Jam Looper Beetle Is Voracious Enemy of Potatoes

Ranking as the most serious threat to the growers of potatoes and other vegetables is the Colorado potato beetle, which is prevalent throughout many areas of the country.



The eggs hatch in a few days into voracious larvae which, after feeding for about 10 days, leave the plants and enter the soil to complete their development.

To rid the potatoes, tomatoes, egg plants, peppers, ground cherries and other plants of the Colorado potato beetle, dip or spray with paris green, calcium arsenate or cryolite.

Barn Cleaners

Barn cleaners should have all mechanical parts of simple design, that operate easily to clean. It is possible to thoroughly clean the average dairy barn by use of mechanical barn cleaners.

Attack on Vegetables

With the first reasonably warm days, insects will make their advent. These will be the green worm and lice on cabbage and the Colorado beetles and black fleabeetles on potatoes.
