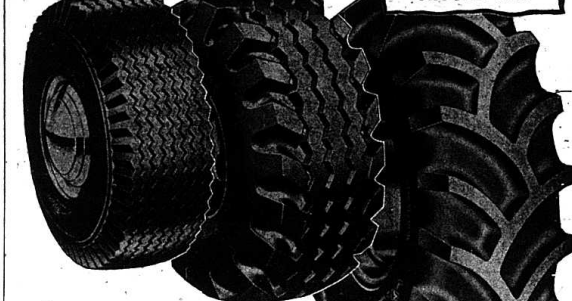

They had bad luck throughout the entire game but still held their own. Mickey Smock, the center of the Devil's ball, was injured and was unable to play. During the first quarter Carl Gilliland, one of the top scorers was injured and had to retire from the game.

Measles Are Reaching Their Peak County Health Officers Say

Measles usually reaches its peak in March or April. Last month, however, according to Dr. E. Underwood, State Health Commissioner, 12 cases were reported to the State Department of Health as against the same number in 1943. This many cases is considered a threat of an epidemic, it is enough to cause concern.

Measles is one of the most contagious of the diseases of childhood. It is a serious disease which has many complications such as pneumonia, ear, nose and throat troubles and diseases of the ear. It is essentially a disease of infancy and early childhood with more deaths occurring among children of five years and under than in any other age group. It usually begins with symptoms resembling those of a cold - sore eyes and running nose. Fever is frequently present in the early stages. The rash usually develops in three or four days.

STATE REPRESENTATIVE TO ASSIST IN FILING KENTUCKY INCOME TAX

A concerted effort is being made by the State Department of Revenue to encourage the filing of Kentucky income tax returns before April 15 after which date returns will become delinquent, thus subjecting the taxpayers to severe penalties. In addition to the Frankfort office and the local offices at Louisville, Lexington, Covington and Paducah, field representatives have been assigned to most sections of the state for the purpose of assisting those who need help in preparing their returns. Mr. Jasper Gilliland will be in Mt. Vernon on Thursday, March 9, to assist those needing help in the locality and will be located at Rockcastle County Court House.

Fire Loss Put At \$130,000 In Lancaster

Damage caused by a fire that swept the Garrard County Stock Yard and half of a block at Lancaster Monday night was revised upward Tuesday to approximately \$130,000.

Approximately 60 head of cattle died in the blaze, which destroyed the stock yard, Travelers Inn Restaurant, and a service station. The Sanders & Rankin Farm Implement Company was damaged.

Origin of the fire remained undetermined Tuesday. Stanford and Danville fire companies aided local volunteers in battling the blaze. The farm-implement firm said its loss amounted to \$1,000. Damage to the restaurant was estimated at \$10,000, including \$400 in cash, in addition to the building.

Hogan Teters, one of the owners of the stock yard, said the yard's loss was approximately \$100,000. In a insurance covered only \$2,000, he said.

Sale of the livestock was resumed at the yard in new pens located across the railroad tracks from the burned area Tuesday. They were limited, however, to horse and mule sales, since no scales are required. Officials said they hoped to have temporary scales for use at their regular Friday market.

FUTURE FARMER NEWS

February 19, to the 26, is National Future Farmer week. The organization was started 22 years ago at Kansas City, Mo., and since that time has spread to every state in the union except Rhode Island. There are at present 6,820 chapters in the United States with 260,000 members. Kentucky has 220 chapters and 9,000 members. The Future Farmers of America was organized to help in the development of farm boys who study vocational agriculture in high school. This training they help develop in the F.F.A. which makes an error in the gross receipts of over \$200.

Predicts Grain Surplus: Secretary of Agriculture Charlie Brannan...

Reporting to a private session of the senate agriculture committee, Brannan explained that farmers are overplanting grain and cotton...

"Next year," he declared, "it is entirely possible that the government will be faced to lower support prices."

Though the secretary of agriculture could use more funds to protect support prices, it isn't likely that congress will provide the four and three-quarter million dollars now available.

This means the government probably will be forced to lower support prices.

Sen. Milton Young, North Dakota Republican, asked whether Brannan favored support prices as high as 100 per cent of parity, such as demanded by the Farmers Union.

"It is desirable," replied the secretary of agriculture, "but looking at the other aspects of the price-support program, I don't believe it is at all possible."

He pointed out that the agriculture department not only couldn't stretch its money that far, but that 100 per cent of parity would increase even more the inflation result.

Among other things, Cardinal Mindsyentz was accused of fraud in the information campaign in a scheme to overthrow the Hungarian government.

General opinion was that in the prosecution of the Cardinal Russian Communists had made its first great blunder.

"The American people," Brannan took his leave, "will not stand for extreme costs."

Senators were amazed and amused when Chairman Elmer Thomas of Oklahoma...

Brannan Says "No": Secretary Brannan didn't think much of Senator Thomas's suggestion.

Many farmers are planting heavily in order to insure that acreage allotments, Brannan explained, just in case crop controls are ordered.

New 'Cow Bomb' Used In Spraying Animals

A new animal disinfectant device, called the "isomist cow bomb" is now available for use on live stock.

The cow bomb will be used to apply a deposit of dry DDT crystals to the hair and hide of livestock for protection against the horn fly, house fly, stable fly, cattle lice, ticks, mosquitoes and certain other insects.

Heat Hurts Cows: American dairy farmers have learned that some discomfited cows, like some discontented women, can be expulsive as well as obstinate.

Most of the cow's troubles can be traced to heat and humidity. A cow, unlike a human being, can perspire only through the mouth. So when the temperature and humidity inside a barn get high, the animal becomes uncomfortable and stubborn—particularly at milking time.

The U. S. Department of agriculture says an average cow gives off almost a pint of water every hour through breathing. In addition to the high humidity caused by this breathing, a cow has an extremely high body temperature.

During the winter months when the cows are in the barn most of the time, this combination results in the generation of an enormous amount of water vapor and heat.

When the warm, moisture-laden heat comes into contact with the cold walls, condensation and frost is formed.

The net result to the farmer is a rotting barn, a hot and stinging loss of hay because of the mold created by moisture and frost, milk contamination, disease, particularly in the young stock, reduction of milk production because of the discomfort to cows, and many other troubles which are very unpleasant conditions.

Superphosphate Held Best For Sugar Beet Fertility

Ordinary superphosphate is the best source of phosphate when used as a fertilizer for sugar beets, wheat and barley, according to Dr. Sterling R. Olsen, USDA soil specialist and A. D. Robert Gardner, chemist at the Colorado A&M college experiment station.

Experiments on various fertlizers containing radioactive phosphorus indicate that calcium superphosphate was a close second.

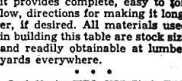

Use of Green Color in Spring Food Menus Will Enhance Appeal

WHETHER IT'S a party you're planning or just a family menu you're preparing, take a tip from nature and use the delicate green colors of foods generously. They'll give the ill of spring to your meals.

The green of vegetables may be combined with white or yellow to great advantage for appetizing meals as well as colorful tables. If you're cooking the green vegetable, it's important to remember that overcooking will make the delicate green look dull as well as lose important nutrients, so keep one eye on the clock.

This is the time, too, when you can use many of the green vegetables in salads in raw form. Keep them crisp so there's no wilting and you'll have foods as fresh as the season itself.

IF YOU'RE PLANNING a St. Patrick's day party for older or youngsters, you'll like this salad. Sprinkle with Parsley (Serves 4)

- 1 package lime-flavored gelatin
1 cup hot water
1 cup canned grapefruit syrup
1 cup drained, canned grapefruit
1/2 cup sliced stuffed olives
Salad greens
Mayonnaise or French dressing

Asparagus tips riding on toast points with smooth, well-flavored cheese sauce makes a tasty spring-like dish for luncheon or supper. The green and yellow color scheme which this combination makes will make a welcome sight for winter-weary appetites.

ASPARAGUS, that aristocratic vegetable, which comes into season early in Spring is sometimes called "sparrow" or grass. But whatever you call it, this hand-some green-dipped vegetable is one of the true "appetite treats" of the season.

The vegetable can be changed from a supplementary to a main dish if you serve it on toast with a cheese sauce because cheese is a high grade protein food. The cheese sauce is also an excellent aid to remember if you want to add interest to leftover vegetables.

ASPARAGUS on Toast with Cheese Sauce
2 tablespoons butter
4 tablespoons flour
2 cups milk
1/2 pound American cheese, shredded
Salt, pepper
Hot, cooked asparagus tips
Toast points

Make cream sauce with the butter, flour and milk. When thick and smooth, add the shredded cheese and stir until it is melted. Garnish to taste. Place each serving of asparagus on 2 toast points and cover with a generous amount of hot cheese sauce.

If you want to make a spring vegetable platter that looks pretty as well as one which interests winter-laid appetites, this next recipe is just the thing:

- 'Spring Vegetable Platter (Serves 6)
1 pound green beans
4 medium carrots, cut in strips
1 box frozen asparagus
1/2 dozen hard-cooked eggs, chopped
1/2 cup butter
2 tablespoons lemon juice

Cook green beans in boiling, salted water for 30 minutes. Cook carrots in boiling salted water for 15 minutes. Cook spinach without water 5-8 minutes. Arrange spinach in center of platter and garnish with eggs. Arrange drained green beans and carrots in spoke fashion around the spinach. Pour over them a sauce of the butter melted and mixed with lemon juice. Garnish the platter with the following: Roll slices of luncheon meat spread with cooked corned beef or any sweet pickles. Fasten with toothpicks.

Lime Creamed Cauliflower? Stick 1/2 cup of salted almond meats in the white sauce after pouring it over the vegetable for appetite appeal. Young cabbage cooked in milk rather than water is delicious to taste. Melted butter mixed with lemon juice and chopped parsley makes an excellent sauce for whole cooked carrots. Cup of corn added to 3 cups of cooked corn makes a very tasty, crumbled bacon and a bit of sugar is delicious!

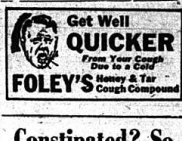

Wayne University Records Lessons For Use by Blind

DETROIT.—In a cramped little room Donald Jenks, a Wayne university freshman, sits down before a recording machine and begins to read from a textbook.

At first he is hesitant, but soon, following instructions from assistant librarian Ted Manheim, he is reading with confidence. His voice is grooved into a seven inch plastic disc revolving before him.

Jenks is one of about 80 volunteers helping out in Wayne's program recording textbooks for blind students.

A few days later his record is spinning on a turntable in the room of Alfred Platz, a blind student studying history. Platz listens and occasionally takes notes on a little slate.

Besides Platz are other records with other, unknown voices. Each one contains 15 minutes of reading on each side. No longer does the blind student have to adjust his studies to time as he can make an appointment with a reader.

Procedure Outlined This, in brief, is how Wayne's textbook recording program works. The records have suddenly given six blind students at the university a whole new approach to their studies.

To make all this possible the volunteer readers work tirelessly in the university's only available space, a virtual closet adjoining the library reading room. Every day several students give their time so that their voices will bring knowledge to the few who cannot see.

So far more than 2,200 pages have been grooved on 175 disks. Blind students all have portable "talking book" record players loaned by the government and they need no extra equipment to take advantage of the project.

"We are able to record almost everything that's asked for by the blind students," says Dr. G. Flint Purdy, chief librarian. Dr. Purdy envisions a whole library of recorded textbooks.

"We're trying to look way ahead," he says. "We're hoping to build up a collection of elementary texts that can be used over and over."

Students Enthusiastic Platz expresses the blind student's enthusiasm when he says: "It's much easier to study this way. I don't have to take so many notes when I can play the records over and over."

The university has three recording machines, two on loan from the county library. Records cost 11 cents apiece and the university foots all the costs.

Manheim, who spends almost all his time supervising the program, plans to have Braille inscriptions marked in the center of disks to enable listeners to identify them easily.

Librarian Purdy is interested in seeing whether the project will encourage more blind students to undertake college work. He says he knows of no other school carrying on a similar project.

"Students come back glowing with delight after using the records," he says. "If the program helps one intelligent blind student who would not otherwise make the grade get through school, then it will be worth while."

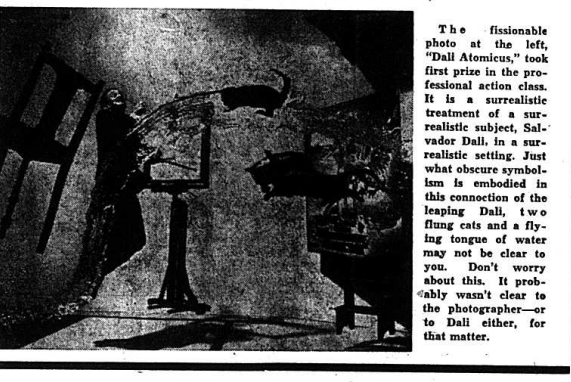

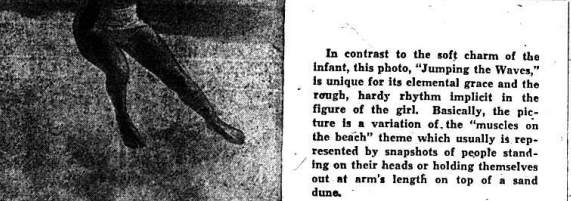
There They Stood With Their Cameras

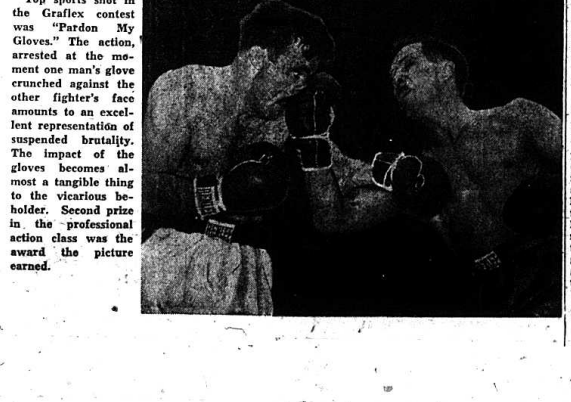
