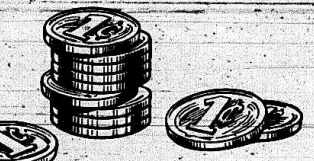

# Woman's World Give Meals Proper Background With Placemats Made at Home

PERHAPS you've noticed that you have just as nice china and silver as your friend across the street but there's something so much more effective about her table when it's set than yours. Or, perhaps you've seen your things used in table settings made up by someone else, and they always seem to look prettier.

The secret of a good looking dining table is not just in the dishes and cutlery you use. Just as important for setting it off properly is the kind of background you give it. Linens—and by this we refer to rayon and rayon as well as linen—add to or detract from your dishes. Contrasting a hot red rayon and a splash of color are essential, while at other times a quiet subdued color and applied with the help of a pattern, give you a set of two for your table, which is all you need.

Color is being used much more extensively on the table than ever before. White is still good, but you'll admit that for a gay, feminine appearance you can create the mood more appropriately if you set the table with delicate greens or a warm orange set of placemats.

Very colorful, tabloths of linen, rayon or cotton become soiled and worn, and as such they no longer can be used for table setting.

Before you make the placemats themselves, you may want to touch up the color to a certain extent. Select this according to the china with which you are serving. If you have bright-colored pottery dishes, for example, you'll want to choose one of the so-called neutral colors—red, pepper, chili green, patio blue or siesta white.

Dye the whole piece of material before cutting to make and napping so that you can be sure the color is even and smooth and every-thing will match. After this is done, press the material carefully and flat.

Placemats are usually cut 11 by 17 inches. Indian napkins are cut 17 inches square, dinner napkins 16 inches, while tea or bridge napkins are 11 1/2 inches square. You may fringe the edges for a quick and easy finish. Or, if you have the time and inclination, hand hemming is a fine and traditional edging.

**Rural Planning Must Emphasize Restored Soil, New Employment**

By EARL FITCH

Restoration of the soil and introduction of new types of employment are main factors in revitalizing rural economy to meet the challenge of the changing times. The growing necessity for sound rural economic planning is apparent in small town and agricultural America, faced as they are by revolutionary changes in the pattern of living. The times bring evidence that the most rural living problems can be solved. Happily this evidence, which has been accumulating for several years, shows the solutions can be accomplished by simple, home-based plans.

Rural economic problems ordinarily come from limitations on earning opportunities. The earnings are limited because the land is allowed to wear out and other things in the neighborhood are limited. Therefore, the solution lies in developing rural living productivity of the soil and in providing new kinds of employment. Both these things can be done with good leadership and good planning.

Extension of rural electrification, the trend toward decentralizing industry, new methods of farm production and land reclamation, all are making possible the task of reviving the country communities and small towns.

Much valuable community work has been done. Some of the pioneering dated back 20 years and longer. The successes of some communities provide examples for others to follow. In the past, the small town, especially regarding small community developments in the southern mountains at Brastown, N. C. There the soil has been reworked and returned to fertility, and some small industries have been introduced to provide the needed opportunities to earn.

Model Rural Community. Brastown is a model in the rural living movement. It has shown that the home and the home surroundings are the most important things in happy living. High wages are not essential if there are better compensations: Happiness cannot be bought with wages. All it will when there are jobs for all, if the home is pleasant and the home is secure.

Brastown is a folk center. It is the home of a school of rural living, which has become the influence that shapes and guides the life of the entire community. This is the John C. Campbell folk center, a permanent and useful memorial to a devoted worker who spent his life as a teacher of mountain people. Everywhere the life work of Mrs. Olive D. Campbell, widow of the man for whom it is named.

The school is like nothing else in the U. S. Its pattern was the folk schools of Denmark, and Danish rural school ideas have been adapted to the needs of the Brastown community.

The school has more than 2000 students and teachers. It is the "voice and spirit" of the community, since it was founded the living standards and the outlook of the whole people have been uplifted and guided by the living. It has succeeded in making the present bright and the future hopeful.

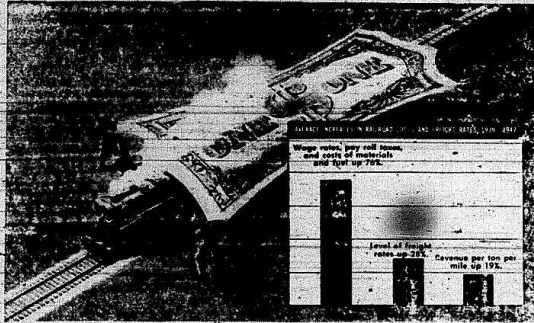

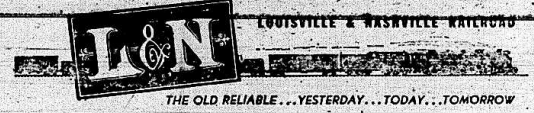
