Big Four Delegates Fear Failure; Republicans Plan Larger Tax Cut; Fertilizer Exports Held in Reason

DULLES VISIT: To France

John Foster Dulles, Secretary of State, left Washington for Paris on Monday. He is expected to spend the next few days in Paris, where he will meet with the Big Four delegates...

So the U. S. Embassy turned a big back on England and paid a visit to Paris... Dulles' resistance to communism is more significant than that of any other country in Europe...

Concerning the London conference, Dulles was not so optimistic. "I still hope that the foreign ministers' conference will become more realistic, but so far what has been done has not been very important...

TAXES: Bigger Cut

Republicans in congress have raised their sights on the amount of income tax reduction they will be gunning for next year. A high-placed party member has reported that they will launch a campaign for a slash in the top income tax rates of 5.3 billion dollars...

Tax reduction probably will be tied in with whatever substitute measure the Republicans offer to replace President Truman's anti-inflation program. Although Rep. Harold Knutson (Rep., Minn.), chairman of the means and methods committee and chief GOP tax watchdog, would deny the report that plans were on the board to raise the excise-cutting figure...

FERTILIZER: Exported

Complaints by American farmers that shipping fertilizer to Europe under the emergency relief plan will cripple home production are not justified, according to a report of Commerce Averell Harriman. Only nitrogen content of commercial fertilizers will be supplied to France, Italy and Austria. There will be no contributions of potash or phosphates...

SOURCE OF POLIO

The throat and mouth may be common sources of infection in cases of infantile paralysis, according to findings of medical investigators who studied poliomyelitis epidemics in Chicago in 1945 and '46. Working on the generally accepted theory that polio is transmitted only immediately before and after symptoms appear, they determined that polio virus is present in the throat before the first signs...

Atomic War Blueprint

WASHINGTON—Maj. Gen. Leslie Groves, America's No. 1 atomic soldier, laid down a blueprint for atomic war at an off-the-record meeting with several top military brass officers...

1. Fighting units must be trimmed in size and scattered across the country. The day of mass concentrations is over. Big army units and naval ports—the vital organs of war—must be broken up and scattered over the map...

2. All troops must be moved, supplied and supported by air. Their equipment must be streamlined and cut to the bone. Their leaders will need "the courage of Job and the judgment of Napoleon..."

3. Special units must be trained so that they can move into an atom-bombing area and take over. They must bring their own portable hospitals and fire departments, must be able to take over the reins of government...

4. A civilian-trained army must be held in readiness, able to operate war plants or fight battles. The modern military organization is highly skilled, well organized—"not just a list of names..."

General Groves warned that soldiers would be safer than civilians in an atomic war. "Industrial rather than military centers would be the primary targets. The only real danger against an atomic bomb," he said, is the fear of a counter-offense.

"The problem," declared Groves, is to keep the bomb from getting here. Single enemy planes no longer will be allowed to pass unmolested thinking they are simply on reconnaissance missions...

General Groves' speech was a bomb that could destroy half the world as we know it. Such a bomb would be impractical, he explained, because it would be too large and most of the world would be wasted on military land-scapes.

"No military target is larger than three square miles," he argued, "and the present bomb will wipe out that large an area."

The Washington Digest Backers Say UMT Needed To Bolster Foreign Policy

(This is the first of two articles on the drive for universal military training which is to be launched soon and which is back of that drive. The first article deals with the potential effect of military training on our foreign policy, the next with the program itself.)

WASHINGTON—As the foreign ministers' conference plodded along in London, American delegate Marshall probably frequently found himself reaching for one document to support his case. It had been there for some time. It had had concrete proof to place before the world that America is not engaging in the well-known game of bluff.

That is why, shortly after the second session of the 80th Congress opens in January, you will see and hear a lot more about universal military training than you ever did before. The President, as requested by the American Legion, is expected to proclaim a UMT week (January 1 through 12), and although there will be no active propaganda on the part of the government departments because the administration, especially the war department, is going to lean over backwards to avoid the charge of trying to influence congress, they will do whatever they can within their prescribed limits.

But there will be a concerted UMT drive from many private organizations. The American Legion is the one that is the most active at this issue and its commander, J. A. M. F. Kelly, stated he is going to give his whole time to it...

Whether or not a bill authorizing universal military training is passed at the coming session depends on whether the people believe this or whether it changes the thinking of enough members of congress so that a favorable majority can be obtained.

No one will make a guess now as to what the chances are, but the opposition mentioned above already has effected some changes of viewpoints. The sources of support for UMT will draw heavily from administration circles...

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UMT Gathers Strong Support

Naturally Chas. Gurney of South Dakota, chairman of the senate armed services committee, and Chairman Walter C. Andrews of New York of the house committee of the same name, whose sub-committee under Representative Harry Truman is now working on the bill which is now pending before the senate, are enthusiastic supporters of the measure. And it is expected that the major issues which the New York governor has endorsed...

Granted that the Kremlin policy is a long-range plan of active aggression, the most immediate goal is to get control over as many nations or as much disputed territory as possible. The absorption of control over Germany as its chief goal.

Granted that communism in Europe at this writing is on the defensive and will be even more so if the European recovery plan succeeds. Meanwhile, the Russian war take every step short of war.

Granted that Russia does not wish to fight a war at present. Russia knows we know that. But Russia knows that we do not and that we do not want war, she also knows we could not fight one, not only because we have no outposts of troops on the continent of a force greatly outnumbered by the Red army but because we are woefully unprepared.

Therefore, the Russians know they can go much further in their "cold war" than they could if we were to play their obstructionist game in the foreign ministers' conference and in the United Nations, carry on active propaganda against us along the periphery of their satellites and even ACTIVELY aid armed forces within non-satellite border states as they are doing in Greece.

The Russians feel they can take this course because they believe that the American people themselves will not back any threat to their (Soviet) aggression. That is why the American support any step to strengthen the military machine of the United States.

That is the reason the hand of policy makers would be greatly strengthened if universal military training were established there because it would show that America is really serious in its conviction that Russia does not want war. (I repeat that because it is a known fact) She is contentedly waiting a later date (she hopes) we will have been through a complete collapse and a left-wing government will come into power. (Wallace) The best chance of success in getting on the part of the Russians are believed to be an effort to discourage attempts to strengthen the American opposition to our military defense.

Of course, the argument that a strong military organization prevents war because it reduces the chance of attack is an old one. But under the peculiar international situation which exists today it is probably more nearly true than ever before in history.

STASSEN DEWEY They favor UMT. The bill was presented just the day before the first session of the 80th congress adjourned, and it was expected that the House would not intend to let it reach the floor at that time. Speaker Martin was said to have been cool toward it, but not in active opposition. His objections were based on political strategy. Senator Taft is definitely opposed to universal military training, which he regards as another "control" which is objectionable to him. Opposition may be considered strong from the extreme right and the extreme left. It is hardly likely that Representative Wm. Marcantonio, who has the support of Communists in New York, would vote for UMT.

HOUSEHOLD MEALS... by Lynn Chambers

Make it a Merry Yuletide Feast! Holiday Banquets The big feast is almost at hand and the cupboards are undoubtedly even now groaning under the load of goodies. The kitchen has been the scene of many a cooking adventure during the past few weeks, but there's still lots to be done before Christmas dinner graces the table. Usually, we overeat during the holidays, so now it would be a good plan to decide on a sensible menu.

LYNN'S CHRISTMAS MENU Hot Vegetables Juice Cheese-Sardinia Appetizers Rib Roast of Beef Glazed Onions Broccoli Cranberry-Star Pineapple Salad Jellied-Plum Pudding Panecake Candies Recipe given.

One simple type of red and green salad to use for the above dinner is to make cole slaw from red cabbage. Set this in a salad bowl lined with whole leaves of freshly washed, chilled spinach.

CHRISTMAS DINNER II. Baked Ham with Orange-Cranberry Garnish or Roast Pork Shoulder with Cinnamon Apples Mashed Potato with Tiny Green Lima Beans Red and Green Pear Salad Tiny Corn Muffins - Currant Jelly Fluffy Hot Eggless Ice Cream

How to do: To make garnish for ham, scoop out orange halves and scallop edges with a pair of shears. Fill with cranberry sauce. If you are making cinnamon apples, cook 1 cup of cinnamon candies with 2 cups of water, 1 cup sugar and a few drops of red coloring. Cook until peeled (but not cooked) apples in syrup until a deep pink. Drain and chill.

EGGLESS ICE CREAM 2 cups rich milk Yolks of 6 eggs 1/4 cup sugar 1/2 cup cream 2 teaspoons vanilla Heat milk and pour slowly over the beaten egg yolks, stirring constantly. Add sugar and cook in top of double boiler until thickened; add salt, strain, cool and beat until fluffy. Fold in cream which has been whipped and freeze until firm. When partially frozen, beat again and add vanilla or any desired flavor. Serve in sherbet glasses sprinkled with rolled macaroon crumbs and candied cherries.

Hot Vegetable Juice. Heat canned vegetable juice (or combine tomato juice with liquid from cooked vegetables). Serve in cups with slices of lemon in which you have stuck a few cloves. Cranberry-Star Pineapple Salad. Arrange slices of well-chilled pineapple on a bed of lettuce. In the hole of the pineapple place a spoonful of cranberry sauce. Top this with a star made from jellied cranberry sauce. Flute cream cheese or mayonnaise from pastry tube on top of star and then garnish with a few chopped nuts. Serve with additional mayonnaise, if desired.

Small fry will feel more comfortable after Christmas dinner if they are served ice cream—poppermint or tart-fruit—in place of the plum puddings or puffs. Serve with ice cream with some sugar-dusted cookies. A pineapple garnish may be used for baked ham or roast pork. Place some grapes—the Tolzey type—into slightly beaten egg white and dip in powdered sugar. Do this by small clusters and then dip them in the center of the pineapple ring.

If, today, the most successful business man in the United States or the greatest preacher, or lawyer, or whatever else might be his calling,—were to write a book on "How to Make Good" in his particular line of business or profession, you may be sure that hundreds, thousands, perhaps millions would flock to buy the book and read it in the hope that they, too, might succeed.

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Such a book might even render a real service, for it would probably disillusion the success seeker of expecting any easy way, and yet show him, by example and precept gathered from actual experience, what he must do to win success.

There is a book which I have sometimes wished might be called "How to Make Good." If it had that name I think many more people would study it eagerly. 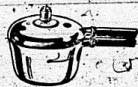
