STALIN TALKS: 'Horror'

In what is probably the most amazing outbreak he has made since the war, Soviet Premier Josef Stalin told the world that the U. S., Great Britain and France are seeking a new war through a "policy of aggression."

THE accusation, despite the high level of its source, amounts to nothing more than a repetition of the already stereotyped Russian practice of attempting to turn an opponent's responsibility into a confession of guilt.

HOWEVER, he added, the "public forces favoring peace" are too strong to permit "the instigators of a new war" to succeed. He said again into the "horror" of conflict.

Stalin named Winston Churchill as "the main instigator of a new war" and predicted that Churchill's "puppils of aggression" would be rejected by the people just as Churchill has been.

Although he did not label President Truman or any other leader as a "pupil in aggression," the implication was too clear to be mistaken, particularly since the Moscow radio had broadcast a prediction that Mr. Truman would be defeated on November 2.

STALIN accused the U. S. and Britain of twice rejecting settlements of the Berlin crisis with Russia and said that older people in the Berlin question in the U. N. security council "was a display of aggression on the part of Anglo-American and French ruling circles."

The British and Americans, the Soviet premier said, declared Brno and voted against the agreement reached in the Kremlin conferences August 30 that would have

TREATY: On the Way?

In view of the existing physical and ideological rift which has divided the world into two opposing blocs, it has come to seem almost inevitable that the western bloc sooner or later would devise some kind of formal military treaty for the mutual protection of its nations concerned.

AND A few days before the election word began to creep out from among "high American sources" that a military treaty was on the way.

The report was that drafting was scheduled to begin soon of an agreement pledging full aid to the five-nation Brussels alliance of western Europe. Results of the U. S. election were in no way supposed to affect the plan, since both major parties had committed themselves in principle to backing the Brussels alliance.

SUCH AN alliance supposedly will link the United States and Canada in formal treaty relationships with Britain, France, Belgium, Holland and Luxembourg.

From a behind-the-scenes standpoint, the treaty would be a masterpiece. It is highly probable, indeed, that the broad outlines of a north Atlantic pact—with some details still to be worked out—has been in existence for some time.

The alliance is expected to commit the U. S. and Canada to: 1. BULLY air, land and sea forces of the Brussels powers.

2. STANDARDIZE equipment and training.

3. CREATE a seven-nation unified military strategic command under an American commander-in-chief.

4. PLEDGE a guarantee of each nation's territorial integrity in case of war.

5. GIVE the North American powers the right to establish air, land or sea bases in any of the five countries.

U. S. officials expect that the treaty will be ready for ratification by the middle of 1949, barring extraordinary events which Congress will react to such a treaty late, for the time being, a debateable question.

SHIPBUILDING: Navy Expands

Increasing importance in the minds of U. S. defense chiefs of naval warfare is leading to an increasing consideration of possible attacks across the Arctic, was revealed in a statement outlining the navy's new shipbuilding program.

Vice Adm. Earle M. Mills, chief of the bureau of ships, listed the development of advanced prototypes in four major fields as the aim of the building and conversion program.

"FIRST, aircraft carriers capable of handling the fast, heavy long-range bombers developed under development since the war; second, high-speed, deep-submergence submarines; third, anti-submarine vessels to combat these submarines; fourth, ships equipped for Polar and arctic service."

Battleships were not mentioned in the statement, nor was there any direct reference to preparations against air attack over the roof of the globe, but the program's emphasis on polar ships was considered self-explanatory.

IN THIS phase of the program, two destroyer escorts and two submarines will be specially fitted for off-shore aircraft detection. One cargo ship and two floating dry-docks for landing ships will be converted for service in polar waters.

The aircraft carrier program includes the construction, to begin late this year or early in 1949, of the yet-unmanned super-battleship, SS-500s, designated as the CVA-58.

sell her stock and interest in the fair, and stated that her brother had offered her five hundred dollars, and if we wanted to buy same she would let us have it as promised. We bought her interest and paid her the amount above stated.

In 1940 Mr. R. B. Bird came to Dr. Phillips and myself and stated that he wanted to sell his stock and interest in the fair which was then one third holdings in the fair.

Mr. Bird made us a price and we bought his one third part. This left Dr. M. M. Phillips and W. O. Yadon, sole owners of the Brodhead Fair. J. M. Roberts was elected secretary in 1932 and served until his death in 1938. We had several years through the depression and although the four of us worked

hard it was almost impossible to keep heads above the water. If I recall correctly we owed in 1938 the sum of six hundred dollars, and was able to pay on this the sum of \$200.00.

In 1939-40 and 1941 Dr. Phillips and W. O. Yadon put up the sum of around eight thousand dollars to build a skating rink, two barns, small dwelling and to install lights and etc. During this time, from year to year we added one night to the fair, and finally added Saturday and Sunday night. The war came on and on goes that part of the story. However in 1946 sixteen years from the time the deed was overlooked, we decided to sell to the party first named in this writing. We found that the Brodhead Fair was not the owner of anything as far as the record shows. The attorneys stated that the only correct way to get this matter in correct order was to now prepare the deed, that was overlooked in 1932 and have the four original owners and wives sign same, and transfer this holding to the Brodhead Fair Inc. During the time as the record shows, Mr. J. M. Roberts passed away. Mrs. Kittie Roberts had sold to

the other three of us her interest in 1938. We prepared the deed, Dr. Phillips, W. O. Yadon and our wives signed. We asked R. B. Bird and wife, whom we had also bought in 1940 to sign, and they did so without making any demands from us as they had a right to do, so far as the record showed; but they did not make any demand from us, as we had bought their interest in 1940.

When we presented the deed to Mrs. Katie Roberts, daughter, Mrs. Hope Cox and son, Joe Roberts, of whom we had bought out just after the death of J. M. Roberts, there was nothing doing. We tried all means possible to convince them that we had bought and paid for this interest ten years ago, and to this Mrs. Roberts did not deny. But to get this matter straightened out, we were compelled to pay them one fourth of this price obtained from this sale, which was the sum of Twenty Thousand Dollars making the amount paid four times as it was today. We want to thank all our friends who in any way helped

us make the Brodhead Fair what it was in the last seven years. We trust that the new owners will continue to have a fair, and wish for them the greatest of success. We pledge ourselves that the years hence or longer if something in 1948 was overlooked that we will be just as glad, and feel just as honorably bound then to make things right as it was today, regardless of the value of the holdings at that time, where it be One Thousand or One Million Dollars.

CHEAPER GRAIN COULD MEAN BETTER FEEDING

In view of lower feed costs it should be profitable to feed a pound of grain for each three or four pounds of milk, say dairy specialists at the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, University of Kentucky. Or feed a pound of grain for each two pounds of milk produced over and above 10 pounds of milk for Jerseys or Guernseys and 15 pounds of milk for other breeds. It is further suggested that it should be profitable to feed sufficient grain to dry cows and heifers to get them in good flesh before calving.

CORN MAKES 170 BUSHELS

Emit Long of Garrard county reported a yield of 170 bushels of corn to the acre. The land was in a high state of cultivation, having been limed, a good cover crop turned under and heavy application of complete fertilizer used. The variety was Ky. 103 yellow hybrid corn.

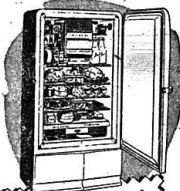

The foregoing proposed fuel clause will not be applied to any energy delivered and used for municipal street lighting and municipal water pumping.

That The Community Public Service Company is granted the right to publish in connection with the aforesaid notice any further explanatory information not inconsistent with the terms of said notice and its application filed herewith.

The aforesaid application has been assigned for hearing before the Commission at 10:00 o'clock a.m., November 18, 1948, at its offices in Frankfort, Kentucky.

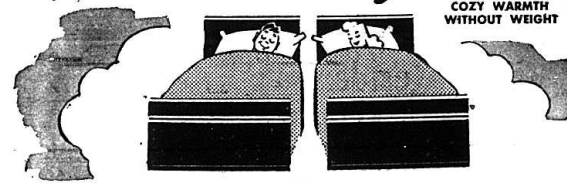

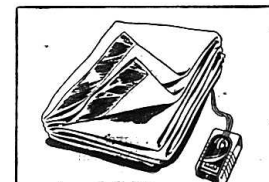
