**Erosion Prevented By Sound Practice Growing Crops Help In Saving the Soil**  
By W. J. DRYDEN

The late spring floods and heavy rains made many farmers realize that losses from water erosion can be lessened. Michigan State College specialists list four rules to reduce water erosion on farm land:

1. Never leave the ground bare longer than necessary. Vegetation is important over the winter.
2. As the slope of the land increases, use more crops of grass and small grains and fewer cultivated crops.
3. If medium sloping land is cultivated, practice strip cropping, cross slope seeding and tillage, and use soil waterways and terraces.
4. Keep the soil in as high a state of fertility as possible. Add lime where necessary, use commercial fertilizers and add humus through natural manures, green manure or crop residues.

227,000-MILE YARDSTICK

DO SOMETHING: GOP Planners Truman Chast

It is up to congress, said President Truman in his nationwide radio address to his fellow-countrymen, to do something to avert price control and depression at home and at the same time provide emergency aid to European nations to combat "totalitarian aggression" abroad.

Explaining why he had called congress into special session, Truman said the "President admitted he was frankly worried about the rising inflation spiral in the U. S. Prices are too high, and rising. Buying power is shrinking. Americans in the low and moderate income brackets are doing without essentials."

"When so many people are not sharing fairly in prosperity, the road to depression is being paved for a recession or a depression... Inflation must be stopped before it is too late."

Truman said he would "recommence a program for price control with inflation, high prices and the high cost of living."

And in Europe, the keynote was desperation. To reduce Mr. Truman's delineation of the foreign crisis to figurative terms, the Four Big Powers of the Americas are thundering across the land, and after them gallops a Fifth Horseman—the threat of "totalitarian aggression."

Even with our aid, Europe will remain on short rations this winter. The people there are suffering. But our emergency aid will be definite assurance of continuing support of this nation for the free people of Europe.

Incidents: "Brass Curtain" Rep.—Marion T. Bennett (Rep.-Mo.) returned to the U. S. following a six-week tour of Europe and the Near East with grave news that was not likely to give much comfort to war-weary Americans.

WEAPONS: Not the Atom Doomsday piper a little closer for those who read the words of Rear Adm. Ellis M. Zacharias, USN, retired, in a recent issue of the United Way National News.

Weapons exist today, Zacharias, former naval intelligence expert, said. "That could wipe the last vestige of human, animal and vegetable life from the face of the earth."

Among Zacharias' revelations was the slightly less staggering assertion that the U. S. now has an atom bomb 50 times more powerful than those dropped at Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

CANDIDATE TAFT: Official Name Sen. Robert Taft surprised no one when he finally jumped officially into the still rather tepid pool of Republican presidential candidates for the 1948 election.

In a letter to Fred H. Johnson, chairman of the Ohio Republican state central and executive committee, Taft said: "I shall be glad to permit my name to be submitted as a candidate for the presidency and accept the support of the Republican state central and executive committee."

It was only after a long period of shrewdly testing the waters that the son of the 26th President of the U. S. finally set his feet wet in the prescribed manner. His western trip, he asserted, and advice from elsewhere in the country had convinced him that "the situation with regard to the nomination is wide open."

That statement was taken to mean that he does not consider New York's Thomas E. Dewey as too serious a threat and that he believes "step Dewey" movement is taking hold.

Sen. Glen Taylor (Dem., Ill.) has embarked on his cross-country horseback ride to Paul Revere, to warn the American people against what he thinks is the disastrous foreign policy of the U. S. He will arrive in Washington shortly before congress convenes for its special session.

WASHINGTON—The American public, on the whole, is way ahead of the government. The people may be confused at times; they may not see the road clearly; but they are eager and anxious to do anything which will help preserve the democratic system, rally their fellow-men and prevent war.

We now hear reports that the Middlewest has gone isolationist again, that the folks out there have pulled back into their shell and say to heck with Europe—what, set up a new Russo-American front. There may be some of that. But when the people of Elburn, Ill., get out their wagons and repick their country, they will not follow that. That's patriotism. And when the Boy Scouts of Nebraska repick the books out of their libraries, and pull back into their shell.

And when the people of Oklahoma and Kansas set up their own relief committees, not waiting for prompting from Washington, and begin leading the charge against the Federal Government, they are not following that. That's democracy.

Washington Digest Former Minnesota Governor Is Playing Lone Wolf Role

WASHINGTON—When the makers were down in Washington sweating out a grain conservation program for their industry, my friend from Minnesota, Harry W. Zinsmeister, who is what the personal column calls a "frequent visitor" to the capital, gave a little luncheon for his colleagues and some press and radio men.

We had finished eating and were gathered around to listen to the baker's troubles when suddenly the door opened and 220 pounds of blond, smiling, political potentiality burst upon us.

Our host shouted a happy "Hello, Harold!" then turned and announced: "Gentlemen, the next President of the United States."

I do not mean to say that the Republicans will say "aye" to that. What the rest of the country says is awaited with interest by the candidate.

# Veterans Service Bureau

EDITOR'S NOTE: This Newspaper through special arrangement with the Washington Bureau of Veterans National Union of U.S.A. is able to bring readers this very timely and important information. Questions may be addressed to the Washington office and will be answered in a subsequent column. No replies can be made direct to mail, but those of a general nature will appear in this newspaper's medical.

## Medical Service Improved

Improvement of medical services to veterans, already regarded as the best in the world, includes two innovations: amputation and prosthetic limbs. Major General Hawley, head of V.A. medical division:

1. Intensive research into diseases which claim the lives of more veterans than any other disease, and—

2. Use of pedicative isotopes for diagnosing and treating certain types of diseases.

New heart research center, part of which is in operation, is the first of its kind in the world. George P. Robb, former Hoosier, and widely known cardiologist at Mount Alto hospital in Washington.

Use of atomic isotopes will be in charge of Dr. George M. Lyons of Huntington, W. Va. Dr. Lyons was a staff officer for the Bikini atomic bomb tests and he has gathered together a committee of advisors including the nation's foremost nuclear physicist, the radio isotope program will be carried on during the next year at the University of Framingham, Mass.; Bronx, N. Y.; Cleveland, Ohio; Hines at Chicago; Minneapolis and San Angeles.

## Questions and Answers

Q. I am a veteran of World War I and I wonder if I can get a G.I. loan to buy a new automobile for my brother-in-law who is not a veteran. We can get the property at a pretty good price.—A. D. G. Marquette, Mich.

A. Yes, such a loan is possible, provided your interest is protected in a trust. Your brother-in-law should default in his payments.

Q. My son is a veteran and has a life insurance policy in force which is paid up to date. He wants to convert his policy into a private insurance company policy which is possible to do this?—Mrs. D. F. LeBaron, N. H.

A. Yes, it is possible to convert into one or more of the permanent plans offered by Veterans' administration. Suggest you contact your local office.

Q. My son was about three years service, most of it overseas, during World War I and has been in the service about three months. He is restless and doesn't know just what he wants to do. He has been thinking about taking up some sort of on-the-job training plan. Will the government help him where he can't get such work or training?—Mrs. D. F. Lake City, Fla.

A. No. Veterans' administration does not provide this information. There are some agencies available which will help you find a job-training establishment.

Q. What is the limit for a G.I. business loan? I am thinking about starting one if I can get the mechanical repair business. Am pretty good at mechanics and have been for a long time. I have a community. Can you tell me about it?—R. S. A., London, Ohio.

A. Business loans are available up to \$2,000. Real estate loans are repayable in 10 years or less and real estate loans may run to 25 years.

Q. My son, F. W. C., serial number 6653302, was honorably discharged on February 18, 1939. He then went back into service and was sent to Shanghai, Japan. I have tried every department and branch of service for information concerning his whereabouts. Has he not been home or help to find him?—Mrs. J. W. C., Fosteria, Ohio.

A. The department of the army advises us they have no record of your son's re-enlistment. They say he was discharged February 10, 1939, and gave his next of kin as a neighbor, Ohio. You might ask your local Red Cross chapter to try to trace him.

Q. Has any estimate been made as to the probable cost of a federal bonus?—J. W. D., Baltimore, Md.

A. Maximum estimate of cost of World War II federal bonus ranges from 30 billion to 80 billion dollars, depending upon the number of veterans eligible for such bonus and the eligibility dates involved.

Q. Is there any expense attendant to entering a veterans' hospital in order that the patient's insurance? We have been thinking for some time that our son needs some kind of insurance since he has not been well since his discharge from the army. Can you get us some advice on what to do?—Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Marshall, Ohio.

A. No, all charges are borne by the federal government. You should contact your nearest Veterans' administration and explain the condition of your son. They will advise you.

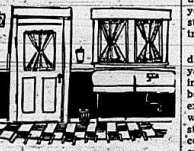

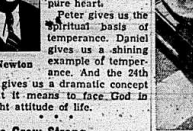

## Serve Fruit Desserts for Meal Contrasts

(See recipes below.)

**Fruit Desserts**

Food studies that people do not get as many fruits in winter as in summer, and frequently this is thought to be a result of their lack of availability; but a good percentage of fruits available in their fresh form are canned, and thus made available for use.

Then, too, there are a number of months when available in the cooler months than during the summer.

After the apples are in their prime, and so are pears. Look to the citrus fruits, also. If you want particularly luscious fruits that are scarce in summer. Make good use of the dried fruit like prunes and apricots for they have excellent vitamin and mineral values.

This is the season to make fall use of the canned fruit you stored during the warmer months. Serve them chilled with suitable cookies for an easy dessert or make them into one of the many delectable puddings such as the following:

- Deep Dish Plum Dessert** (Serves 6)
  - 3 cups canned plums
  - 1/4 teaspoon cinnamon
  - 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
  - 2 tablespoons butter
- Put and chop the plums.** Pour with 1/4 cup of their juice into a greased shallow baking dish. Sprinkle with one sprig of nutmeg with butter. Cover with crust made as follows:
  - 1 1/2 cups sifted flour
  - 2 teaspoons baking powder
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 6 tablespoons shortening
  - 1/2 cup sugar
  - 2 tablespoons sugar
- Sift dry ingredients;** mix in apartment. Add milk to make a soft dough. Roll dough to 1/4 inch thickness and make a few short slashes in it. Place over the fruit in the baking dish. Sprinkle with 2 tablespoons of sugar. Bake for 15 minutes in preheated oven (400° F). Serve warm.

- Princess Custard** (Serves 6)
  - 2 large bananas, sliced
  - 1/2 teaspoon orange rind, grated
  - 1/4 cup sugar
  - 1/2 cup brown sugar
  - 2 tablespoons cornstarch
  - 1/2 teaspoon salt
  - 1 1/2 cups milk
  - 2 egg yolks, slightly beaten
  - 2 egg whites
  - 2 tablespoons sugar
  - 1/4 cup sweet cream (cake), cooked, granular cracker flour
- Combine bananas, orange rind and juice.** In a double boiler, combine sugar, cornstarch and salt. Add milk gradually and cook until thick. Remove from fire and add in fruit mixture. Chill. Gradually add sugar to stiffly beaten egg whites, fold into custard. Pour in shallow glass and sprinkle with crumbs.

- Combine bananas, orange rind and juice.** In a double boiler, combine sugar, cornstarch and salt. Add milk gradually and cook until thick. Remove from fire and add in fruit mixture. Chill. Gradually add sugar to stiffly beaten egg whites, fold into custard. Pour in shallow glass and sprinkle with crumbs.
- Arrange layers of apples, cut in eighths with marshmallows cut in thirds, butter cut into pieces, brown sugar and nuts in a buttered baking dish.** Bake in a moderate oven (350° F) baking occasionally. Cool. Serve with whipped cream. This may also be served as a side dish with pork, turkey or chicken. Released by WNU Features.
