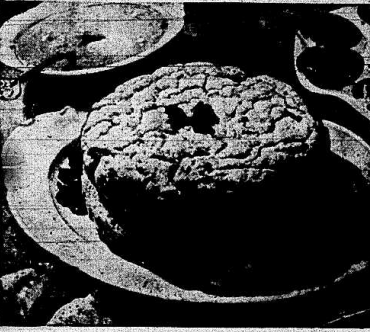

Mississippi Project Sets Pattern in Rural Planning

By EARLE HITCH

Country life must be made healthier, healthy and happy if rural regions are to continue as the main source of our national strength. One of the major phases in the reorganizing of that rural pattern of living is the expansion of rural occupations. For the first time since the factory system put an end to handicrafts in the home and village shops, economic development is taking a turn favorable to the rural environment.

For more than a century it has been otherwise. Rural enterprise, limited to farming and a dwindling retail trade, followed the path of non-resistance. Outside of the fertile farm belts and the mill towns of the upper South, country income has been declining and the lure of the city has left for jobs in the city. Now, there are reasons to believe, that trend can be halted. Invention and discovery offer the earning opportunities for which the country has been waiting.

Grain and poultry, the general types of diversified farming and butchering, milling and hoing. But those lost occupations, sorely missed in the small farm communities, can be replaced. There is now being worked to be done, both on the land and in the local mill plants. The community which wishes to increase the earning capacities of its population can do so.

New Patterns Evolve. Wasted land can be reworked and used for egg, honey, small-plant raising. New production programs, the extension of rural power lines, give country manufacture an edge it never had before. These steps of course, can be taken about on a community-wide scale without careful planning and deliberate leadership. They are most effective when they are undertaken with a long range program for community development.

Several common problems are still too much neglected. Only a few intelligent and patient attempts have been made to find desirable solutions. They are the plans that are succeeding are important not only as local successes, but also as examples for other places, for they are vast areas of rural America which need some kind of economic recovery.

The most successful plans have been adapted to particular conditions. Consumer tastes, market locations and the job of organizing public support have to be taken into consideration along with restoring the land and finding out what can be produced by the farmers and the other labor supply. This will take business backing and business management. It never has been sufficient to make a plan and count on it to work by popular voluntary support.

Enables Tupelo Project. Tupelo, Miss., has one of the most energetic and far-reaching plans in the country. It is a plan for the development of the entire rural area of which Tupelo is the center. The project is especially valuable from the fact that it is limited to dealing with present rural problems, but also is looking ahead to problems that probably must be faced in the future.

The Nature of Jesus

Lesson for February 8, 1948

ONE of the most discerning comments on the nature of Jesus I have ever heard came from an aged Indian in one of the western states a few years ago when I chafed to be waiting for a friend at the entrance of the reservation. This old gentleman was sitting on a bench, and he said, "I tried to speak with him, but he did not seem to understand what I said. Then my friend drove up, and introduced me to the Indian. 'This man knows our Jesus,' my friend said to the Indian. 'He has brightened, and he held out his hand to me.' 'Jesus help Indian white man,' he said. 'Just so, Jesus helps white man love white man, too.'"

The lesson for Sunday is found in John 8:31-40; 13:31-37; and Colossians 1:15-20 with Philippians 8:1-11 as the devotional reading.

TEACHER AND LEAD. TAKE the opening passage, John 13:1-17, where Jesus is pictured as taking a basin of water and kneeling at the disciples' feet, washing their feet, and drying them. Do you not feel a large dose of Jesus' very nature flooding the scene?

requires true love, true humility, to serve in that role. Suppose someone came to render this service to you? And suppose that One who is God of God? Why did Jesus wash the disciples' feet? Because he loved them, and he wanted them to love other people enough to do for them anything that would convince them of the love which they had in their hearts for him. Here we see him as the great teacher.

"AS HAVE LOVED YOU" BUT Peter draws back. He cannot conceive of Jesus washing his feet. Why? Because he does not understand the nature of Jesus. The memory verse for Sunday is helpful just here. Jesus said, "Love one another as I have loved you." John 13:34.

Peter acted very naturally, even if we may be tempted to say that he acted foolishly. In fact, he acted just about like any of us would have acted under similar circumstances.

THIS IS JESUS INTERMEDIATE, young people and adults, having carefully read the message in the 12th chapter of John, where Jesus washes the disciples' feet, will now turn to the chapter of the 13th, and see the expansion of this great truth over into the expressed will of God for his followers.

"WHAT THINK YE OF CHRIST?" AND now we are ready for the climax of the lesson, the Peter's declaration, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the Living God." Matthew 16:16.

We cannot long stand in the presence of the story of this lesson and fail to conclude with the apostle Paul that Jesus was the Son of God who came to save the world from all ungodliness.

"Beginning with the Incarnation, we follow through the resurrection, claims of Jesus, and we know of a truth that he was very God. Conclude with the verse in the opening of God when we contemplate the nature of Jesus, what are we to say? Does not Isaac Watts suggest the answer?"

When I survey the wondrous cross,
On which the Prince of glory died,
My richest gain I count but loss,
And dear redemption here I prize;
From his head, his hands, his feet,
Sorrow and love flow mingled down,
Did ever such love and sorrow meet,

Small Shelf on Bedroom Wall Solves Dressing Table Problem

I HAVE SEEN so many bedrooms with just a large chest of drawers used most often by the man of the house, and no similar table space for the lady of the house. If you don't have the funds for a dresser for her use, why not construct a shelf at one of the walls, or in the bathroom, and use it as a dressing table?

This is one of the simplest ways of solving the dressing table problem, even if space is at a premium. The shelf may be small or large, depending upon the size available, and the woman's needs.

The construction of this is very simple for it needs only a small piece of wood and two hinges. If a drawer space is desired, a small set of them made of wood or constructed out of some boxes set underneath the shelf, is easy to manufacture.

The drawers are a wonderful convenience for such things as cosmetics, mandating supplies, shoes, hose or other small items which need to be handy.

A glass top or a mirror may cover the shelf, you might even have some small table lamps on it. Decoration is easy and, when carefully done, will be an asset to any room.

Make the Skirt Impressively. TAKE a piece of dressing paper, or a piece of paper, and draw a pattern for a skirt. Then dig out some of your old materials when you begin to do the decorating. What about using old lace, or old draper or bedspreads? Most of these materials will drape nicely around such a table.

Or, what about an old organ or formal? Many of these have large

If you have flowered wallpaper use that in your room, take inspiration from that and make up curtains of the flowers, and use these as applique work on the skirt of organ or other such material.

You also may buy quilted material by the yard if you want a more tailored, richer type of skirt. Or, do the quilting yourself after the skirt is cut by using a transfer pattern. This is especially effective done on felt or satin.

Flowers or large bows are both good motifs to use if you want to embellish something on your dressing table skirt. Choose these in color that will match the skirt.

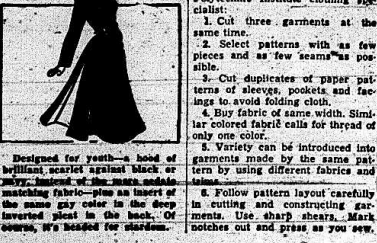

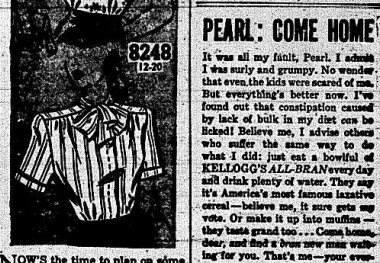

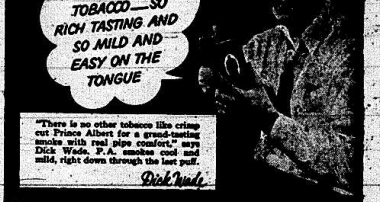
