Uneasy Truce Prevails in Palestine; No Talks With Russia, Truman Says; Draft Machinery Set to Begin Work

HOLD FIRE

Still No Peace

For a little while the dove of peace drifted over Palestine...

At best the United Nations-supervised truce agreement was a fruitless and uneasy affair...

Count Folke Bernadotte, U.N. truce negotiator, was investigating the accusations, but it looked very much as though another security council executive order might be unloved, unmonored and unobeyed.

Actually, it is difficult to see how any synthetically imposed truce could succeed in Palestine. There are no basic grounds upon which a genuine interruption of hostilities could rest.

And more important, each side is fanatically opposed to modifying its demands: Israel is determined to retain its sovereignty and to have unlimited immigration of Jews into the state.

Thus, there is little confidence in the security council's truce plan and its power to effect peace. And that pessimism was heightened by the knowledge that no U.N. cease-fire edict has worked yet.

Aside from the seriousness of the struggle for Palestine itself, deepest significance of the affair lay in the fact that it is raising serious questions about the future of the United Nations.

Pressure of world opinion—which is all the U.N. security council can bring to bear, lacking both military teeth and the power to bring economic sanctions against offending nations—apparently is not going to be enough, at least in the case of Palestine.

One inference which may be drawn is that the U.N. will need more power of one kind or another before it can prevail against the selfish of blind, militant nationalism that has hurled the world into two major wars already in this century.

PRESIDENT: About Russia

For a moment the political whirlwind has been using on congress during his western tour. President Truman issued a major pronouncement of U.S. foreign policy, bounded on all sides by an indictment of Russian tactics, in a speech at Berkeley, Calif.

His address was the clearest cut answer thus far made to the recent spurious but widely publicized Soviet offer to talk over Russian-American differences and the issues of the cold war.

Although the Soviet overture pattern had been made as a last-ditch effort to derail the European recovery program and also slow down

Veterans Housing Bill

MICHIGAN'S CONGRESSMAN JESSE WOLCOTT, who has been juggling the housing bill, thought he would show them the way to a veteran by calling two witnesses to speak for the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

He did this despite the fact that he had a telegram in his pocket officially repudiating the two witnesses. Signed by Meris Hopper, Michigan Republican commander, the telegram read:

"George Lyle and Arthur Greig purported to represent Michigan delegates to the VFW on your committee hearings. No one but myself is authorized to speak for VFW in Michigan on any subject."

Deliberately ignoring this protest from the VFW commander, Wolcott in effect deceived the public by putting Greig and Lyle on the VFW on his house bill. He also failed to mention that Greig and Lyle for a long time have been public housing for war vets. He also failed to mention that Greig and Lyle are long time in Detroit.

However, Representative Hale Boggs of Louisiana, himself a veteran, was not so easily deceived. He called Lyle for a long time for public housing. Knowing the answer was "no," he asked the other witness, "Interrupt Boggs. But the Louisiana parliamentarist:

"I insist on an answer to my question as to whether the national VFW has endorsed this bill—yes or no."

Lyle finally had to admit that the Veterans of Foreign Wars favored passage of the housing bill and that he and Greig were speaking only for themselves. Chairman Wolcott looked very sleek.

Army-Navy Unification

THE GREATEST ARGUMENT in favor of army-navy unification was pooling of supplies. It was estimated that the taxpayers could save an estimated \$100 million if the army and navy bought their supplies together instead of bidding against each other.

However, Secretary of Defense Forrestal, supposedly a business man, hasn't even accomplished this—despite the fact that he knew from past war experiences how great this was.

The waste that has resulted from this lack of uniformity is astronomical. For example, 30 million dollars worth of uniforms were purchased by the army in 1942—more to last for 10 years.

Yet the following week another order was placed for 30 million dollars worth of uniforms—because the army had to stock different types. As a result, army warehouses are piled high with uniforms that varied only slightly from each other, maybe no more than a prong spaced differently.

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FIRST AID to the AILING HOUSE by Roger C. Whitman

QUESTION: We have mended our house, but the roof is still a leak, and the floor is slightly rough; how can we make it smooth without redoing it?

ANSWER: Go over the rough places with a hand of fine steel wool moistened with turpentine. This will dull the finish, but you can touch it up with a little varnish.

QUESTION: After removing the present paint from our woodwork, could I stain it and then apply varnish?

ANSWER: You can do so if you wish, but the trend seems to be towards light-colored enamel for woodwork rather than a dark varnish. Dark woodwork makes a room gloomy looking.

QUESTION: My silver salt caskers are spotted with black marks, made by the salt. How can these spots be removed?

ANSWER: Silver spotted by salt can best be cleaned and brightened by a Jeweler or silversmith.

Both roses competed with the best new varieties of the nation's leading rose growers during two-year trials in 18 official test gardens.

Judged on the qualities of the ideal rose, Forty-niner and Tallyho achieved near perfect scores and demonstrated that they could flourish in all parts of the country.

Forty-niner is probably the most brilliantly hued bi-colored rose ever introduced. Its outstanding feature is the color of its petals—a rich yellow outside which contrasts and yet harmonizes with a vivid red inside.

The yellow color is most evident in the bud which is a chrome yellow, sometimes overlaid with pink. This changes to straw yellow in the open bloom. The inside surface of the petals is a brilliant red which turns cherry red as the blossom opens.

Tallyho, also bi-colored, has an unusual tint that is entirely new to roses. Its coloring varies according to the weather and planting location.

While the outside of the petals flares from crimson to scarlet, red, its inside surface exhibits shades of shades of pink including Tyrian rose, China rose, glaucous pink and nevrose rose.

(See directions below)

Canning Time
IT'S TIME to roll up those leftover greens and start taking out canning equipment. The corn is sweet and tender, the pea pods are full and green, and carrots are still in that nice, crisp, eating stage.

It's not a good idea to wait too long before putting up vegetables because the produce gets too old and, as you know, canning means preserves, it works no wrinkles smooth or restores no color to old vegetables.

When you want a good product from the can, start with superior material. That means fresh from the garden produce, two hours from the market.

Asparagus should be tender, green and freshly cut. If possible, cut when it is no more than five inches tall so the ends of the stalks will have a minimum of woody fiber.

Only freshly picked green beans should be used as they dry easily upon standing. If you pick your own, get them after the dew is off. Shapely, beautifully green ones can be canned whole.

Lima beans should be almost tender and freshly cut. If possible, cut when it is no more than five inches tall so the ends of the stalks will have a minimum of woody fiber.

Young beets, the size of a golf ball, are ideal for canning. Be careful not to break the skin or tap the vegetable's heart in order to preserve the color.

ONLY SWEET CORN can be used for canning. To select the best, run your thumb a finger's length sharply into the corn kernel. If the milk is thin and sweet, the corn is perfect for canning.

Carrots, when right for canning, are sweet and tender. The young carrots which are about one-fourth of an inch in diameter make the best canned product.

In canning greens, select only tender young produce with undamaged leaves, and have them freshly picked or at least as fresh as possible. Don't use old produce with large tough stems and midribs.

Peas will not wait for canning because it takes only a few hours to develop on the right stage, which is tender, sweet and slightly immature, to the point where they are starchy and not yet ready to eat.

PLAN TO HAVE all canning equipment ready by the time you go after your produce so that you can bring it into the house and start canning at once.

If you canned corn has a brownish cast this usually is due to caramelization. Prevent this by using juicy corn, plenty of water and correct processing.

Beets which do not have an even distribution of coloring usually will give a mottled color if packed and precooked for five minutes before canning. They reabsorb color when handled this way.

Choosing the vegetable carefully and careful handling will give desired results in home-canning.

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BBBEE SPEAKS THE LOUISE BENTON LECTURE

Micah, A Prophet of Israel

Lesson for July 4, 1948

WE BEGIN a new series of studies this quarter—a series of lessons based on less known Bible characters that are sure to offer us. Such a character is found in Micah, about whom we learn in 1 Kings 22:1-40.

Abah, king of Israel, ordered an expedition to recover the city of Ramoth in Gilead, which the Syrians had taken. He invited Jehoshaphat, king of Judah, to join him. Abah trusted upon his court prophets to predict victory; but Micah, the prophet of God, whom Abah had shut up in prison when he was summoned, at the insistence of Jehoshaphat, told Abah the truth—the unpleasant truth—which subsequent events verified.

TRUTH DISREGARDED Abah scorned the words of Micah, and ordered him thrust back into prison. But scarcely had the prophet of God been thrust again into prison, until Abah was bleeding to death by the sword.

Men not only take their own lives in their hands when they disregard the words of God, but they bring grief to countless others. Had Abah heeded the words of truth which Micah proclaimed, Abah might have lived. Indeed, had Abah heeded the words of truth, he might have recovered Ramoth, and made peace.

Truth may appear forever on the scaffold, wrong forever on the throne, but time always proves a hard taskmaster to the man who regards wrong instead of truth.

THE SOURCE OF TRUTH GOD is the source of truth—all the lesson of the lesson. Note the words of the golden text, "As the Lord liveth, what the Lord said unto me, that will I speak," said Micah.

Let us remember that it was God speaking through his prophet. Abah could not have doubted that Micah was speaking with God, for he had told him to speak. But Abah would not have heard the truth. He wanted to hear pleasing words that would encourage him in his evil plan.

God speaks the first and the last word on every subject, because God is truth. "If am the truth," said Jesus. And he went on to say, "He shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free."

THE PENALTY OF DISOBEYING THE TRUTH TERRIBLE, indeed, was the penalty which Abah suffered for disregarding the truth. The way of the transgressor is hard—always hard. The wages of sin are death. Be sure your sins will find you out.

Take down your cherished books of history. What do they say to you? That the straight line is the only safe way in which to walk. It is applicable for the individual, for the family, for the community, for the nation, for civilization.

This every great prayer must be, "Try with slow, God, to show me the way of truth. Micah declared it. Every true prophet must declare it. It is the only way to peace and joy in this life."

On Believing All over the world now there is a reaction from the superficial faith that it does not make much difference what a man believes. We have learned our lesson. What a man believes makes a world difference not only in what he does, but what happens to him.

Jam Loops

Four Measures Listed To Curb Elm Disease

Increasing Toll Noted Over Widespread Area

The dread Dutch elm disease, killer of thousands of trees, is spreading rapidly over large areas.

Control measures should include: (1) Pruning and burning of all dead material from elms; (2) removing of the bark before elm wood is stored or dumped; (3) piling of stored elm wood in a dry building or cellar; (4) removing and burning promptly all elm trees killed by the disease.

There are three good clues for spotting the diseased trees, according to University of Massachusetts specialists. Evidence of woodpecker activity. Where strips of bark have been removed from tree limbs it may indicate that woodpeckers are feeding on elm bark beetles, carriers of the lutch elm disease.

Shepherd's crooks are another sign of the disease. These crooks are twisted twigs branching out at the end of last season's growth. Third, lack of spring buds may indicate that the trees have been attacked by the disease.

Early detection of the disease will aid control measures, foresters say.

Electricity Serves New Chore in Poultry House

Electricity has added one more chore to its list of poultry operations. It has been used to power an egg-scoring room in a battle against mold and musty odors.

Accompanying picture shows how this battle is being fought on a Virginia farm. The farm strips consist of two bactericidal lights. From a central place on the ceiling, the lights radiate powerful germ-killing rays into every part of the room.

The egg storage room has been free of mold and musty odors since the equipment was installed three years ago. As a result, eggs stored there have been rated as "top quality" and sold at premium prices.

Electricity also lends a hand in incubating and brooding operations; cleaning and grading eggs; ventilating and lighting poultry houses, de-beaking, watering and, finally, after killing, in removing feathers and dressing for delivery home use or commercial sale.

Use of electricity on farms has made marked strides recently.

Farm Saw Frame

At the beginning of 1948, Wisconsin, America's greatest dairy state, had 1,260,000 cows and heifers, two years old or over, kept for milk, also 1,015,000 heifer calves and halfers one to two years old kept for milk cows. Compared with a year ago, the number of milk cows declined 81,000 and the number of young stock kept for future milk cows decreased 10,000.

More Labor on Less Wood

As N. W. Forests Thin Out Forests of the Northwest, are thinning out, and the big lumber centers are "under the necessity of putting more labor into less wood to maintain their industrial communities," says J. A. Hall, director of the Pacific Northwest forest and range experimental station.

The Grays Harbor area in Washington, says Hall, shows how a cut-and-get-out sawmill center can stay in business and remain home for the Doaks family. In its heyday, there were 20 or more sawmills in the area, employing 9,000 men and producing more than a billion and a half feet of crude lumber a year.

Exhaustion of the easily accessible fir followed. Only a few of the old mills remain, but "they are doing a much closer job of manufacture." Add new industries have come in. About 800 men are employed, almost as many as in the piney days—but only one-third work in sawmills. Privately, they are doing a much closer utilization of the forest, not only of the remaining fir, but of hemlock and spruce. Good use is being made of material which formerly went to the trash burner or the bog for fuel.
