WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

President Hints Controls on Way As Cost of Living Drops Slightly; Western Mutual Aid Pact Prepared

DILEMA: Sharp-Horned

Perched uncomfortably astride a dilemma having the sharpest horns ever to plague a sinner, President Truman ponders ways and means of getting off. The situation is as clearly defined as it is bothersome.

Global Christmas

People of the nations of the earth are going to see Christmas from an American viewpoint this year. The industry has touched off its "fourth round" of price increases, with consequent high prices maintenance, when he announced a wage hike for all his workers.

THE PATTERN is clear. Industry raises wages and the cost of its products goes up. Wages must increase if these products are to be purchased. Labor comes in to ask for more money in order to buy these products.

TREATY: Mutual Aid

The cold freeze being turned on Russia by the western nations plummeted several more degrees when Great Britain, France and the three Benelux nations, after long negotiations, announced a five-point mutual assistance pact.

SECONDLY, it provides that the pact be left open to membership of other nations. It calls, also, for the setting up of a committee of political boards—immediately after the pact's signature and ratification.

Containing 17 points in all, the program of "agreed opinions" has been presented to the U. S. and France for consideration.

Two things happened almost simultaneously. President Truman ordered administration agencies to work out a "definite anti-inflation program to be presented to the Democratic congress in January, and the bureau of labor statistics reported a dip of one-half of 1 percent in its cost-of-living index for October.

FOR ONE thing, the price dips—though they were miraculous proportions—would mean that anti-inflation measures, such as "handy" price control and rationing, which might be imposed.

Another top fiscal official said he believed inflationary forces still had the upper hand. And Chester Bowles, one-time OPA boss, stated that congress would not "back up" would act against inflation.

How much will this spurious peace offensive mean? It is hard to say, as far as any genuine desire for peace is concerned. The Russians haven't undergone a change of heart; their aims are the same as always.

Washington Digest No Future to Presidency, Pension Plan is Proposed

WASHINGTON—Harry Truman, President, is going to be able to consider only one plan which probably will come up in the approaching congress with more objectivity than some of his friends thought would be possible. It offers an answer to the question: what to do with ex-Presidents.

Many, if not most, of our former chief executives might provide counsel and advice based on their experience. This could be most valuable.

BAUKHAAGE. Hoover served in many other useful public capacities. Once he left the White House, he can afford to do so.

Franklin Roosevelt also turned back part of his salary under that same act, and later, in 1943, when he was advocating a \$25,000 ceiling on all salaries, FDR again voluntarily returned to the treasury a portion of his own.

Not all presidents are born with, or acquire, silver spoons. Few could afford the luxury of working for nothing and so, when they leave office, they have to look around for a job.

Fortunately, former President William Howard Taft, in the years before he was called back to Uncle Sam's cabinet as chief justice of the supreme court, possessed enough of the world's goods so that he could afford to render at least semipublic services such as teaching at Harvard law school.

Ex-presidents also should have the privileges of the senate floor. Taft believes, with the right to speak, but not to vote, on pending legislation, in order to convey to the nation would benefit.

Coolidge might or might not have welcomed an opportunity to act on some governmental responsibility after his presidential term expired. As it was, he accepted a lucrative position with regard to the highway program.

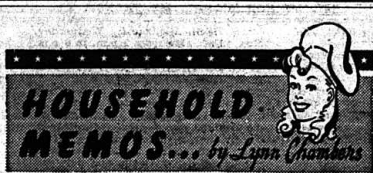

Holiday Sweets

CHRISTMAS is the time when the larder is constantly raided and homemakers have to plan more than enough to give to all the friends and family.

Maple Creams 1 cup maple sugar 1 cup light brown sugar 1/2 cup water 1/2 teaspoon almond extract Walnut meats

Party Chews (Makes 40 1 1/4-inch squares) 1/2 cup butter or substitute 1/2 cup brown sugar 1 cup sifted flour 2 eggs 1 cup brown sugar 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup shredded coconut 1 cup even-pepper rice cereal 1 cup chopped nut meats

Blend butter and sugar thoroughly. Add flour and nuts. Press mixture on bottom of a shallow baking pan (9 x 13 inches). Bake in a moderate (350-degree) oven about 15 minutes or until a delicate brown. Beat eggs well. Add sugar gradually and continue beating until mixture is light and fluffy. Add remaining ingredients. Blend in rice cereal and nut meats. Mix well and spread on baked crust. Bake in a moderate oven about 25 minutes. Remove from oven and cut into squares well warm.

Focan Molasses Brownies 1/2 cup flour (1/4 cup plus 2 tablespoons) 1/2 cup pecan nuts 1/2 cup butter 1/2 cup powdered sugar 1/2 cup pure dark molasses 1 egg

Sift flour, measure and sift twice with salt. Lightly mix in broken pecan nuts. Beat butter, creaming, serving a few whole ones for decoration. Add cream butter and sugar thoroughly. Blend in molasses and egg. Beat until beaten egg. Add dry ingredients and mix well.

Place two cups sugar and the milk in a saucepan. Have over low heat and stir until sugar is dissolving. 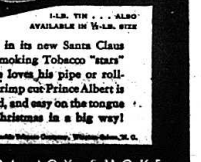

A ROAD TO THE SOUTH

The climax of a year's work was reached last week by the U. S. Highway 27 Association when the distribution of 80,000 strip maps of its route began.

For years, erstwhile cities along Route 27 have watched the flow of traffic down Route 25, and dreamed of the thousands of dollars they believed should have gone into their own pockets. Then they decided to do something about it.

The result was a donation of nearly \$6,000 by central Kentucky chambers of commerce to be used in promotion of the project. They looked on the closing of Route 25 traffic on account of construction as their opportunity for greatness.

We believe 25ers could take issue with several points of the 27 proposal. When they say their highway is the safest and most scenic route to the South, we know we can argue with them.

Highway 25 offers, in addition to the going to the blue grass, a far straighter and wider roadway. Its path crosses the Kentucky River on one of engineering's great achievements in bridge building at Clay's Ferry. It offers Richmond and Eastern College, and Berea and Berea College, two of the most beautiful college campuses in the South.

Renfro Valley, another great tourist attraction, lies within a footstep of the traveler's automobile.

Several State parks border the highway that was cut by Daniel Boone and his party, the "safest, shortest, and most scenic" route to the interior of that fabulous land called "Kentucky."

Boone's camp in the wilderness is marked today by the Pioneer Memorial National Monument, only 8 miles from Highway 25. At London, the Levi Jackson Wilderness Road State Park offers the traveler the heritage of his forefathers, and the story of a people who followed Boone's way into Kentucky to make a home.

A paved road, wide and luxurious, crosses to Cumberland Falls, only 8 miles from Route 25. Nearby is the Thomas Walker Memorial State Park, honoring the first white man into Kentucky. There is Williamsburg and Cumberland College and Barbourville and Union College. At Pineville, in Pine Mountain State Park, the tourist sees the most beautiful of Kentucky's ladies crowned in the annual Mountain Laurel Festival.

On many more points could 25ers find room for debate with the men of Route 27. But let them fight, this competition is the thing that made this country great to begin with.
