



PLAYING WITH DYNAMITE

The attitude of a great many people toward the pro-blem of inflation is not helpful. They dodge the facts involved. Most people cannot build homes. Their ability to buy many of the better foods is diminishing. Basic manufacturing industries are confronted with costs which every businessman knows threaten to shove prices to the point of crippling mass production. The distribution industry, also dependent upon high volume movement of goods, is up against a similar situation. Intelligent farmers are aware that disaster is the inevitable consequence of endlessly rishats will admit, privately if not publicly, that a race between wages and prices, if continued long enough, will

make paupers of American workmen. Tragic is the attitude of many of our public officials who, while waging a political sham battle against inflation, are fully aware that the solvency of the Federal govern-ment and the integrity of the dollar itself are at stake. All of us from the President down are observing the result of inflation and depreciated money, in country after country. from China to England. Desperate people in such countries have submitted to ruthless dictatorships which are destroying their liberties. They are losing spiritual and moral values in a futile scramble for a false security, the like of which the world has never seen.

It is almost unbelievable that in the face of this situation, leading citizens, in and out of public life in the United States, can for a moment play politics with inflation, or utter a single word which they do not believe to be based upon sound reasoning-yet it is being done daily.

AUTUMN MIRAGE

... Spring we may welcome more heartily. Autumn we are the more loathe to let go. The days, shortened by early twilight, become yet more precious, as do most things when demand begins to exceed supply .. ;

Over our autumns impends always that feeling of imminent departure. Autumn is like a short sojourn in some far and lovely land. From every peak we climb, from everytower of momentary delight, from every window looking on the year's sunset-we can see in the darkening harbor the shadow of a great ship. It is a vessel built for long and arduous traveling through work-a-day oceans back to a work-a-day world.

. No other season builds this strange mirage. Winter, spring, summer, lead each to the very doorstep of the other.

Only from the edge of autumn, standing on gold with deep purple overhead, do we look out as if on unchartered distances. Only here are we touched with the feeling that, come autumn through a long procession of years, we may not theet this moment again, or ever find this one exquisite

HOT AIR DID NOT WORK

Our present inflation is deeply rooted in events of the past 15 years. It began with the idea that modern gover ments do not need balanced budgets, that expanding public debt is beneficial. It began with the development of the philosophy that the public treasury be pledged to forever abolish the responsibility of the individual to provide for himself. It has simply moved faster since the war which saw the public debt jump to nearly three-hundred-billion dollars. It will not end until every community and every individual finally comes to realize that government, even the immensely powerful U.S. government, must learn to spend less than it takes from the people in taxes.

If the government is going to start blaming various groups of private citizens for the inflation which was largely brought on by its own actions, why not start with the labor unions? Or better yet, why not start with an 'educational program to show people that when congressmen. are patted on the back for securing unnecessary appropriations for hometown activities, the ground is being prepared for still higher prices to come.

No, inflation of the kind we have in America today is not a superficial ailment, and it cannot be corrected by superficial treatment.

. . . BUSINESS FOR ALL

There is always a good deal of talk concerning the relative virtues of "big business" and "small business." One important and frequently overlooked aspect is that small business is often the training for big business executivesand that, conversely, training received in big business often enables a man to start a small business and make a go of it.

This is particularly well illustrated in retail merchandizing. The "big businessmen" in retailing were almost all 'little businessmen" in the past. The major chain systems all developed from small stores. And the largest department stores, for the most part, were once little outlets run by one or two people.

Again, many-men and women have gone to work for large retail stores in minor capacities, have gained the desired experience, and then have opened their own stores and prospered. Of late, a legion of veterans have been learning in this fashion, and it is to the credit of the retail industry that established chains and independents willingly provided a training ground for men who will be their con petitors in the future.

America has been a country where small business to move with the times gradually becomes small and eventually goes out of business altogether.
