Truman Alters Europe Aid Tactics; Congress Ready for Political Fight; Fuel Oil Shortage Serious in U. S.

PLANS
Cold War
 President Truman framed out a complete dossier of his administration's foreign policy for the purpose and publication of congress as it reconvenes for the 1948 session.

He removed the 17-billion-dollar price level from the four-year Marshall plan to aid Europe, and

He authorized the British, French, Greek, Turkish, and Italian to receive of lend lease materials which Great Britain originally had requested for the 1948 session.

Elimination of the descriptive 17-billion-dollar total aspect of the Marshall plan was made by Mr. Truman's close aide and undersecretary, Arthur Vandenberg (Rep., Mich.) who has insisted that it was nothing more than a matter of recent congress commit itself on the complete amount of the European recovery program for four years with the future as uncertain as it is.

Described by some as simply a parliamentary maneuver, the action does not modify the administration's original request to spend up to 17 billion over the four-year period. It merely leaves open the possibility that the total amount of funds for which expenditures would be authorized by congress.

A question which does continue to stand, however, is the request for 6 billion dollars to be earmarked for European needs during the next 18 months.

Net effect of the maneuver for the immediate present appeared to be simply to eliminate the 17 billion dollars as a target for congressional criticism.

Looking toward Greece, where Communists have established their own form of government in the northern part of that nation, Mr. Truman authorized the British to transfer to the Greek army lend-lease equipment once held by the now virtually defunct British army in that area.

THE BREACH:
Wider
 All indications as the 80th congress set down for this election year suggest that there will be a large difference between President Truman and the ruling Republican legislators who will widen into a great breach before November rolled back.

The rift is a result of the basic, deep-seated variations of policy between the executive and legislative branches on issues of fundamental importance to the national economy.

Congress—that is to say the Republican majority—is expected to bend every effort toward affecting a reduction in Federal and large cities in government spending. Rep. Harold Knutson's new tax reduction bill, scheduled for debate in the House this week, is a good point for discussion of these issues.

Knutson's bill, in general, would reduce the treasury income by \$8 billion dollars and carry over seven million persons from income tax rolls.

Mr. Truman remains opposed to any general tax cuts, but it was thought he might propose higher taxes on corporation profits in order to have a margin for lower-level personal income tax reductions without having to slash total government revenues.

The Marshall plan for European recovery, of course, will open a fresh battleground on which the administration is expected to have an edge while the administration will seek more generous appropriations on the premise that U. S. must continue its wealth and resources to Europe in order to preserve its national security against the threats of communism.

Artist-Writer Builds Self Philosophy 'for to Admire'

Washing-ton — Every once in a while, I devote this column to a book. Not a review, but just my feelings about the book and its author.

I couldn't help writing about "Time and Chance" by artist Cyrus LeRoy-Baldridge. Not merely because the book interested me, or because it is a most attractive piece of autobiography, or because the drawings are a book in themselves, or because other reviewers liked it—but because I happened to share some of the experiences it describes and because I liked the sense of direction through the times and chances which Baldridge interprets in terms of his own.

Also I want to review a few because of what these experiences, the fruits of the varied environments which the artist-author describes, did to form a character, a philosophy, which is "for to see and to admire."

In Roy's own words, it is the story, partly done in pictures, of "how a well-meaning, but provincial farm boy got through college with Baukhage."

(Roy did the working, I subsidized, loafed considerably.)

"Peace education" (1919) with Baukhage, and sold on Wilson's idealism. Still sold on idealism, the term now altered with the times.

"Worked enough to save money, enough to see Far East, Near East, Africa, India." (And how he worked!)

Then he concludes:

"All men the same, discounting the apparent differences caused by varying backgrounds caused by 'time and chance.'"

To reach that conclusion, Roy makes an Odyssey beginning with "The Looking Pans" (1919) through Arkansas, selling cooking pots, through college with Baukhage, through a job at a bank (Roy did the working, I subsidized, loafed considerably), through Peace education (1919) with Baukhage, and sold on Wilson's idealism. Still sold on idealism, the term now altered with the times.

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Theory vs. Actuality
 During the London conference one of U. S. delegate contacted a friend that "we have been scared stiff for years by the Russian propaganda on our plan for uniting Germany if they did, I don't know where we'd be. Fortunately, the Russians are not so stupid as they would like to be. They had an artist's eye trained on the world, and he saw the truth. He was in a Chicago art school with young artists who were later to achieve national reputations. One was John T. McCutcheon, cartoonist; Webster, creator of the "Timid Soul"; and many others. Good art is a great type designer who died last year, was Roy's teacher, along with his school's director, Frank Holmes, who became a second father to the wide-eyed child. At that school, Roy learned his most important lesson—self criticism.

His mother re-married, and he became a stepson and step-son-in-law in his stepfather's small-town commercial hotel; finally he went to college, an unaffiliated college. When he arrived, he found wasn't there. Utterly alone, without the social prestige of a college fraternity, he achieved campus respect; he became what was considered a "prominent student."

He grew to realize the emptiness of "college honors," but followed him. Roy learned to admire the university which he had "legitimately" exploited, for his own reasons, but he preferred the "university" in the sense of the word but new meaning: "the whole of all things in the universe... a body of persons... the body of the people."

I shared those campus years with Roy, but I missed most of his significance and experience, for I was carefully sheltered, I had a few

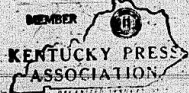

Judge Cites Roman Law; Ring Must Be Returned

LOS ANGELES, CALIF. — Superior Judge Leo Freund reached back nearly 2,000 years to old Roman law and found it good in holding that an engagement ring is not the woman's property until marriage.

He ruled that Miss Betty Sinclair, 46, of Royal Holloway, must return a diamond ring to her former fiance, Russell O. Priebe, 36, real estate man, unles he agrees to pay him \$2,500 in damages. The judge said Roman law held that an engagement ring was merely a symbol of truth — if the truth was broken, the ring went back to the donor.

Priebe sued to recover the ring and a \$400 gold bracelet and \$2,500 cash. Judge Freund ruled that Miss Sinclair may keep the cash and bracelet.

Physicians Study Medical Problems of Atomic Age

CHICAGO — Physicians representing the army, navy, air forces and United States public health service began receiving instruction in the first course in history of the medical problems of the atomic age.

Nineteen physicians have enrolled in the special course at the University of Chicago designed to help them learn how to protect civilians and military personnel against radiation hazards.

Dr. Raymond E. Zerkle, director of the institute of radiology and obstetrics at the university, organized the course at the request of representatives of the armed forces special weapon project.

The first half of the course will deal with atomic nucleus, properties and measurements of radiation and general radiology. The second half will be devoted to prevention and treatment of radiation injury and ailments.

Army Gets 'Mechanical Cow' Makes Better Milk Substitute

WASHINGTON — The army came up with a mechanical cow to make a better substitute for fresh milk for overseas troops.

The army said it had found a method of mechanically producing milk with a milk matter, oil or water.

The advantages the army said are that the milk can be stored and shipped to war places as easily as cans of condensed milk. It is also easy to get and may be made in large quantities.

The new milk is made by churning acceptable cream and recombines fresh milk with the cream. The milk is one of the best of the soldiers stationed in the Pacific.

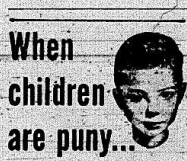

Woman's World Never Discard Men's Overcoats; Remodel Them For Youngsters

MOTHERS say that one of their most serious clothing problems is that of youngsters. Said one of them to me recently, "I had Jimmy all set for the winter in September, and now he looks as though he were squeezed into his coat, and I'm sure he's going to burst the buttons before the season is over."

Most mothers would permit the purchase of another heavy coat for children - grow so fast - and mother has to do a lot of planning. What about Dad's overcoat that hangs in the basement closet? Or what about the gabardine job of your own that is just no longer usable for yourself? These offer excellent solutions to the youngster's coat problem.

Check over the outer material carefully before you decide to remodel. If it just hasn't become good in it, it will be more worth your while to buy remnant material for coating than trying to salvage something with nothing worth saving in it.

After you've satisfied yourself as to the amount and durability of the coat material, check the lining. In most cases this has been worn out long before the coat was discarded, and you will most certainly have to get something new. Youngsters love plaid and checks, and you can get something relatively inexpensive in a cotton flannel that will answer your needs.

Select Straight Lines For Easy Tailoring For ease in sewing as well as ease in adjusting to growing needs, it's best to choose a coat with straight lines. Sometimes pattern too simple, but upon close inspection...

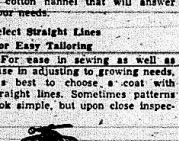
