PROTECTING LIVING STANDARDS

A director of research fof h large organization of retail stores has said that efforts will be made still further lower the overhead costs of retail business. In some parts of the country roadside stores, which can be operated cheaply, are opening up. And that, he went on, "may be the first indication of a new form of competitionfor large retailing estalish

The interesting thing about that is the light it casts on the competitive situation in merchandising. And it shows, as well, how impossible it is for any kind of store to gain anything approaching a monopoly. In the days when chain store taxes were being advocated, the argument was that they were necessary to keep the independent from being equeezed out of business. A Federal tax of this nature came within an ace of becoming law. But it was beaten-and the independents kept on doing business at the same old stand. and they are better off than ever.

In retailing, there is always room at the bottom for the small operator to gain a foothold-and there's plenty of room, too, in the middle and at the top, for the man who is willing to work, has the necessary experience and adequate financing, knows how to offer the public mods and services which meet with its approval. •

Retailing has done a fine job in cutting its costs of doing business, and it is always looking for ways and means to do a better job still. The consumer gets the benefiteither in lower prices, or in the prevention of price increases that would otherwise occur. And that's one way to protect American living standards.


