**Home Loans Tightened**

A total of 50,000 World War II veterans were able to buy homes during 1945 under the G.I. law as compared to 40,000 in 1944, a total of 1,058,711 homes purchased since the law was enacted.

Reviewing the past year's loan transactions VA said that over \$6,000,000 and one in 30 paid \$10,000 or more for his home.

Out of the total of homes purchased however, only about 18,000 were for newly constructed homes, averaging \$2,200 each. Of the total homes bought, 88 per cent were above six billion dollars, nearly half of which is guaranteed or insured by VA, claims paid to date on general claims slightly more than a million dollars.

From federal reserve bank reports however, indications are that veterans are being caught in a general credit tightening and that fewer and fewer 100 per cent loans are being made by the banks and other lenders. According to the banks the reason is that many veterans requested from 100 per cent loans on which they make no down payment as rent, not buying, and since they have no equity to protect, they are monthly payment plan. Banks therefore are planning to make veterans put up more cash.

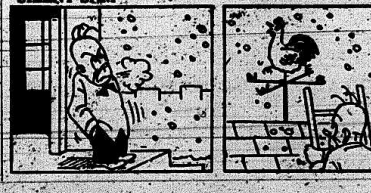

**QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS**

This column is indebted to T/Sgt. H. E. Slaughter, public information officer of the army and air force recruiting station at Baton Rouge, La., for directing our attention to an error in a recent column. We had informed an Orlando, Fla., wife that her husband, who had realigned in the army, was that member of a G.I. club. The facts are that that member of the armed services who has been separated from his family and is being sent to a Veterans Administration as a veteran and entitled to all the privileges and benefits of the G.I. bill even though he enlists in any branch of the service. So to Mrs. G. G. T. at Orlando, your husband, who has realigned in the army for two years, is entitled to make application for a G.I. loan for purchase of a home.

I am the widow of a World War II veteran. I have one little daughter, age six. I have been unable to take care of her and she has been placed with friends of mine a great distance from the town in which I live. I believe the child is entitled to a pension for the death of my husband, but am wondering if I can collect this pension since she does not live with me. Can you advise me? Mrs. H. G., Mineral Wells, Tex.

A. Yes, the child is entitled to a pension. The amount of the pension may be made either to you or to the persons who have custody of the child, preferably the latter if they are to continue the child's care. Suggest you get in touch with your nearest VA Office, or the office you contacted for your own widow's pension.

Q. Will the subsistence allowances now being paid to veterans taking advanced courses and the G.I. bill will be increased by this congress?

A. K. L. McK., Rocky Mount, N. C.

A. As this is written, all indications are that subsistence allowances will be increased, since a bill for this purpose has been passed by both houses and will soon go to the president for signature.

Q. My wife and I are home-tending a claim near here. I am a veteran of World War II. I have three and a half years service. My question is, am I entitled to a guaranteed or insured loan under the G.I. bill as a veteran? J. T. B. B. B. B.

A. It would depend upon the purpose of your loan. Loans may be guaranteed or insured under the G.I. bill to a homestead if the loan is for operating capital for purchase of farm equipment or machinery and all ordinary trading or business purposes. However, loans for construction purposes including reconstruction of the house or other buildings are not available until the veteran acquires such title as will enable him to give valid first lien on the property.

Q. I am a veteran of four and half years. Was discharged in July of 1945. Would I be eligible to take the loan under the G.I. bill if I'm unmarried, but support my mother--D. A. Wells, Nev.

A. Yes, music can be taken under the G.I. bill provided the approved schools in your area list music in their curriculum. Suggest you get in touch with Veterans Administration regional office at Reno to secure a list of approved schools in your area. Then all you need do is to check the list for the school offering the music courses which you want.

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STATE BRIEFS

Within half an hour after it was introduced in the Senate Tuesday a bill giving the Lexington Board of City Commissioners the power to oust the City Manager without cause was put in position for possible passage Thursday.

Parole of five convicts during January—smallest number in years—was shown in records at the secretary of state's office Monday.

The Senate Commerce on Public Health Tuesday afternoon approved three bills for avian influenza and licensing of hospitals in Kentucky.

Kentucky Red Cross chapters aided 7443 persons in responding to 10 disaster appeals during 1947. The annual report submitted to Governor Earle Clements by the American Red Cross said help was given as a result to six fires, a tornado, a flash flood, and in diphtheria and polio outbreaks.

Lexington's burley-tobacco market Tuesday sold 319,722 pounds for \$168,654.87, an average of 53¢ per hundred, the Kentucky Department of Agriculture reported last night. All other Kentucky burley markets have closed for the season.

U. N. Group Sees Partition Failure In Palestine if Armed Forces Absent, More Military Aid to Greece: Truman

U. N. ARMY: Palestine

The problem in Palestine is starkly simple, according to the United Nations commission on Palestine, the spot-survey of Holy Land conditions: The U. N. plan to partition the strife-torn country is foredoomed to failure unless adequate armed force is provided to enforce the partition.

This was what the U. N. group suggested in a strongly worded report: "The commission has decided to refer to the security council the project of providing that armed assistance which alone would enable the commission to discharge its responsibilities."

In short, it was up to the security council to put teeth into its own decision to divide Palestine into independent Arab and Jewish states. But where the council would get any kind of military force was another question. The U. N. charter provides for permanent army, land and air force contingents, but they never have become realities, primarily because of disagreements between Russia and the U. S.

It was, however, agreed, by all odds the most difficult task the U. N. did face during its brief, post-war career. It might mean the death blow of any confidence in the U. N. to preserve the tattered peace.

PENNY SAVED: Diminished

Inflation has had its effect on U. S. citizens not only in their day-to-day living but also with regard to the personal savings that they managed to sock away in the bank.

From 1939 to 1947 Americans had accumulated over \$100 billion in bank deposits, assuming that the dollars saved each year were kept intact. But because of inflationary

price increases the aggregate savings in 1947, actually would have been worth only 123.5 billion dollars in terms of purchasing power.

That (above) the difference between the level of savings at the bank and at the retail store. In the final analysis, the 1947 dollar bought approximately 40 per cent less than the 1939 dollar.

GREECE: Sore Spot

What the President was doing was officially recognizing a fact which the public long has been aware that the 400-million-dollar "Truman doctrine" had been, so far, virtually a complete failure.

The "Truman doctrine," as formulated last spring, had been intended to provide Greece with the military materials and equipment to fend off Communist guerrillas and, incidentally, to furnish some economic aid to help the country toward recovery.

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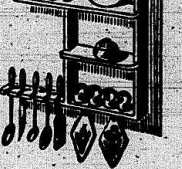

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# Woman's World Bedspread Should Harmonize With Room and Furnishings

By Ella Haley

"NEVER could figure out just what was wrong with my bedroom," said a woman to me the other day. "Until I took it apart piece by piece. The color suddenly dawned on me that the floral print bedspread was making the room look crowded and obscuring everything else."

When the bedspread in this particular room was changed to a conservative solid colored weave in a plain pattern, minus fringes, the room took on an entirely new and really pleasing appearance.

Just as in all rooms in the home, decoration of the bedroom must be carefully planned, keeping in mind the size, exposure, light and other furnishings.

First of all, let's set down some basic principles. If the room is rather dark — those with north and east exposures particularly — you must use light colors in it. If the room is cold in addition to being dark, warm it with yellows, reds and oranges. If the room is warm in feeling, you must try to cool it with tones of blue and green or maroon.

What should you do about size? If the room is small, avoid using heavy, ornate pieces of furniture. This applies particularly to the bed because it is the most important piece of furniture in the bedroom.

Use Simply When You Lack Space

Don't put a heavy oak bed with posters into a room that has ample proportions even if the bed fits the space. It always will be an eye-sore and will make you feel cramped.

Patterned wallpaper as well as patterned spreads and drapes "take a lot of space" and are best left to rooms which have ample size. The same is true of large plaids.

In making a spread with a gathered skirt, allow 90 inches for length for the center and width enough to cover the bed. Mark off 18 inches at one end and burn in the foot. Finish the edges with a hem. The skirt should be made at least 36 inches deep and may be gathered.

You will need from two to two and one-half times the length of the spread for gathering in the skirt. Hem the skirt then gather.

Match Decoration To Furniture

If you are making a bedspread for a very feminine room, use a gray print material, or perhaps an organdy or chintz. You'll find that a good flounce spread goes nicely, and the effect can be carried out to extend to the pillows, which are made of the same material as the spread with a single row of ruffles around them.

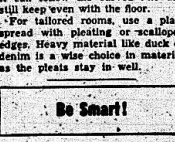
Circular ruffled spreads are attractive, but you need a great deal of yardage as the skirt is cut in a flare.

If you have an 18th century room you may be using a rich heavy material for the spread. Quilted satin spreads are attractive. Sometimes it is possible to buy wide satin quilting and this may be used for the top of the spread. Use matching material and make a gathered skirt.

If you have period furniture, use matching spread of velvet, velveteen or rich brocade. Spread the fabric across the bed and allow for tuck-in at the top. Outline the mattress and the pillows with corded seams and make a gathered skirt long enough at the pillow end so it can follow the curved line and still keep even with the floor.

For tailored rooms, use a plain spread with pleating or scalloped edges. Heavy material like duck or denim is a wise choice in material as the pleats stay in well.

## Feeding Fifty

If your club or church is planning a community social dinner for 50 or more for the purpose of making money, you'll appreciate these tested recipes. The recipes are bound to be tempting to most people, which is an important consideration for dinners of this type. You'll need to do careful planning for both purchasing and preparing, or perhaps you can have a committee work out the donations so there will be more of a return on the dinner.

Have your group choose an able and energetic leader to insure a successful dinner. He should be thoroughly familiar with all the procedures of the menu, and should be able to divide and assign the work properly, as well as to iron out all sorts of details that come up.

Tableware should be checked in advance so there will be enough to cover the order. The same goes for kitchen equipment. Men as well as women will like to see for this community supper so it is appetizing and well balanced.

Baked Ham  
Buttered Green Beans or Peas  
Canned Sweet Potatoes  
Coke Nibs  
Apple Cranberry Sauce Relish  
Rolls  
Pineapple Chiffon Cheese Cake  
In addition to the items listed on the menu, it is desirable to provide coffee, tea and milk as beverages.

Here are the recipes for this dinner. They are carefully planned to serve 50 people.

Baked Ham (Serves 30)  
12 pound smoked ham  
2 cups brown sugar  
1 tablespoon vinegar  
1 tablespoon prepared mustard  
1/2 cup catsup  
Place ham (wrapped in heavy waxed paper or inside wrapper), fat side up in an approved roasting pan. Bake in a slow (350 degree) oven about 1 1/2 hours. About an hour before the ham is done, remove from oven, lift off remaining skin and score fat surface. Mix brown sugar and mustard, add enough vinegar to make a paste. Spread paste over fat surface and bake in a slow (325 degree) oven for about 45 minutes to glaze the surface.

Here are some other glazes which may be used. The amounts are sufficient to cover the surface of one ham:  
ORANGE GLAZE: Mix one cup brown sugar, juice and grated rind of one orange and spread over sliced cranberry and orange slices when serving.  
HONEY OR MOLASSES GLAZE: Use one cup honey or molasses and one cup butter, stud with cloves. Finish baking.  
SPICE GLAZE: Use one cup brown sugar and one cup juice from sliced cranberries, cranberries, ginger pears or pickled peaches. Garnish with the sliced fruit.

For the vegetable, green beans, you may use two No. 10 cans each.

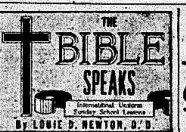

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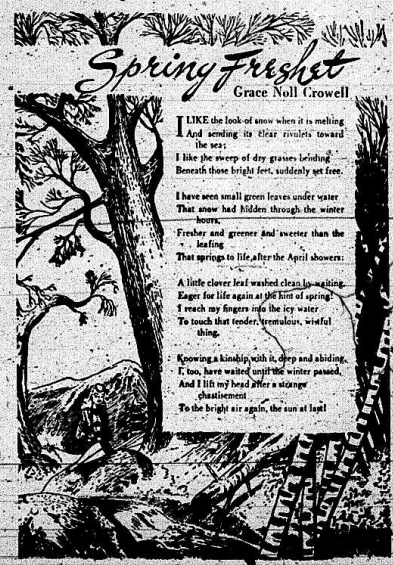
