Specialists Debunk Food Superstitions. Elle and Forget Old Notions, Scientists Advise.

CHICAGO - Thanks to the debunking by scientists of age-old food superstitions, we now are getting fearlessly into mixtures of cucumbers and milk, or lobster and ice cream, and other choices which do not solely because we do not want it, not because of its effect on our brainpower.

Also relegated to the file-and-forget bracket are the food fictions: Carrots cur hair; spinach builds muscle (sorry, Popeye); onion soup lengthens life; too much cheese, cream and butter produce deafness. It was a futile gesture for the man who ate a sandwich with bread and coffee because he didn't want to fatten his fiancée's tape-worm. A tape-worm, food specialists declare, really eats very little and causes no symptoms at all.

Most recent food prejudices to come under scientific demolition are of agriculture scientists are those concerning food kept in open cans. Their verdict: "It is just as safe to keep food in the can if it comes in - if the food is kept cool and covered - as it is to empty the food into another container."

"A few acid foods may dissolve a little iron from the can," the department release continues, "but this is not harmful, not dangerous to health. Cans and foods are sterilized in the processing, but the dish into which the food might be emptied is far from sterile. In other words, it is likely to have on

it bacteria that cause food to spoil." Concerning the notion that freezers will spoil canned foods, scientists say that freezing may change the appearance of some canned foods - but it cannot affect their wholesomeness. Additional advice from the experts: Canned foods retain their value, including vitamins, to a higher degree than do fresh foods cooked in the average home; canned foods need not be cooked because the canning process thoroughly cooks the contents, heating and seasoning to taste are sufficient; rust on the outside of a can is no indication that the food inside is contaminated; the contents being perfectly safe and nutritious unless the rust has pierced the metal.

Reassured by the scientists, now our only remaining fear about food is: Will we get enough?

Columnist Counts Leaves Of Tree - 354,563 of Them INDIANAPOLIS, IND. - Ed Sovols, Indianapolis columnist, climbed down out of a maple tree and announced that it had 354,563 leaves.

Sovols, who nearly lost his life recently trying out a ball point pen under water in a diving suit, said he counted every leaf on the tree. The first branch he counted, Sovols said, had a total of 3,164 leaves; eight caterpillars, three ants and three ladybugs.

War Surplus 15 Aid Europe; Tentative Blueprint Drawn WASHINGTON - The government studied plans to funnel millions of dollars worth of war surplus tools, machinery and clothes into the reconstruction of Europe.

Tentative blueprints of the program already have been drawn. They could be put into effect promptly once the Marshall plan takes shape.

U.S. Army Administrator Littlejohn disclosed the plan. He said he had been working on it for three months with the war and state department.

Littlejohn emphasized the program is tentative, dependent on

among other things - congressional appropriations for U. S. expenditures in Europe.


WOULD LOAN \$250,000,000 DEBT ON STATE

STATE FAIR RECORDS SHOW HIGH CROWDS

After the smoke has cleared away and the State Fair Board summarized the activities of the 1947 Kentucky State Fair, the records show that the attendance exceeded 350,000 more than \$69,000 was cleared more than 1,700 head of live stock shown, the largest farm machinery display in the Central Midwest this year, 436 county exhibits, all since 2014 in the M & M Building, and a completely inside rebuilding of the horse show pavilion.

The board voted to pay off \$273,500 worth of outstanding bonds, some of them not due until 1955, using perating revenue and funds paid by Tubman, Inc. for rental of Fair grounds and building during the war. Fair board president James Rush, who has attended the fair for the past 40 years, stated that this is the first time in many years that the Ken-

tucky State Fair is debt free. Manager J. O. Matlick stated that a lease with the Ford Motor Company was renewed at \$1,500 monthly, permitting the use of the "Mechanics and Manufacturers" building for the 10 months. But the Fair board does not use the building. The board approved leasing the poultry building, which monthly and each barn for \$75.00 monthly. The Fair board hopes eventually to replace such machinery as \$50,000 a year from Fair property rented to outside sources during the off-season months.

County Agents Notes

Last week we conducted 12 tobacco grading demonstrations in the county with Mr. J. W. Vanarsdall as grader. Mr. Vanarsdall is one of our Federal tobacco graders. He is an expert tobacco grower. Samples from 47 crops were handled at these meetings. Tobacco was weighed from each crop and yield per acre figured which was found to run from 1000 pounds to 1750 pounds. All crops were lighter this year than last year. The quality was good on the whole. More than 300 farmers and other interested attended these demonstrations. Mr. Vanarsdall advised all farmers to do a good job in grading. It pays to take time to grade your tobacco properly. He said it looks like the price will be good for good tobacco.

County Corn Contest - 23 farmers entered the County Corn Contest but only 10 finished. The floods caused many farmers to drop out because of damage. 10 completed by having their corn measured, weighed and moisture tested at the State College of Agriculture.

The following is a list of farmers and bushels per acre produced.

Farmers: Walter Turner, Brodhead - 75.8 bushel; Willie Bullen, Wildie - 81.8 bushel; W. A. Richmond, Boone - 123.0 bushel.

Future Farmers: Wesley Lambert, Boone - 65 acre plot 60.4 bushel; Stephen Bullen, Wildie - 84.5 bushel; Jack Holt, Mt. Vernon, Route 1 - 92.2 bushel.

4-H Boys: Teddy Chandler, Negro Creek Club - 72.9 bushel; Bobby Turner, Little Rock - 75.8 bushel; Irvine Brown, Ottawa Club - 101.4 bushel; Herbert Richmond, Fairview Club - 90.8 bushel. All are to be congratulated. It has been a few years since we were producing 10 to 25 bushel per acre. The County average yield per acre was 14 bushel in 1920. It was 35 bushel last year.

'Punchy' Pufflists Cured
By New Brain Operation

BOSTON — Punch drunk boxers can be restored to normal mentality by a delicate brain operation, according to Dr. Frank H. Lahey, director of Lahey clinic.

The so-called "punchy" pufflists, he said, suffer from a substance, the hematomas—a slowly-accumulating blood clot—which can be removed by the operation.

Lahey said that hematomas produced by slight head blows may not cause unconsciousness and may remain undiscovered for months, but often result in mental changes and even insanity.

He said that in the case of prize fighters, surgical removal of the hematomas has resulted in complete relief.

Western Ranchmen Now Go South for Their Saddles

ANNISTON, ALA.—The saddles used on a western ranch in a Hollywood movie or in a Madison Square garden rodeo may be typically western in style, but they frequently bear an Alabama trademark.

J. R. Russell and his 30 employees get most of their orders from the western states, and from rodeo companies. Russell started making saddles commercially 10 years ago.

"When it was training horses, I had to remake every saddle I ever bought to suit myself, so I decided I might as well make some good saddles to suit a real horseman's needs," he said.
