Commodities Price Skid May Mean Beginning of a 'Healthy Deflation'; Russia Says U. S. Financed Hitler

PRICE SKID: Deflation?

What the harassed American consumer wondered was the real significance of the sharp drop in prices on the grain markets? Was it a harbinger of an economic crash or simply the beginning of a beneficial deflation?

- 1. The 1946 crop outlook in Europe is much brighter. Wheat acreage is up and winter rains have been helpful throughout the continent. Russia and the Danube basin.

Major impact of the fall-off in prices on the commodity markets would not be reflected in the "housewife's market basket" for a month or more; the prediction: that there were some early price rises that a price downturn might be on the way.

The outlook, then, as stated conservatively by Paul S. Wilson, president of the Grocery Manufacturers of America, was this: "Unless other cost factors, such as labor, offset lower commodity levels, a halt to the upward price movement is indicated."

GUARANTEED: Annual Wage

Some impartial economists and business administrators have advocated the guaranteed annual wage for workers on a national scale as an effective buffer against depression, but the idea never has received general approval.

The council currently is preparing a special report on the plan on the basis of how it operates in the few large concerns which guarantee workers a fixed yearly income regardless of seasonal or temporary layoffs.

EDUCATION PAYS

Starting salaries for college graduates have approximately doubled since 1929 and are generally \$10 to \$25 above those of last year, according to a 1945 survey by the employment trends committee.

Crisis in Japan

Resignation of Socialist Prime Minister Yozomi Katayama and his cabinet has outraged MacArthur and the Japanese government.

REVERSAL? Palestine

Largely because of strong U. S. support in the United Nations, the plan for the partition of Palestine into independent Arab and Jewish states was put into effect.

Key word in this development is "reversal." The U. S. State Department has been subjected to powerful pressure to reverse the U. S. policy in the U. N. on the forced partition of the Holy Land.

There was no longer any doubt that relations between the U. S. and Russia had deteriorated to the point of bitter, fruitless recriminations, name-calling and blame-throwing.

COED WAR: Counter Charge

The U. S. state department had got in the first telling blow along these lines by making public 200 captured documents which lay bare the politically oriented and far sinister German designs prior to Hitler's military attack on Russia.

NO RETREAT: Civil Rights

Did President Truman try to back down on his bold stand civil rights proposals? Or did he show his southern Democrats in this election year?

There will be absolutely no retreat of any point," stated Roosevelt, who characterized the story as being "made out of the whole cloth and without foundation and fact."

Looking at one possibility of future war from the vantage point of recent trips through both Europe and the United States, the conclusion of this observer is that war with Russia can be avoided.

Washington Digest: John Adams Hung Clothes On Limb, Swam in Potomac

WASHINGTON—At a recent press and radio conference, one of the reporters ribbed the President about the balcony he was building on the White House, which the Washington fine arts commission objects to as destroying the architectural beauty of the building.

"I repeated the story on the air as Mr. Truman told it and in the day's mail received a letter from Mr. Daniel J. Kelly Jr., of South Bend, Ind., who is a collector of early historical newspapers."

"I enjoyed your reference in a recent broadcast to the newspaper woman who sat on President Adams' clothes until he agreed to give her an interview."

"John Quincy Adams was an ardent and accomplished swimmer and he paddled a dory about in the Potomac every winter while President. He was also an ardent writer, and his diary contains many a mention of his dips in the river."

White House Desk

President Truman got quite a lot out of talking recent visitors who had been to the White House. Roosevelt put out of commission by accidentally dropping a lit cigarette or cigar into one of the drawers.

"According to Adams' diary... 'She continues to make her best motions to my person; she has been and is being feared by others, by her department and her books; treating all with a familiarity which often passes for familiarity, familiarity, though we treat her with incivility, and then imposing them in a familiar way on me and later the secretary's delicacy, but unable to forget its privilege of gentle treatment to others, she gets about the White House in a very uncomplimentary manner in my diary.'

"This however, was not quite all of the story, the rest fact is that one man had to do with the withdrawal. He is the man who got pulled out of the water by the secretary of the greatest military operation in American history—George C. Marshall."

Even before this, Truman had been so sore at George Allen for trying to take the story that he fired his one beloved court jester friend out of the White House.

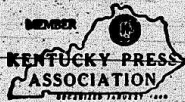
