Sun Clothing Has Dual Role For Traveling and Lounging

BY this time most women are familiar with the sun dress and bolero combination that is popular during the summer weather. This season is no exception, but this dress and bolero combination has blossomed out and has more uses than ever before.

The outfits are models of discretion for many of the dresses are well built up to rest and the bolero is added to them, they may be worn when you travel by train. If you plan to travel by motor car, these dresses and boleros are planned especially for comfort and coolness. You may get out of the car to go dining, shopping or sight-seeing if you wear a jacket, and still look very smart.

When the weather becomes too warm, take off the jacket in the car and you will be delightfully conditioned to the weather.

The armholes on the dresses are made for real comfort. Some of these have strap-one wide strap or two narrow straps, which will allow you to get maximum benefit from the sun.

A variation of these dresses is to replace the bolero with a stole. You will find these simple to make since the stole is practically of straight piece of material. This may be in a contrasting stripe to match the dress or of the same material.

Some of the stoles are combinations of bands and eyellet which also are used as toppling for the dress.

Shades of the days of the first motor cars this up-to-date version of the old-fashioned duster is a high styled long coat with full back, many fastened front and also deep pockets. Made in heavy, colorfast rayon knit fabric, the coat is equally appropriate for a bathing suit or a summer dress.

If you plan to use a stole in place of the bolero, here one that is cut generously so that you can drape it around the shoulders attractively. There's nothing worse looking than something skimpy when it should be full.

Lace gathered around the stole also should be generous. It is essential to use it. The average sized stole takes about six to eight yards of gathered edging if it is to look proper.

A stole is excellent for directing the sun properly inasmuch as it can be moved so easily. If you are interested in getting sun but still want comfortable, plan to have a stole for your dress at the back.

You might like to make a stole for beach wear or strolling and then a bolero for shopping or traveling. This changes the dress into three different costumes: Dress alone, dress with stole and dress with bolero. They may be matched or contrasting in accordance with your taste.

Shorts and Top Are Fine for Sports

If you are athletic, your summer wardrobe should include a sport set of shorts and top. The latter may take the form of an action back shirt, a halter with a coat to go over the latter.

Shorts may be long or short depending upon the activity and your own personal taste. Short types of shorts are nice for tennis and other active sports, but for bicycling and walking, you may prefer the knee length pants.

Denim is a good material to choose because of its durability, ease of cleaning and general all-around neatness. Otherwise choose a sturdy cotton or rayon like sunscreen or a linen type weave.

A good choice for a coat to wear to and from sports is a long coat, made in the style of the old-fashioned duster. This may be made or bought, and is good in a firm textured rayon, cotton gabardine or even corduroy.

Jonathan, Loyal Friend
Lesson for July 23, 1948

WELL might we term this a lesson on the facets of friendship. Rarely will one come upon such a splendid example of friendship in all literature. Coleridge put it well when he wrote, "Friendship is a sheltering tree." Diogenes Laertius, writing on Aristotle, says, "He was once asked what a friend is, and his answer was, 'One soul abiding in two bodies.'" Such was the

Dr. Newton friendship of Jonathan and David—a sheltering tree—soul abiding in two bodies. Although Jonathan's father attempted at least ten times to kill David, Jonathan was drawn the closer to David, with whose soul his was knit.

The record of this friendship is found in our scripture and devotional readings in this lesson. Yes, the golden text from Proverbs 17:17, "A friend loveth at all times."

A FRENCH SHARES WITH A SEERPREY

JONATHAN was the crown prince apparent. David was a shepherd boy. Saul expected to place Jonathan on the throne. God had selected David.

Jonathan would, no doubt, have made a better king than Saul, his father but he had no desire to be king when he discovered the high qualities in his friend, David. Not once did Jonathan ever indicate any disappointment in not becoming king.

JONATHAN STANDS UP FOR HIS FRIEND

WHEN Saul openly plotted the death of David, Jonathan begged his father to reconsider his course and spare the life of the man who had killed Goliath and had proved himself the valiant friend of Saul. This was the final test of Jonathan's sacrificial love for David. He might have remained silent, thus adding to the death of the one man who stood between him and the throne. But Jonathan was made of sterner stuff. He stood up for his friend. He was willing to stand up and be counted when it meant that he would not become king. Thus we see that true friendship is not always easy. It usually is very costly, but it pays big dividends in the coin of eternal wealth.

FRIENDSHIP THAT COSTS

AND like as Jonathan stood up and witnessed his lasting great cost so are we today summoned to this nobling type of friendship for Christ. "Ye are my friends if ye do whatsoever I command you," he once said. Young people find it rather costly to be loyal friends of Christ today. There are many siren voices that invite and tempt people to take the low road—social drinking, gambling, debauchery of one sort and another, satisfaction of sensual desire. But the true friend of Christ will withstand these voices, choosing rather the high road of Christian gentlemen.

SACRIFICIAL FRIENDSHIP

"Friendship is the loveliest of flowers in the garden of humanity," according to my cherished friend, Dr. Hight C. Moore. I would add this thought—true friendship flourishes in the garden of humanity, but it finds its life in the Garden of God's Perfect Eden.

I have not known one single friendship that has not had a sacrifice that did not stem from above. "How can two walk together except they be agreed?" And the only one that will hold human hearts together—one soul in two bodies—is the grace of God.

"Friendship is as God, who gives us grace to perform," said Richard Hovey, and not until the human will is yielded to the will of God, even as was the will of Jonathan, can the sacrifice of friendship come to flower and to harvest.

Canning Tactics

ISN'T IT CONVENIENT to have home-canned foods in good supply before the garden runs out? You may have been putting up fruits and vegetables as well as some of the early jams, jellies and preserves, but how about some of those extras that help tide you through the winter?

There are a variety of home-canned soups which are simply grand when lunch time rolls around on a snowy day. And, of course, there are pickles and relishes that are always handy for adding zest to sandwich suppers or for rounding out the meat course.

IF YOU LIKE... 1

- 1 sweet red pepper, trimmed and cut in strips.
2 medium-sized potatoes
4 carrots, sliced
2 cups quartered, peeled tomatoes
2 bunches celery, cut
1 sweet red pepper, trimmed and cut in strips.

Concentrated Tomato Soup

- 12 pounds tomatoes
2 small bay leaves
12 whole cloves
2 teaspoons salt
2 teaspoons sugar

Chili Sauce

- 10 tomatoes
1 quart chopped sweet red pepper
1 cup finely chopped white onions
1 hot red pepper, chopped
1 quart sugar
2 tablespoons salt
5 eggs, beaten
1 tablespoon celery seed
1 tablespoon ground dillseed
1 teaspoon ground cloves

Chunk Pickles

- 6 pounds large cucumbers
3 1/4 cups salt
3 quarts water
3 tablespoons alum
1 quart vinegar
8 cups sugar
2 1/2-inch sticks dillseed
2 blades mace
1 tablespoon whole cloves

Beef for Stew

- 10 pounds beef
2 tablespoons shortening
2 tablespoons salt

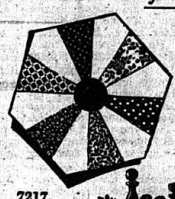
Beef for Stew

Trim off excess fat and weigh meat. Wash meat, cut into one-inch cubes and cut into pieces to fit jar. Melt shortening and brown meat in skillet. When well browned add just enough water to cover, heating until all browned residue from skillet is dissolved to make a rich gravy. Pack meat into clean hot jars to within one inch of the top. Add one and one-half teaspoons salt to each quart. Adjust lid. Process 75 minutes for pints, 90 minutes for quarts at 10 pounds pressure.

Beef for Stew

Blankets and sweaters, if dried in a well ventilated room, will retain their original softness. Long exposure to direct sunlight will harden the woolen yarns. When making paraffin for topping jelly flasks, heat just hot enough to make the wax liquid. Do not allow it to smoke. Before doing grimy cleaning jobs, grease fingers into one soft soap. This will eliminate staining. The soap is easily removed with a nail file.

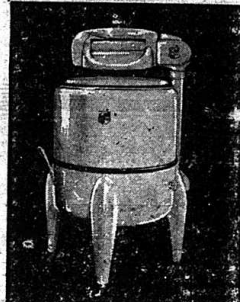
