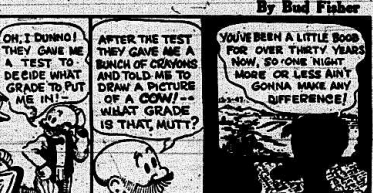

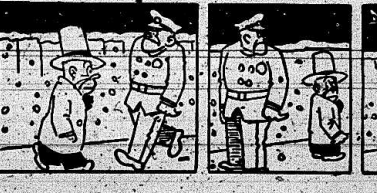

To Re-Model System

BEFORE THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION AT FRANKFORT, KENTUCKY.
A meeting of the Public Service Commission was held on this date. Present: Chairman Charles E. Whitte and Commissioner James H. In the matter of the complaint of the Patrons of the Vernon Telephone Company regarding inadequacy of service furnished in the city of Mt. Vernon, Kentucky.

CASE NO. 1427
ORDER
A verbal complaint by Mr. E. B. Thompson, County Attorney of Rockcastle County, Kentucky, being received, the Public Service Commission on the matter directed its staff to make an investigation of the service being rendered by the Mt. Vernon Telephone Company (hereinafter called the Company), and that on the days of August 25 and 26, 1947. The Staff's report to the Commission as a result of the investigation and inspection indicated that the service rendered by the company at Mt. Vernon, and the communities was inadequate and inefficient. The telephone plant being in a deteriorated condition, central station operation unsatisfactory and quality of transmission very poor. The report also indicated that there were inadequate facilities for long distance calling, causing delays in making long distance telephone calls.

The Commission, in order to see that the public service is necessary required adequate telephone service in the area served by the Company, issued a show cause order on December 19, 1947, to the Mt. Vernon Telephone Company to show cause why it should not correct the inadequate and inefficient service as set out in the Staff's report and furnish adequate service to its patrons in the Mt. Vernon and surrounding communities; and also ordered the Company to appear before the Commission on December 22, 1947, in the Court House in Mt. Vernon, Kentucky, for a public hearing in the matter.

After studying the evidence in this case, the Commission is of the opinion and finds:
1. That the Company did not promptly show cause why it does not render adequate service to its patrons.
2. That the telephone system of the company is very much in need of complete rehabilitation.

3. That the toll facilities of the Company are inadequate for rendering reasonable long distance service, and that a trunk requirement study shows there is a need for one additional at Stanford-Mt. Vernon toll circuit.

Five Nations Pledge Defense

Brussels — Five European nations Wednesday entered into a 50-year treaty to defend their way of life against any aggressor, with arms if necessary. McAlister, Kentucky Manager of the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company, dated February 4, 1948, stating that the company is willing to provide its part of the facilities necessary to carry an additional Stanford-Mt. Vernon toll circuit.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED

That the Company immediately secure the service of a qualified engineer for the purpose of making a survey of the telephone system. After studying the evidence in this case, the Commission is of the opinion and finds:
1. That the Company did not promptly show cause why it does not render adequate service to its patrons.
2. That the telephone system of the company is very much in need of complete rehabilitation.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED

That based upon the survey made by the engineer, the Commission will immediately and pursue with diligence completely rehabilitate its entire system to the extent that:
1. All broken or missing insulators will be replaced.
2. All poles deteriorated or broken at the ground line will be replaced.
3. All necessary tree trimming will be accomplished.
4. All high resistant joints will be eliminated.
5. Splices will be repaired and reconnected.
6. All cable splices will be checked according to good telephone practice.
7. All pulled and deteriorated cable will be replaced.
8. Broken guys will be repaired and where needed, additional guys will be added.
9. All stations will be repaired and reconnected.
10. Service will be restored to subscribers now having telephones, out who have, due to various reasons, been without service.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED

That the Company provide its part of the facilities (Mt. Vernon to Crab Orchard) to create one additional Mt. Vernon-Stanford toll circuit.
IT IS FURTHER ORDERED That the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company provide its part of the facilities (Stanford to Crab Orchard) to create the additional Mt. Vernon-Stanford toll circuit.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED

That the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company, and the first day of each succeeding month thereafter until the rehabilitation of the Company's telephone system is completed, that the Company shall make a detailed report to the Commission and the report to be made by it toward the rehabilitation of its system and the improvement of service.
