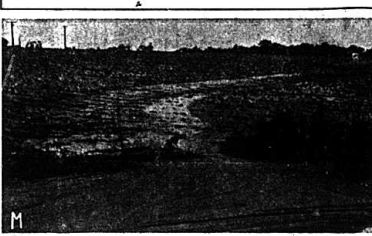

Conservation Methods Keep Soil at Home For High Crop Yields in Years Ahead



Erosion Takes Command and Soils Wash Away on Poorly Managed Land

CHICAGO—Building the soil and letting it wash away is like putting money in the bank and then burning the bank down, declared the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee in a statement made public here. "Soil building needs top priority on most Midwestern farms," the statement points out. "But there is not much point in building the soil unless you keep it at home to give high crop yields. "That is why it is so important to use the teamwork of practices that build and maintain soil structure and measures that prevent erosion and keep your soils home. "A good crop rotation is the foundation of your soil building program. Well-timed, deep-rooted legumes and other conservation measures are the corner stone. Liming, based on soil tests, is one of the supporting pillars. Another is a balanced supply of plant nutrients for the soil, including phosphate and potash. "Deep-rooted legumes are No. 1 soil builders. They add to the organic matter supply. They improve soil structure. Such soil has what we call good tilth. "Legumes and grasses can do a good soil building job only if they are well fed. "But building soil structure is not the whole story. On some farms you can cut down erosion merely by putting the soil in shape so that less water runs off and steals your top soil. In other soils, you may need contour cultivation, strip cropping, terracing and other conservation measures."

GOOD MANAGEMENT PAYS IN DAIRYING

An Eastern Kentucky dairyman reported a production gain of 12 percent in two years due to such improvements as: Keeping breeding records and conditioning cows during a six-week to two-month dry period. Regular milking hours and feeding habits improvements on water supply. Keeping cows in the barn on cold, rough days. Keeping the barn warm but well ventilated. Providing sufficient bedding to keep cows comfortable. Dehorning cows housed in a rest barn. Dairy specialists at the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, University of Kentucky said: "Many cases, such as this, lead one to believe that good management, plus improved pasture and better legume hay, could make the average dairy cow in Kentucky produce 220 pounds of butterfat a year instead of 170 pounds. This would mean an increase of about 40 percent in net income from milk."

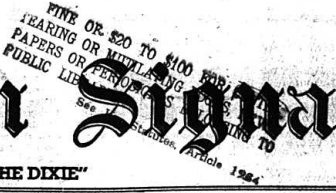

President Truman today accepted busily the responsibility of his election to full four-year term in the White House with a pledge to devote his efforts to "the course of peace in the world and prosperity and happiness for our people here at home."

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

U. N. Says Cease Fire in Palestine; Truman Asks More Defense Funds; U. S. Atom Control Plan Approved

CEASE FIRE:

Holy Land

Almost before anyone knew what was happening three fighting between Israeli and Egyptian forces had faded into bloom in the Negev, southern Palestine desert area.

ISRAELI government spokesmen said the purpose of the Israeli attack was to smash open the road to Jewish settlements in the Negev. It was the purpose of the Egyptian attack to prevent the Jews from running supply convoys to isolated settlements in the district.

By the time the battle had proceeded savagely for six days the harassed U. N. security council had had enough. It called for a cease fire.

RESULTS of the security council order at the outset were decidedly disappointing. Each side lied to shift the blame to the other; neither appeared willing to hold the battle.

THE MILITARY budget for 1949 will be a neat 14.4 billion dollars—about \$2 billion more than the request doesn't get trimmed.

THE PRESIDENT said that his defense officials had wanted a budget of about \$2 billion more than the fiscal year starting July 1, but that he had cut them back to the 14.4 billion figure.

THE U. S. and the West insist that an air-tight system of international control and inspection must be established before the atomic age would feel safe in destroying its atomic weapons.

THE resolution which the political committee adopted is generally in line with the American policy. The primary essence of the general assembly was expected to give it a routine final approval.

REGULATIONS which were the first time since Bernard Baruch founded the American commission for atomic energy in June 1946, that all of the United Nations had a chance to vote on it.

THE nuclear scientists have thought out a way to tap the power of a mobile atomic pile, Pools said. The problems ahead are to design the engine, fuselage and control the plane's crew.

HOW MUCH good the U. N. vote of approval would do, long as the Russians continued to insist on the question that remained hanging fire.

TOP military planners are rushing work to complete a spot-check of United States mobilization requirements by November 18.

THE check will disclose whether the United States offers all strategic defense plan makes sense and whether it can be approved readily.

SQUABBLE:

Yugoslavia

Russia continues not only to have great and grievous trouble with the United States and differences of opinion with most of the member countries of the United Nations, but her political rift with the upstart U. S. is also growing worse instead of better.

THE TROUBLE originally began within the framework of the Cominform (Communist Information Bureau), the master organization through which Russia controls her satellites.

AND in recent weeks the "heresy" of Tito and the central committee of the Yugoslav Communist party has become more absolute and more determined than ever.

IT TILTS holds true despite the fact that Yugoslav Foreign Minister Djugardj had been displaying firm adherence to the position of the Cominform edict ordering Yugoslavia to make itself a precise mirror of Soviet Russia in all political and economic aspects.

WALLACE: On to '52

Henry Wallace, the incorrigible Communist visionary, who stumped the political experts by getting his Progressive party on the ballots of 43 states, now is working hard to keep his party alive for the 1952 campaign.

IN THE waning days of the campaign Wallace was appealing to his followers to stick with him after November 2.

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Washington Digest U. S. Presidents Respect Members of Fourth Estate

WASHINGTON

—In this post-election calm which has settled over the domestic political scene, many a vest, shirt, blouse, or slip in the capital catches a palpating heart.

THE regular classified civil servants haven't much to fear. They can't be fired without cause, and no matter how thorough an administration's housecleaning may be, most of the future lands right.

NATURALLY we who cover the White House always wonder what manner of man we are going to have to handle, while at the same time we learn the art of getting his name favorably inserted into a Washington dispatch or broadcast.

ONCE Dewey had a bad reputation in this regard. But then, most candidates are suspect before that start, since it is taken for granted they will be subjected to a deluge of press attacks which afflict victims differently.

I remember a remark William Hard, now an editor of Reader's Digest, once made to me: "I've never seemed to suffer from presidentialism."

THE heavy majority of those who traveled with Dewey on his campaign trips had nothing but praise to offer. One well-known reporter was out of the question to ask the reporters not to get a complete story as they could. It was pointed out by another well-known reporter that the press would have to have the story, and the reporters would have to get it, regardless of the President's wishes.

THE President refused at first, but the reporters insisted. Finally he consented to give out an official statement after the conference.

I have known other examples of short-lived ego rules. One which Secretary of the Treasury Dwight D. Eisenhower established on the treasury. He issued an order that none of the treasury officials could claim to be a newsmen. He might as well have told reporters not to read the newspaper news columns, which he reported as it always had been.

FRANKLIN Roosevelt had, at one time, at least 80 per cent of the newspapers "against" him. He would be courted, however, by the public by giving out news to their representatives. He also knew that if he tried to withhold news, the American people would be less likely to support him. **Early Christmas Plan**  
IT'S NOT TOO early to think of Christmas now, especially if you want to have your fruit cake and plum puddings on hand. These foods are best when mellowed and ripened for several weeks before being eaten.

Then, too, it's a good idea to get some of the work out of the way before the holidays are literally on top of us. There's a lot of work to preparing the ingredients for both fruit cake and plum puddings—they both require chopped fruit and long baking and steaming time.

#### WHITE OR LIGHT FRUIT CAKES

- 1 cup sifted flour
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 1/2 cups seeded raisins
- 1 cup candied orange peel
- 1/2 cup candied pineapple
- 1/2 cup blanched pistachio nuts
- 1/2 cup salted raisins

1. Cream butter thoroughly, then add cream mixed with soda. Sift sugar into beaten whites, combine with the first mixture and add lemon juice, fruit and nuts, cut fine and sprinkled with flour. Stir thoroughly and bake in a loaf pan lined with buttered waxed paper. This baking will take about one hour in a slow (325 degree) oven.

2. Because the dark fruit cake is so rich, it's a good idea to steam it first to cook thoroughly, then to bake it for every morsel. The cake will be more moist when prepared in this manner.

#### Dark Fruit Cake

- 1 pound brown sugar
- 1 pound butter
- 1 cup flour
- 1/2 eggs, beaten separately
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 teaspoon grated nutmeg
- 1/2 pound pecans, unbroken
- 1/2 pound lemon peel, citron, all cut fine
- 1/2 cup molasses
- 1 cup fruit juice
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1/2 pound almonds, blanched
- 1/2 pound pecans, unbroken
- 1 pound seeded raisins
- 1 pound sultana raisins
- 1 pound dates
- 1/2 cup candied orange peel
- 1/2 cup candied pineapple
- 1 cup candied cherries

1. Cut pineapple into small pieces. Remove stem end from figs and cut. Mix all these with one cup flour. Mix the remaining flour with soda and spices. Cream the butter until fluffy, add the sugar, then the well beaten eggs and stir well. Add the flour mixture alternately with molasses and fruit juice, then the well beaten raisins and other fruit, nuts and Line. Four bread pans with waxed paper and butter. Four batter into four, thirds full. Set pans in oven, 300.

**Tests Tell Soil's Need For Lime And Plant Nutrients**

CHICAGO—Having your soil tested to find its plant food needs is a good deal like going to your doctor for a health check-up, declared the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee in a statement issued here.  
 "The tests a doctor makes are important, but he doesn't depend on them alone," the statement says. "Besides taking your pulse, temperature and respiration, and checking your heart, chest and kidneys, he will ask you a lot of questions. When he has all the facts, he's ready for a diagnosis."  
 "It's pretty much the same way with your soil. If you are not getting the big crop yields you think you should, just testing the soil won't give all the answers.  
 "A good deal more information is necessary. Among important questions are: What crops have been grown previously? What was the per acre yield? How has the soil been handled? How about the crop rotation? Has the soil been limed? What fertilizer treatment has it had?  
 "Good soil tests from carefully taken samples and properly interpreted in the light of crop history can help you do a better job of liming and fertilizing your soil."

**Soil Building Key To Higher Yields, Lower Output Costs**

CHICAGO—Farm production costs have nearly tripled since the prewar days of 1935-39, declared the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee in a statement issued here.  
 "Farm wages are now three and a half times the 1935-39 average, according to U. S. Department of Agriculture statistics," says the statement. "The cost of seed, feed, and many other things farmers buy has soared."  
 "Meanwhile, farm prices have slumped and many economists expect a further easing in the period ahead."  
 "Farmers can meet the impact of higher production costs and lower prices by good soil management that steps up crop producing efficiency and cuts output costs per unit. With fertilizer still one of the best buys in farm production costs, soil building for high production is more profitable than ever."  
 "Good soil management means teamwork in which a number of different measures back each other up. These include a good rotation, built around deep-rooted legumes, liming, the use of phosphate and potash fertilizer, the return of barnyard manure and crop aftermath to the soil.  
 "Working together these members of the soil management team will build up your soil's organic matter, improve tilth and drainage and give crop roots more living space in which to forage for plant nutrients."

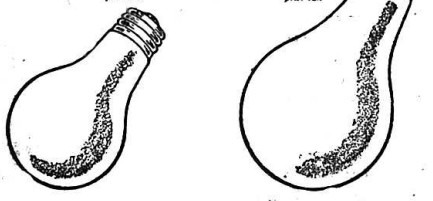
