DONT CRY "WOLF" FOR EFFECT

There is no danger of the United States running out of oil or gasoline in the foreseeable future. That unequivocal statement was made in mid-March by Don E. Gilman, of the Western Oil and Gas Association.

The facts with which Mr. Gilman substantiates this are of the greatest public interest. Despite all-time record consumption, the total proved oil reserves in this country at the end of last year were nearly 705,000,000 barrels greater than at the end of 1946. And, during 1947, the industry expects to drill 45,000 more wells.

So much for the present. The industry must obviously deal with the possibility that on some future date our crude oil may be largely exhausted, and we may be cut off from foreign fields. Science has produced and is now perfecting the solution to that problem. Oil is hydrocarbon. And hydrocarbons other than petroleum exist in vast quantities in our coal and oil-bearing shale deposits. A proven method exists for converting these solid materials into liquid form. Some authorities believe that such sources of supply may last for more than 2,000 years.

There was considerable misunderstanding of the so-called "oil shortage" in some areas during the winter. In Mr. Gilman's words, that shortage... was dislocation rather than lack.... There has never been a time when there was not enough oil above ground to meet the nation's immediate demand. The problem is to get the oil to where it is needed. And it is a problem which, according to all indications, is being solved.

INSOLENCE SUPREME

Regardless of what happens in existing and anticipated controversies between John L. Lewis and the coal mine operators, the public should have a true understanding of the basic underlying facts.

First of all, the contract which Mr. Lewis and the operators signed is an extremely one-sided document, and the advantage is all on the side of the union. It provides that the miners shall work only if they are "able and willing" - a phrase which is obviously susceptible to any kind of interpretation, thus making a joke out of a so-called contract. The operators have no effective recourse if Mr. Lewis decides, without notice, that his miners have suddenly become either "unable" or "unwilling" to keep on working.

The miners' welfare fund, which provoked the last walk-out, is another example of Mr. Lewis and the miners having their cake and eating it too. Not a penny of it is provided by the workers. Every cent is provided by the operators, in the form of a levy of ten cents on each ton of coal mined. Many authorities believe that if Mr. Lewis' demand for a pension of \$100 a month for retired miners was met, the levy might be forced up to 50 cents a ton - a figure which the operators could not possibly pay without passing it on to the consumer, and thereby worsening coal's competitive position with other fuels and endangering jobs which are dependent on high production and sales.

Finally, whether or not the union has a strong case, it is clear that a great industry, upon which American industrial production is absolutely vitally dependent, is at the mercy of one man. When coal output stops, the effects are felt immediately in steel, electricity, and transportation, and ultimately in all enterprise. For any man to possess that enormous power is a glaring and dangerous weakness in our economic system.

STATE MUST NOT CONTROL DOCTORS

The strongest argument against socialized medicine is not the enormous drain on the taxpayers it would entail, important as that is. It lies in the fact that the profession of medicine, like the practice of the arts and the higher crafts, is almost entirely dependent on individual ambition, ability, and incentive for progress.

The doctor, like the musician or playwright, works in cooperative with others to gain some given end. But this is not the kind of flat, unimaginative mass effort that characterizes the working of a bureaucracy, where mediocrity gets the rewards, and brilliance and enterprise are frowned upon. The individual must be supreme. One of his chief assets is the right to experiment in an atmosphere of freedom. He must be ready to intelligently deal with the new and the uncharted. He cannot be bound by a set of inflexible rules.

When the state runs everything, a man's politics are all important. That, and his ability to earn favor from the bosses, determine the kind of job he gets. But when policies, and patronage determine what doctor shall be chosen for promotion, or what writer or musician shall be published and heard, a shameful decline in standards is the inevitable result - as the Soviet Union so thoroughly proves. In the case of the arts, it forces the people to see inferior plays or read inferior books; in the case of medicine, it costs lives.

There is no relationship quite like that between the doctor and those he serves. The state must not be permitted to destroy it.

Peace and War**

"We must be prepared to pay the price of peace or assuredly we shall pay the price of war."

These words, spoken by President Harry Truman to the U.S. Congress, could be the seeds of the first genuine, effective foreign policy this nation had had for half a century.

Disregarding any political overtones, there might have been in the President's speech, his address to the joint session of Congress, reflected the realization at the top level of government that any successful foreign policy must be based on a balance between commitments abroad and the national security or strength at home available to back such commitments.

By definition, the term "foreign policy" implies that any nation expressing such policy possesses the strength to back it.

Finally, he sought swift passage of the \$3-billion-dollar European Recovery Program.

Western Pact
Lending force to Mr. Truman's scattering of the seeds of foreign policy was the fact that, an hour before he delivered his pronounced, the just-completed five-nation western European pact for common defense against attack had been announced officially.

Under the treaty, Britain, France, Belgium, Luxembourg and the Netherlands pledged one another military aid in the event that any one of them should be attacked.

According to the new "Truman doctrine," the United States would be the principal guarantor of this pact.

Jan Masaryk Took His Life In Protest Against Robots

WASHINGTON—For some time after I heard the tragic news of Jan Masaryk's suicide, a strange memory haunted me.... I saw—A man and woman alone in a darkened room. They are two of the last three human beings on earth. The rest have been destroyed by an army of man-created robots.

But they have revolted and turned against their creators. They are marching on the last human stronghold. They are lighting a trap, you can hear the rhythmic tramp, tramp, tramp of their iron feet. There is a great clatter as they push, insensitive to pain, imposed on him without revulsion, about ring out in the dark as the human beings committed themselves from the horrible wrath of the automatons.

That, you may remember, was the great Czech author who wrote the old Slavic "robot," servitude. We have accepted the word.

The robots, like the Golem of the Hebrew myth, and the Adam of the Palms "yet being unperfected" before his soul was breathed into him, have accepted a gain waiting to be won. Unhappily being played today, may renege Kapke's plea on a stark, wide, as civilization.

Day after day come the frightened echoes from Europe of the fall of war. And yet you write down all the material demands of the diplomats and the rulers of each nation, and put them in the hands of the peoples of the world and tell them: "If you were these you must have war, who would pay the price of war? None. None but a robot without remorse."

The martyrdom of Jan Masaryk helps the Communist cause. I spent some time with the former Czechoslovak ambassador to the United States, Juric Slavik, on the evening of the day when Masaryk's suicide was announced.

Slavik believes that Masaryk felt he could serve his country better dead than as a living prisoner, for the ambassador says he was a prisoner. Masaryk, alive, but with every word and gesture filtered through the censorship of the Communist screen, would become a symbol of the spirit of Czechoslovakia, surrendered, enchained, a noble and historic name and all it has stood for, desecrated and obliterated. Dead, the name, the spirit, live.

The ambassador recalled an episode in which Masaryk, while on his knees down in military history as a credit for 10 minutes with Secretary of State Marshall, secretary of Defense Forrestal and Secretary of the Army Royal, the Senate armed services committee, seemed to be that President Truman's plea for quick action to build up America's military forces.

Just what the three secretaries told the armed services committee was not disclosed, but it was undeniably powerful information.

Best opinion holds that, while Russia is not now seeking war, the Communists have created a kind of "rotating monster" in Europe that at any moment could plunge out of control and involve the world in another conflict.

ABOUT FACE: Expedience

To many persons it looked as though the United States, in denying its support of the Palestine partition plan, had pulled a "Pontius Pilate" on the same scene as when the procurator had washed his hands, but quite 2,000 years ago to sanction the Crucifixion.

It was ironic that the American government withdrawing support from the partition plan undoubtedly the death blow to that plan which never would have been adopted by the U.S. in the first place if it had not been for American pressure and influence.

Thompson attributed the continuing expansion to the heavy influx of workers from rural areas, rather than to any increase in the birth rate among city dwellers.

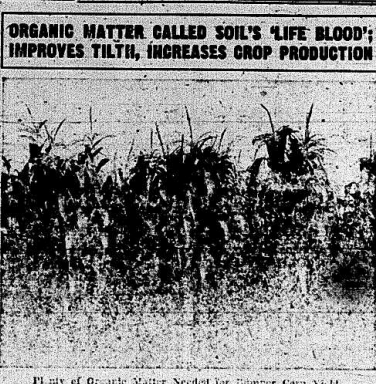

Plots of Organic Matter Needed for Higher Corn Yields.

CHICAGO — Organic matter is called "President Roosevelt" in an advertisement from public lands by the U.S. Dept. of the Interior, United States Forest Service.

Livestock's Choice of Fertilized Pasture Proves Value of Soil Building Program



Fertilized Pastures Promote Better Health, Greater Weight Gains.

CHICAGO—Farm animals can teach human beings a thing or two about the value of soil rebuilding, declares a statement made public here by the Middle West Soil Improvement Commission.

"Cattle, hogs and horses will invariably choose feeding areas where the soil has been fertilized," the statement says. "This fact has been demonstrated in studies by researchers of state agricultural colleges as well as by the experience of farmers themselves."

"The animal's choice represents nature's own test of the most effective weight gains and more abundant reproduction."

As an example of how cows show their instinctive preference for fertilized pasture, the statement cites the experience of Frank Van Winkle, a Huntington county, Indiana, dairyman.

"On grass-legume seedings, Van Winkle fertilized with 200 pounds per acre of 12-12-4," the statement points out. "On his permanent pasture he has used the equivalent of 125 pounds of 20-20-20 per acre of phosphate."

"Check strips have had no plant food. This comparison could be made with the fertilized pasture. Van Winkle says that his cows know the difference between the check strips and the fertilized pasture. They shun the check strips. They stay right on the fertilized stands that give them needed proteins, minerals and vitamins."

after the evening meal. But taken under identical conditions and rate, this quantity of alcohol would produce much higher blood alcohol in a person weighing 100 pounds than in a person weighing 200 pounds.

The late Dr. Raymond Pearl of Johns Hopkins medical school reported that moderate drinkers live as long as do total abstainers. On the other hand, heavy or so-called excessive drinkers shorten their life span, evidently through the action of alcohol.

In regard to the immediate and temporary action of alcohol (the degree of inebriety) there are considerable individual variations in tolerance. But it is not yet known whether persons having low tolerance suffer chronic injury more readily than that can be said at present to be the average normal adult. Possible chronic injuries from the amounts of alcohol mentioned have not yet been proved or clearly separated from hereditary factors in the organ potentials. From the inevitable effects of disease from accidents, from the strain of living and from the aging processes."

Science Dispels Leprosy Taboos

Effort Launched to Erase Fallacies Prevailing For Centuries.

CARVILLE, LA. — In an effort to dispel the fallacies, misconceptions and superstitions which have surrounded the disease for 6,000 years, an educational campaign has been launched to acquaint the

Public with the true facts regarding leprosy. Sponsored by the committee of officials of the U. S. Marine hospital, the government-operated, national leproarium here in Carville.

Among the initial steps in divorcing leprosy from its ancient background, medical superstition, and present lack of knowledge on the part of the public is an attempt to foster use of the name Hansen's disease, which is preferred by leprosy victims. The name is derived from C. Arntson Hansen, Norwegian physician who in 1874 discovered the germ which causes the disease.

The age-old dread usually engendered by the name leprosy usually can be traced to the Bible and the 13th chapter of Leviticus. The leprosy of the Bible, it is pointed out, was a generic term encompassing seven or eight contagious diseases. Research has demonstrated that leprosy was brought to Rome by Pompey's legions returning from the campaign in Egypt in the middle of the last century B. C., indicating that the disease described in the Old Testament could not have been leprosy or it would have spread through Asia Minor and Greece and thence to Rome many centuries earlier.

Old Fallacies Decried

Modern science has proved that Hansen's disease is the least communicable of all communicable diseases, even under conditions of prolonged and intimate contact. Since isolation of the bacillus by Hansen, hundreds of attempts have been made to grow it in artificial media, but none has been successful. Attempted inoculations of animals also have proven unsuccessful. In more than 145 recent cases, no patients have been able to infect himself or other human volunteers by attempted inoculation of the germ.

Far from being the fifth disease, the "unclean" disease, the affliction or curse of God which it has been pictured for centuries, Hansen's disease is merely a germ disease, the same as tuberculosis. Moreover, Hansen's disease is less communicable than tuberculosis, and whereas tuberculosis is hereditary, Hansen's disease is not.

The method of transmission is still the stumbling block in effective control. Researchers are checking the numerous theories regarding the mode of transmission, ranging through soil composition, mosquitoes, roaches and almost all pests affected by DDT.

Estimate of Cases

Estimating the number of cases of Hansen's disease in the United States range from 1,200 to 3,000. The average number of cases under treatment annually at the national

leproarium here since 1921 is 324. Other victims are being treated by private physicians, one dermatologist in Texas having about 100 cases. The Carville leproarium, a modern institution, now has about 300 patients. Thirty-four patients were discharged as arrested cases in 1946.

Sensational results in the curing of Hansen's disease have been noted since the start of treatment with the sulfone drugs was commenced at the leproarium. Promin, diastone and other promiscuous have proven effective in arresting the disease.

"The stigma is worse than the disease," Carville officials insist, adding that "the real tragedy is that it is not generally known that Hansen's disease is only a mildly communicable disease, is not inherited, tends to cure itself spontaneously under favorable conditions and can be prevented easily."
