disagreement over how much a Republican Congress reduced a Democratic President's budget. Mr. Truman estimates that congress cut \$1,578,000,000. The Republican chairman of the House and Senate appropriations committees say they sliced off \$4,479,000,000. Impartial observers have pointed out that this figure counts as savings several big items where expenditures are authorized but the actual appropriations postponed.

The public will be well advised not to take too much stock in any of the figures being batted back and forth by partisans. The fact is that they are all well made estimates. Nobody knows either what expenditures or revenues will be ten months hence when the fiscal year ends. Mr. Truman is \$4,500,000,000 higher today than he was in January. A further boom in business might push revenues still higher. But a recession would cut them sharply.

Moreover, the reductions by Congress may have to be reduced. Aside from supplemental appropriations, there is as the President pointed out, the possibility that the Marshall Plan will cost several billion before the year expires. So — it may be well for the taxpayers to keep an eye on that surplus. If they cannot count on an early tax cut, they can at least watch more carefully where the money goes and applaud more vigorously when money is genuinely saved.
