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## AROUND THE HOUSE

Try slicing a little onion into the frying pan when frying fish—it minimizes that fishy odor.

Warm butter and sirup together when having pancakes; it's quick, easy, economical, and tasty.

For flavorful vegetables, drop those which grow above ground into to boil in cold water. Green beans, carrots, etc., will retain more of their appetizing color, too.

Cross towels, napkins, etc. hang between parallel lines to save steps, and minimizing space needed for drying extra large washing.

Make an extra treat for the youngsters by cooking bits of left-over pie dough. Cut in odd shapes, brush with butter, sprinkle with a little cinnamon and sugar; bake in quick oven until light brown and crisp.

Wilted carrots will freshen almost anywhere if allowed to stand in cold water for a little while.

When boiling rice, have water boiling furiously and drop rice into it so slowly that water never ceases to boil. Do not stir; stir kernels with fork and shake Kettle occasionally to prevent rice from sticking to bottom of kettle.

For a real Sunday morning brunch treat, serve baked apples stuffed with raisins and almonds. Four apricot nuclei, 2 eggs, 1/2 apples and bake them several times while baking.

State Passes Law To Make New Tax Commissions By 1950

Frankfort, Ky. The special session of legislature recently ended provided the incentive and the tools to enable the taxpayers to every county in the Commonwealth to have the fair assessment of property that they have been discussing for over half a century. This statement was made by Commissioner of Revenue H. Clyde Reeves in discussing the forthcoming examinations being held here. He qualified applicants for the office of County Tax Commissioner.

The County Tax Commissioner, Reeves statement continued, whose official title was formerly County Assessor, is no longer a part of county government. He is now vital and important part of local government. The local tax rate, property and being of the schools and amount of local government service depend on his ability and willingness to do a fair job of assessing property.

Beginning in 1950 the lowest salary that a County Tax Commissioner in any county will receive is \$200 a month. It ranges up to the constitutional limit of \$5,000 annually, depending on the value assessed property in the county. He also provided with deputies when required.

The new law also requires the fiscal court in each county to provide the County Tax Commissioner with a suitable office, furniture and equipment. He is also one county official who must pass an examination before he is eligible to even get his name on the ballot in a primary election.

The bill also provides that "Each County Tax Commissioner shall assess at his fair cash value all property which he has in his duty to assess." And "The property of one person shall not be assessed willfully or intentionally at a lower or higher relative value than another and grossly discriminatory than the same class of property of valuation in the county." It also provides for intentional discrimination.

It is required to make a diligent effort to locate identify and assess property. He must also engage in official duties at least five days per week during regular working hours.

The provision is also made that if the Tax Commissioner assesses any property at a greater value than that listed by the taxpayer or assessed on a listed property he must serve notice on the taxpayer of such action.

This bill, along with the companion bills passed by the session, enables the taxpayers of Kentucky to begin the solution of the property assessment problems, Reeves concluded.

**SAVE CHILDREN FEDERATION INCREASED IN 1948**  
The Save the Children Federation's services to children and its income both increased in 1948, according to the official annual report made public today by Dr. John R. Voris, president.  
The national child service organization's income received an all-time high of \$3,312,030.93, of which \$1,243,222.77 was in cash and \$2,068,808.18 was in commodities.  
The Federation estimates that at least 15,000 American children, otherwise unable to attend school in their own country, were enabled to do so as a result of its clothing program, which reached an estimated 46,600 families. The total number of U.S. children benefited as a result of the program was 116,800.  
In 1948, the Federation shipped more than 700,000 pounds of supplies for children overseas. Recipients included 2,725 individually sponsored children and 31,500 children sponsored in 1,050 school units of 30 children per unit. An additional 21,500 children received help by sharing in the clothing and materials provided by such school sponsorships.  
Through the Federation, U.S. sponsors and their children or schools in Europe exchanged

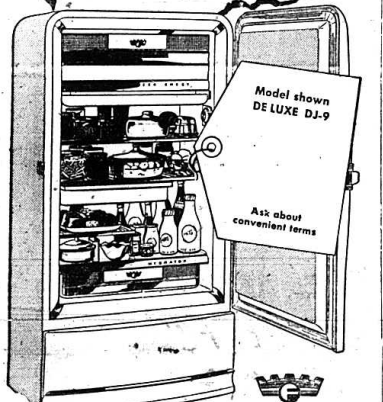

A national Christmas appeal resulted in Christmas parties at 1,078 of the little county schools.
