known sulfa drugs in stopping losses.
Further research proved that the
drug in generally last content

treated with sulfa.
This chemical is as yet available
only in small quantities, and still is
high in price. Even so, the amount
required to be effective against coccidions is so small that the cost of
treatment is less than with the sulfa
drugs. Before long, products containing this new chemical will be
available to poultry raisers on a
less limited scale.
