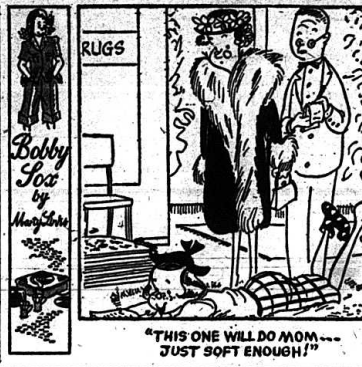

**Development of Bicycles**  
*Traced to 1816 'Celeripede'*

Joseph R. Niepce, French physicist best known as one of the inventors of photography, was active in other fields as well. In 1816 he invented the "celeripede," or "hobbyhorse"—two wheels and a crutch upon which the rider sat while he propelled himself with his feet against the ground. It was the forerunner of the modern bicycle.

There were a few minor improvements during the next two or three years. But the price was high and the machine was not within the reach of ordinary folk; thus it became known as the "dandy bicycle." It even reached America, but the superior qualities of the device finally ended the craze.

The idea of propelling oneself on wheels, however, had taken root. The velocipede, or "boneshaker," was the first crank-driven bicycle, developed in 1865. It was well named. With heavy wooden wheels, thick iron tires and a massive iron backbone, these machines were extremely heavy and they vibrated in a terrifying manner over the rough roads.

Then came the tall "ordinary," with front wheels sometimes over five feet in height. But it was not until 1876—a little over 10 years ago—when H. J. Lawson invented the first rear-driven bicycle. This followed many patented improvements and in 1877 Col. Albert A. Pope of Boston organized the Pope Manufacturing company, launching the bicycle-making industry in the United States.

Pneumatic rubber tires followed in 1889. Free wheels, which enabled the bicycle to coast, were introduced in 1894. By the turn of the century the tandem, or "bicycle built for two," had become exceedingly popular. The bicycle industry, spurred by invention, seemed to new heights.

Today it is estimated that more than 60,000,000 bicycles are in use throughout the world, 12,000,000 of them in the United States.

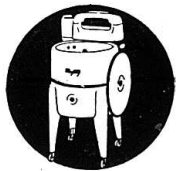

The U.S. Vice Presidency Called 'Unimportant' Job

WASHINGTON - Just what the thoughts of a vice president of the United States between the time of his address and the time he walks in and makes his opening address to the United States senate?

There can be great joy, great sorrow, great pleasure, great disappointment and great frustration. A vice president may move into the presidency and be a great President. A great man may be vice president, but he can't be a great president because the office in itself is unimportant.

These were the remarks of former Vice President Garner as quoted by Bascom Timmons in his book, "Garner Talks."

When "Cactus Jack" gave up the speakership of the house to accept the vice presidency, he called the office "a no-man's land somewhere between the legislative and the executive branch."

Whether Mr. Garner was any more reduced to a no-man's land by the vice presidential nomination than was Alben Barkley Governor Warren, is in accepting the Republican vice presidential nomination, for that matter.

Barley's reason for accepting the job was that he had been hard working in politics for 43 years. As senate Democratic leader he had been in politics for 43 years.

He probably will be asked to attend cabinet meetings as a matter of course. The cabinet members will be asked by Roosevelt. Before Garner accepted, he made an agreement with Roosevelt that he would not make any recommendation for public office unless I was asked for a recommendation.

President Harding had extensive experience in public life to his vice president, Calvin Coolidge, who didn't have to worry about the first part of the Garner agreement. According to the record he was not heard at these meetings, and at many of them he was not even seen.

Garner didn't get far out of touch. When Garner heard Mr. Dewey's statement regarding his conception of his running mate, he was elected, the sage of Uvalde said otherwise to the effect that most of the things when he was vice president he was so worried that the Republican senators would put something over on him in case of a tie vote that he would not even think of a block away from the Capitol steps.

While it is quite true that the vice president is a member of the executive branch of the government, his chief function is presiding over the senate and casting a vote like any member of the upper house in case of a tie.

He is not so closely associated with the executive branch as the president. He might fall in his really important role, that of rallying support for administration measures in his own party and doing what he can to keep the majority party as favorably inclined to the White House as possible.

Most vice-presidents with a sense of humor have been careful not to take themselves too seriously. Vice President Marshall (under Wilson) made the most of his office, contributing to the climate of Washington by indulging in wisecracks and offering a sharp contrast to Wilson's serious demeanor.

Mr. Garner took a somewhat similar line when he said at the end of his first term: "The job is delightful, I like it. But it is entirely unimportant."

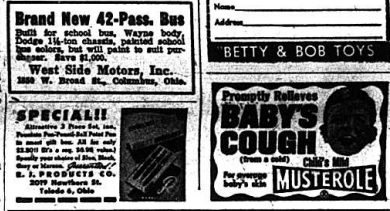

### PROTECTING LIVING STANDARDS

A director of research for a large organization of retail stores has said that efforts will be made still further lower the overhead costs of retail business. In some parts of the country roadside stores, which can be operated cheaply, are opening up. And that, he went on, "may be the first indication of a new form of competition for large retailing establishments."

The interesting thing about that is the light it casts on the competitive situation in merchandising. And it shows, as well, how impossible it is for any kind of store to gain anything approaching a monopoly. In the days when chain store taxes were being advocated, the argument was that they were necessary to keep the independent from being squeezed out of business. A Federal tax of this nature came within an ace of becoming law. But it was beaten—and the independents kept on doing business at the same old stand, and they are better off than ever.

In retailing, there is always room at the bottom for the small operator to gain a foothold—and there's plenty of room, too, in the middle and at the top, for the man who is willing to work, has the necessary experience and adequate financing, knows how to offer the public goods and services which meet with its approval.

Retailing has done a fine job in cutting its costs of doing business, and it is always looking for ways and means to do a better job still. The consumer gets the benefit—either in lower prices, or in the prevention of price increases that would otherwise occur. And that's one way to protect American living standards.

### WHO MAKES THE GAINS

The radicals' classic complaint against capitalism is that it tends to concentrate the wealth and income of the

nation in the hands of a relative few, at the expense of the many.

That ancient cliché is still in use. Yet the truth is that just the opposite has occurred. The greatest gains in late years have been made by people in the lower and the middle-income groups. As an example, in 1941 there were 4,139,000 families in the \$3,000-\$5,000 bracket—last year there were more than 13,000,000. And, in 1941, only about 1,500,000 families had incomes over \$5,000, while last year the total reached almost 7,000,000.

Last summer a survey was made to find out what classifications of people were better or worse off than in 1930, after making allowance for changes in taxes and living costs. Such representative labor groups as coal miners, railway workers, etc., were all better off, and by a wide margin. But typical groups of executives; and stock and bondholders were worse off.

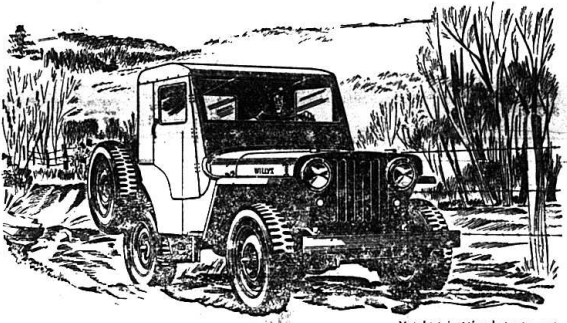

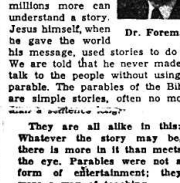
Lesson for November 28, 1948
