THERE are many millions who take either a keen or a casual interest in what happens day by day in baseball. But these have nothing like the passionate interest some three or four million golfers have in the minutest score.

Baseball's major interest belongs to spectators. Golf's major interest belongs to the players and competitors. Golf is one of the greatest health-making and training games of all time for the multitude.

Baseball is one of the greatest fun games or mental relaxations for the crowd, minus any physical side. The golfer's interest is largely personal. "How can I chop off a stroke or two," asks Bill Vardon, "is it a sin that I should, Jack Smith, who makes me play him even?"

There are things you can do or at least try. For example here are tips that come direct from Harry Vardon:

"Vardon gave me a great tip," Walter Hagen told me one day. "It was about playing shots from heavy rough or from the sand in bunkers. I used to go into the rough or walk right to a bunker and pick it up as if it were a matter of life or death. It meant power."

"Don't do that," Vardon told me. "Grip" the club lightly on your hands. Get the full play of your hands and wrists. Eliminate tension, as far as you can. Most people in trouble, in rough or in the bunker, nearly always develop too much tension. This is the spot where you can't afford tension. Just ease up.

Another tip from the same years ago from a British publisher whose short game was phenomenal. "I'll tell you who helped me," he said. "It was Vardon on how to pick out a spot or a target just an inch ahead of the ball. This helped me to chip or swing through the ball. It prevented stalling or jabbing."

"Vardon is an amazing man," the publisher said, "on the simple side of the game. He doesn't use a straight left arm. He crosses his left elbow, bends it. But his left arm is straight at impact. That is when it counts. That is where almost everything that counts takes place. At impact."

On chip shots you might try the Vardon system—picking out a spot an inch beyond the ball as the target.

**Golf Is Personal**

Golf is your game. To a large degree the baseball and boxing are someone else's game. Golf is the playing game. Tennis is a playing game. The others are spectator games.

How do you pare away that extra stroke or two--maybe three or four strokes? Here are just a few more tips:

**BEN HOGAN:** "At the finish of my swing, the right hand is in control. The left hand is important until the final smash."

"But I can give you another good tip. It concerns putting. Most puts are missed because there is knee-and-body motion when you stroke the ball. I concentrate on keeping my knees as there can be no knee-or-body motion. Putting belongs entirely to the hands and wrists. Keep the body still and then stroke the ball. But concentrate on stroking the ball."

**GENE SARAZEN:** "The big weakness in golf is the tension most golfers develop in the low weeks. They say golf is not a game of motion. It is with me. I hit a drive. Then as I walk up to the ball I get me up my mind on the club's need. That won't take over a second or two."

"It's the same way on the green. Don't hurry. But don't get tied up. Keep moving. When you've decided on the club you need, forget everything else. Concentrate on that club only. But never hurry any swing."

"Here is an excellent tip. Never hurry any swing or any part of a swing. You can loaf on your backswing. But it is more important to loaf on your downswing."

**Delay in Downsaving**

"In my opinion," Tommy Armour has told me several times, "the delay in the downsaving is the most single important feature in golf. This was a big factor in Vardon's swing, the finest swinger I ever saw play. It was a big feature in Bobby Jones' swing in his later campaign. I mean after 1922. Hagen was never in a hurry. He was a magnificent liner."

"I wonder how many golfers know they start their downsaving before they finish their backswing? They simply can't wait to hit the ball. They get about two-thirds back and then the downsaving starts."

"I would say this is the biggest common weakness in golf. The main idea is not to hurry anything. You can loaf on your backswing--you can loaf on your downswing. Not too much, but enough to keep everything smooth. Don't ever rush that downsaving. That even goes

### Cpl. Carl Baker Is Shot At Corbin

Is In Knoxville Hospital For Treatment  
Two men, including Cpl. Carl Baker of Mt. Vernon, a State highway officer, were shot and wounded critically Tuesday afternoon at a cafe in North Corbin.  
The man man was identified by Laurel County Sheriff Stanley Blankenship as John McVay, brother of the cafe operator.  
Sheriff Blankenship said he and Baker had gone to the cafe to serve two warrants on Jess McVay, the operator, a few moments before the shooting.  
The sheriff said Jess McVay had been arrested and was outside with the two officers when John McVay opened fire on Baker. The patrolman was shot once in the back and once in the left arm, the sheriff said.  
Blankenship said the bullets came from inside the cafe and that he returned the fire. John McVay was shot once in the head and once in the body. He died later in a Corbin hospital.  
During the excitement Jess McVay escaped but surrendered to Sheriff Blankenship and requested Baker to accompany him to help make the arrest.  
Baker, reported slightly improved today, was removed to Knoxville, for treatment by a bone specialist.

**ORDINANCE NO. 210**  
THE MOUNT VERNON CITY COUNCIL ORDAINS AS FOLLOWS: It shall be unlawful to park any motor vehicle or trailer on the corner of Main Street, which connects Main and Spring Street and is bounded on the east by the property of J. **ORDINANCE NO. 209**

All unpaid taxes, on and after March 1st, 1949, shall be subject to six percent penalty. All taxes, real, personal and intangible, covered by this levy become due September 1st, 1948. Heidelberg, Spared by War, Draws Crowds of Tourists

G. L. who surged eastward with General Patch's 7th Army in the spring of 1945 will have no trouble recalling Heidelberg. It was the one stable German city undamaged by bombing.

Seat of Germany's oldest university (1386), Heidelberg was spared by RAF andAAF even as England's Oxford and Cambridge escaped the Luftwaffe's fury, notes National Geographic society.

Tourists flocking to Heidelberg in peace-time admire the crumbling medieval castle on the fire-damaged hill behind the town. Built to grandeur in the 12th and 13th centuries, its return to dust was hastened by men of Louis XIV and by lightning. Heidelberg's World War II ruins, however, consist of a lone bridge demolished by retreating Germans.

This is the same Heidelberg that ranks as a gay and friendly place with thousands of Americans who never have been east of Jones beach, Long Island. To them, Heidelberg is where the tuxedo and democratic Student Prices of a few years ago took seminars in fencing, steel-swinging and love-making.

A city of 80,000 in 1939, Heidelberg has become much more crowded since the war's end, due to the influx of uprooted thousands from Germany's east. Heidelberg university, glorified by Mark Twain and Longfellow, lies at the heart. Landmarks among its buildings are the library of 900,000 volumes and the student prices.

Woman's World Proper Technique Will Make Washdays Cheerful and Cool

By Erta Haley

A WOMAN said to me recently, "There's nothing to washing clothes. People have done it for thousands of years and surely they know how."

That may be true, but many people have never seen a washing done properly and, as it is with many simple tasks, there's always a right way.

Many women, for example, do not sort their clothes. In fact, they've never heard of such nonsense! Don't they all go through the machine? Yes, they do, but if they come out the lighter or darker shade of gray, well then, they simply didn't sort the machine long enough or they were short of soap!

One of the common faults in using a machine for washing is unloading. You must get the proper load in to have best results. You can simplify the laundering problem a lot just by sorting the clothes and running them through in the following order.

The least soiled things like bed linens are run through first. Naturally we assume that you change weekly and linen is not allowed to get very dirty.

If table linens are less soiled run them through first, then bed linens. Shirts and light colored clothes with perhaps a few towels make up the third load.

Heavy articles such as rugs or mats go in last. Do not run too many at one time.

Great All Bleaches Before Laundering

Clothing with stains or clothing which needs to be bleached needs attention before washing. Check over the stain situation and remove these. Rinse thoroughly before washing.

When you use a bleach, make certain this is rinsed thoroughly before you put it in to wash. Also be certain not to get the bleach on your hands while you work.

Certain articles of clothing and household articles are best done by hand since they require such gentle handling. In this class are included heavy articles such as rugs or mats and accessories such as the

And proper hanging, gloves, shoes and pieces of neckwear.

These are best done weekly on a day other than the regular laundry if there are a lot of them. Many of these, like neckwear, hose and gloves, can be given a daily rinsing in the wash bowl.

The recipe for doing them is somewhat similar: Gentle sudsy water with gentle squeezing and handling and absence of rubbing or wringing.

Use clear, cooling water for rinsing out the last piece of soap.

Stretch gently into shape. This saving means no wringing, no wringing and makes neckwear easier to press.

When washing fine things take off rings and jewelry and file broken nails so you won't injure the fabric.

Wash Frequently Enough To Keep Clothes Bright

Materials may have a high wearability rating, but you should wash everything before it is so bogged down with dirt that it is impossible to get clean.

When you launder bed linens, never add chemical bleaches while the linens are in the tub. Soak and apply a bleach when essential in a separate bucket or pan. Add soap when you first fill the tub, not then the clothes are already in it.

Some people launder clothes so carefully that they make them last years. What about your sheets, for example?

Give Good Care For Linen Wear

Sheets never should be washed until they are in shreds. They won't need intense washing if you change weekly. Give them a blue rinse, if they're white sheets, in the last water. Dry white sheets in the sun, straight, rather than doubled on the line if possible. This smooths out wrinkles and you can fold and iron them easily.

If you live where it's clean, dry sheets is the old-fashioned way, spreading them on the lawn to give them an intense whiteness and sweet fragrance.

Keep colored sheets away from direct sunlight. Hang them in the shade of a tree when possible.

The trick to ironing sheets properly is to keep the hems straight and even. On pillow cases, work away from the closed corners.

All sheets should be folded uniformly. Twice lengthwise and at many times the other way as needed. Set tabs on sheets as to size so you'll know which ones to pull out for use.

Pile clean clothing on bottom of pile; take things as needed from the top and everything will wear evenly.

Entertain Simply but Attractively (See recipes below)

Summer Parties ARE YOU PLANNING to do more than your share of entertaining during the warm weather? You'll want to tuck these tips into a safe place to help make the refreshment problem easy.

Make parties easy on yourself by working in advance, and thus keeping yourself cool and collected at least a half an hour before guests arrive.

FOR BRIDAL or baby showers, or for simple commencement party serving, a plate of sandwiches and an ice cream beverage are perfect foods. You'll like these:

CHOCOLATE MILK (Makes 1 Pint) 3 1/2 cups unsweetened chocolate 1 cup water 3/4 cup sugar 1/4 teaspoon salt

1/2 cup heavy cream, whipped 1/2 cup chocolate and water in saucepan and cook until thick. Use low heat and stir frequently. Add sugar and salt, bringing mixture to a boil. Let cool. Some fish, fruit and vegetables are marinated, that is soaked in dressings and marinated with other ingredients and serving to increase their tang and flavor. When marinating is called for in a recipe, let marinade for an hour or so.

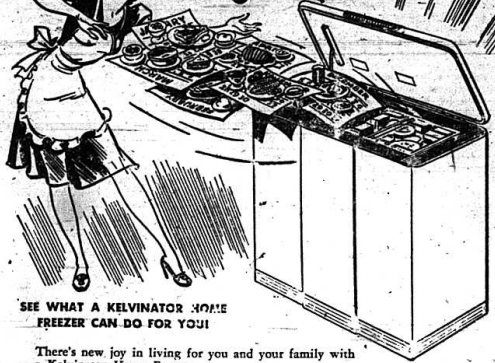
