Three Diseases Take High Toll of Turkeys

Heaviest Loss Occurs During Growing Period

Nearly a third of all turkeys hatched are lost during the growing period. This statement is based on findings of Utah Agricultural college survey.

Of considerable importance to a control program is the fact that the three diseases known to be the greatest killers of poultry--paratyphoid infection, pullorum disease and infectious sinusitis, which may be transmitted through the egg from parent to the offspring--cause 81 per cent of the brooder loss.

If a grower starts with a healthy, vigorous poult, the job of keeping the bird healthy is relatively simple. This is the first problem for a grower.

Active turkey producer is to buy poult from hatcheries that have a reputation for producing healthy poults. As it may be impossible for a single grower to know the poult source, cooperative effort may be helpful in investigating the breeder and hatchery.

Proper housing and proper use of brooding equipment are essential to health of the poults. Pasteurized healthy individuals from coming in contact with the infectious agents of disease. All week-old poults should be kept separate from the healthy fowls and strict sanitary practices must be maintained during the brooding period.

Early Spraying Advised For Black Cherry Aphid

Sprays applied before the buds break, say insect specialists, are more consistent in controlling the black cherry aphid than sprays made after the buds are open.

Feeding of the black cherry aphid, it present in large numbers, affects the size and flavor of the fruit. Also, a secretion known as "honeydew" produces a sticky and unattractive appearance of the fruit, especially if it is to be sold as fresh fruit. Development of a sooty fungus in the honeydew may contribute further to the unattractive appearance of the cherries. Sweet cherries are more commonly infested than sour cherries.

The farm woodland is paying off. That long neglected group of trees that stands on the back forty and which once was eyed with a resentful attitude because it occupied land that could far better be devoted to grazing, now becomes a definite and valuable asset.

It is one that can be quickly converted into cash. To the owner has come the realization that the farm will produce something more than grain, root crops, pasture or dairy products. Trees also are a crop, and a paying crop, even on the poorer types of soil where intensive agriculture is an impossibility.

Prompt Action Required To Relieve Cattle Bloat

Removal of the gases from the rumen is the primary subject in treatment of bloat in cattle. If bloat has just started, the animal should be forcibly exercised and the distended abdomen massaged. The animal with the clenched fist to bring about belching of the gases from the stomach. A wooden bag can be placed in, and moved, the mouth of the bloated animal.

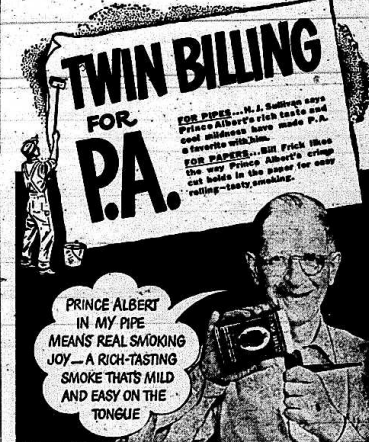

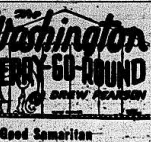

Woman's World
If Social Calendar Is Busy,
Make Your Glamour Clothes

Girls who are getting out of school inevitably find that their social calendars full to overflowing these days and this calls for rather a stable investment in what they refer to as glamour fashions.

No average family budget can stand the strain of this because there is necessarily an outlay for clothing for other members of the family. But if mother and daughter take to the needle or sewing machine, they can turn out two or three garments that will do the trick.

A formal may look especially tricky but for those of you who never have sewed one, the news is a wonderful surprise. It's much easier than you think.

First of all, the fabrics you choose are among the easiest to sew. Organza, eyelid and even tulle just sit down to go where you wish them to while you run them on the machine or let the needle traverse the penciled or basted lines.

If you are fortunate enough to choose one of the simpler designs and ask someone who knows whether the material you are working with will let itself be run through the machine, that's a good idea.

Stay away from severe-fitted dresses that look deceptively easy. They require a fitting skill that demands years of experience.

Don't Let Full Skirts Or Ruffles Trouble You

If full skirts and ruffles look easy to tackle, relax. Full skirts are easy, as you'll understand when you run a basting stitch through the material and try to gather it.

Ruffles are easy, too, and if you have a ruffler attachment on the sewing machine, these are true simplicity. If you're the sweet feminine type, you'll find that ruffles are just the thing this season, but don't attempt the really elaborate treatments of these—not so much because the ruffles are hard to make, but because it's sometimes difficult to insert them when they're placed in many triangles along the back of the skirt.

However, ruffling trimming along the hem, or around the sleeves or necklines can be managed easily. They should be hemmed before you ruffle, of course.

Swifty, taffeta and falls are among the materials that are to be using. Neither of them is difficult to handle if you are careful about basting, and this is extremely essential as they tend to slip.

If your budget can't afford a formal, it would be simplicity itself to make one of those long, all-skirts, and then to buy an intricate Gibson girl blouse to complete the picture.

Are pretty in eyelid or organza. This type of skirt—run to five yards wide, with four or five rows of gathers at the waist. It should be finished with a firm belt.

The first frothy toping for this skirt may be of net which is attached closely to the bodice. Finish with straps of wide ribbon or a ruffle band.

The second toping may be made of taffeta. This should be chosen in your best color. The same material may be made into bows and tacked with tiny stitches to the skirt.

The third top may be made of netting the front and sides to give you a V-neckline. A large flower worn at the shoulder is all that is needed to complete the costume.

Watch those dolman-type sleeves in many variations and degrees of ruffling and flaring. They are counter-balance to wide skirts. These sleeves are particularly effective in light-weight weaves and open weaves.

Glamour Frock



With commencement parties and dances ahead, you'll want variety in glamour clothes. You can solve the problem by taking to your sewing machine and avoid running into budget difficulties.

The slip does not have to be as full as the skirt, but it must be of closely woven heavy material.

Select Simple Trimming For Formal Dress

There is a variety of trimmings to use for dressy dresses and there are several types practical for home sewing.

Applique is one of them, and if you can stitch neatly, there is nothing nicer for a bouffant frock of organza. Use flowers that will go well with the color of your fabric and use them on the wide, full skirt.

If you like shirring, this may be done on the gathering foot or ruffler attachment. Enter your material, and it's assured first whether it will hang well, whether it will be limp or bouffant before you ruffle, of course.

Bows, of course, may be used on youthful frocks and are very effective. Finished ribbon, carefully laid and tacked, can lend a dramatic air to a bouffant frock.

If you have chosen one of the ankle length frocks, a full taffeta slip with a ruffled edging peeks underneath in all the fashion interest you actually need. Ribbons are being used, run through eyelid on slip trimmings to give them an old-fashioned air.

Your wrap may be a short coat or one of the lovely pastels. When you select it, make certain it will be of good daytime use.

WHITE'S THE THING

It's a white-blossom season, but if you think all of them are trimmed with ruffles, look again. There are distinctly tailored blouses in sleek fabrics such as poplin, broadcloth and linen. You'll see sleeve tucks, gathered cuffs and the wide dolman sleeves, standing collars or noes at all.

Do Smart!

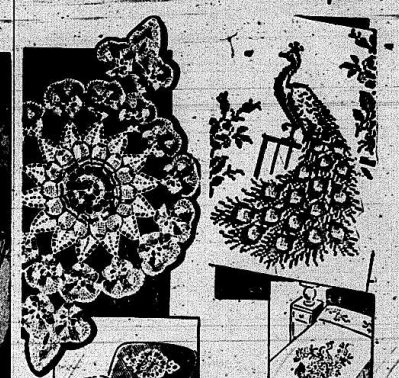

AN OUNCE OF INSULIN

The idea has been advanced that reduction of the nation's livestock population would be one way to conserve grain for human use. This may have a superficial appeal, but an examination of the facts produces a very different conclusion.

There are some 1,905,000,000 acres of land in the United States. Of this, 943,000,000 acres—one-half—can be for food production only by pasturing and grazing. It produces feeds that are not suitable for human consumption, and that can be utilized only for livestock.

Furthermore, though it is not generally known, an unjustified drop in our livestock population and slaughtering would create a serious medical problem. As an example, it takes the pancreatic glands of 7,500 hogs of 1500 cattle to make one ounce of insulin, which will provide a sufferer from diabetes with 40 units a day for forty years. Insulin and other glandular medicines are available only because the meat packers save the glands for pharmaceutical purposes. Without an adequate animal population, dangerous shortages of these vital drugs would develop.

This country needs more and more meat—and it needs the by-products. Livestock raising and processing are the backbone of our agricultural economy. They have been developed to their present peak efficiency in a free market. The inexorable pressures of supply and demand and competition have given American consumers the most scientifically progressive meat industry—from feed lot to dinner table—that has ever been known. This is an incontrovertible fact of the greatest significance.

Total control under the most powerful governments has never resulted in such concrete advancement, nor, in making goods of all kinds so readily available to the people.

TRUTH STRANGER THAN FICTION

The public knows that the Federal Bureau of Investigation is a great deterrent to crime because of the efficiency with which it runs down lawbreakers. But too few know what an aid it is in noncriminal investigations that affect people in many walks of life.

In the mammoth files of the Identification Division of the Bureau in Washington, there are more than 107,000,000 sets of fingerprints. Over 80% of such prints are in the non-criminal file which includes members of the armed forces, government employes, persons fingerprinted in applying

who voluntarily had their fingerprints recorded as a means for jobs in important national defense plants, and persons of identification.

A typical case is that of an old man who in April, 1946, asked the Los Angeles Police Department for assistance in locating two sons and a daughter from whom he had not heard since 1903. He believed his sons had served in World War I. An appeal was made to the FBI. In its files it found fingerprint cards bearing names and dates of birth reasonably agreeing with the information furnished by the father, together with information as to places of employment of the individuals in 1942 and 1943. The father was thus enabled to contact his sons, through whom he located the missing daughter. Three months after he first called on the police, he gratefully acknowledged the help that had been given him.

This closed one of the thousands of incidents in which the FBI has helped in the identification or location of missing persons.
