**FIRST AID to the AILING HOUSE.**

**QUESTION:** Our drains are stopped up very often in spite of the fact that we have had 1 1/2 pipes cleared by a tree-rooter machine. I am of the opinion that it is a clogged vent and not tree roots in the pipes. Can you give me any advice?

**ANSWER:** It is possible that the pitch of the horizontal soil pipe is insufficient, so that grease and other sediment matter congeals and closes up the line and retards the flow of waste matter to the sewer. Re-laying of the pipe is one solution, if that is the case. I doubt if a clogged vent would cause the condition. The other solution to such a problem is to install a grease trap in the line from the kitchen sink and clean it out periodically.

**Home Accident Deaths Number 35,000 in 1948**

CHICAGO.—Home is where the heart is—and where the heart of the accident problem is, too. There were 35,000 home accident deaths in 1948—which makes the home America's No. 1 accidental killer.

Falls were the greatest cause of home deaths last year, resulting in 18,200 fatalities. Burns, scalds and explosions came next, with a total of 6,000 deaths. Mechanical suffocation caused 1,800 deaths, to rank third in 1948.

Special studies show that more than 25 per cent of fatal home accidents occur in the bedroom. The yard and kitchen are the next most hazardous locations at home, causing about 12 and 10 per cent of the deaths respectively.

**U.S. Motorists Learn to Drive More Slowly**

CHICAGO.—American motorists are learning to drive more safely, according to the 1949 edition of the National Safety Council's statistical yearbook, "Accident Facts." The 1948 traffic volume was the greatest in the nation's history—8 per cent greater than 1947. Yet the mileage death rate—deaths per 100,000,000 vehicle miles—was the lowest in the nation's history. The 8.0 rate was 30 per cent lower than the average rate of 11.5 through World War II. If the higher rate had prevailed last year, 14,000 more lives would have been lost.

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WOMAN'S WORLD

Imagination and Little Cost Change Space into Play Room

MOST FAMILIES agree they should have game, hobby or work rooms, but little do they know for the simple reason that most people are afraid of the cost.

The cost of these rooms runs much less than any other room in the home, and the hours of pleasure they can provide can usually be reconciled with the budget since little outside, or more expensive entertainment need be provided.

Much of the work on these rooms can be done by members of the family, and the materials required are not usually expensive, or, at least, they need not be.

Actually your imagination is the only limit as to what can be done with the room. With a few pointers to apply to your particular problem, and some guides to point the way, make it a project to convert attic or basement into a recreation room for the family. You'll love doing it.

Decide first on the nature of the room. Some people like it for games which cannot be played in the other rooms, and some others like it for music or snack bar; some like to have the room for their hobby, woodwork, photography, etc.

Architectural Problems If your recreation room is going to be in the basement, you will probably run into the problem of hiding the furnace unless this has been built in the laundry unit, or separated by walls or partitions when the unit was constructed.



Draw a plan of the basement, then block off the furnace. Include blocking off the coal bin, too, or your oil tanks, whichever may be the case.

These may be partitioned off with wall board, but you'll naturally have to leave a door to get into the unit.

Walls are usually in need of some kind of finishing, if the room is to be in the basement. Here again, use wallboard, or if you want to cut the cost, paneling which simulates wood. A still less expensive treatment, use wallpaper that simulates some of the natural woods like knotted pine.

to disguise the pipes, it's usually best to build a false ceiling of pine studding and a dropped ceiling nailed to this type of studding. This will help keep the room clean, since no dust can sift in.

How to Solve Floor Problems Floors in a recreation room have to serve a practical purpose, and the floor covering may be one of three: concrete or cement, wood over concrete and linoleum or asphalt tile.

Asphalt tile and linoleum are considered flooring rather than floor coverings, and both offer good possibilities for the type of room under consideration.

When using linoleum over a wood covering, it should be cemented over a felt lining. Because of its resiliency, asphalt tile is recommended for concrete floors in direct contact with the ground.

In choosing the flooring or covering, bear in mind what time is available for keeping the floor in good condition. Wood floors will have to be stained, then shellacked and waxed, and have to be refinished upon the use, wood floors will have to be refinished with the stain or paint occasionally.

Linoleum can be washed and perhaps a finish applied every once in a while. It does, however, get a wearing finish which will prevent stains, if these are the problem.

Sturdy, Comfortable Furniture is Must Lots of leisure is possible in the choice of furniture for the room. If there is enough odd furniture in the home, or porch furniture which gets little use during the winter, the recreation room will take it nicely.

A coat or two of paint, sturdy also covers and other small innovations will convert many pieces into ideal use for a play room. It should be sturdy and comfortable.

You'll want a chest or two in the room to hold any play equipment in neatness and order. If the room has a table tennis table, or if the floor is marked for games, most of the furniture will necessarily be placed against the wall, so you see, little furniture will be needed in this case.

PEAK CLIMBER Californian Holds Record

SANTA BARBARA, Calif.—A retired, real estate man is the first person ever to climb the 67 highest peaks in the United States.

He is John G. Graham, an athletic 68, who claimed the record after scaling North Palisade peak in California, and Grand Peak in Colorado in a one-week expedition.

His goal for 15 years, Graham said in an interview, has been to conquer every V. S. mountain higher than 14,000 feet. He listed 67 such pinaculas. The World Almanac lists only 62.

He has climbed up all 14,000 footers in Colorado, California and Washington, Graham said, the only states in which the giants are listed.

First Ascent in 1935 He tried his first mountain during a Colorado vacation in 1935. It was small, but the experience was a challenge.

"It gave me an unusual feeling to be able to see such great distances and such inspiring scenery," he said.

Originally from New York City, Graham had a chance to hike to his heart's content when he moved to Colorado. He said he has since lived in Colorado Springs and Denver before World War II he became the eighth person to climb all 67 of the 14,000 foot peaks in that state.

"Mountain climbing finally gets to be as competing as a sport," he said. "It's the same feeling of accomplishment you notice after a good score in golf. You match your skill, strength and endurance against the mountain, which can really throw out the obstacles."

Needs Pushes Through His toughest ascent, Graham said, was his last—North Palisade, in California's Sierrita Mountains. He made it in July, before winter snow and ice had fully melted.

Approaching with his party from the north, he crossed the Palisade glacier, the most southerly active glacier in North America. They crossed the Bergschrund, a crevasse in the snow field at the head of the glacier, on an ice bridge.

Thin ropes and ice axes most of the way, it took them 10 hours to reach the summit.

The descent on the south side was slower. It was getting dark. Graham paused on a narrow cliffside ledge to fasten a rope. A second rope was fastened to an available ledge of rock and snow to descend the mountain directly in front of him. A huge boulder whizzed by his head. The pause had saved his life.

Variety Gives Lunch Boxes Interest (See Recipes Below)

Sandwich Tricks PROMENADERS who put together lunch boxes daily are apt to fall into just as much of a rut about them as the school children or husbands who eat them.

Hot beverages and soups are particularly interesting in cold weather. A few unexpected surprises in the way of candied dried fruits, confections and new cookies or some relatives for the sandwiches will make a constant delight for the person opening the packed lunch.

Plan for lunch boxes of at least a week at a time, so that the same breads and fillings are not repeated too often. Add special and appetizing seasonings to the sandwich fillings; prepare foods carefully and neatly and see how much fun this task can become!

Make a note of the lunch box by setting a tray of necessary materials in an easy-to-reach cupboard. This should contain a knife, for spreading as well as one for cutting the bread. Waxed paper and bags, cartons or covered glass cups, rubber bands, tin foil, and crumblers, etc., should be on the tray.

In the refrigerator, keep another section or tray with the fillings of bacon, crisp fried and crumbled, and relishes, so that you need get out only the two trays to get together the lunch.

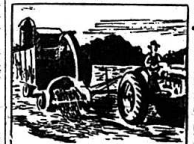
alfalfa to help prevent erosion, increase hay yield and make curing of the alfalfa easier. The tobacco land will have a cover crop of small grain and vetch each year. Mr. Bullock will also seed 4 acres of Ky 31 fescue and ladino clover as a pasture demonstration. The remainder of his pasture will be orchard grass, ladino clover and lespedeza.

There have been 59 farm plans completed for farmers in the Broodhead Soil Conservation District by Clay Colson, Soil Conservation Service Techni-

cian, during the first nine months of this year. Farmers may make requests for plans any time and soilmaps along with complete soil and water conservation plans will be developed as quickly as possible.

**CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER 1**



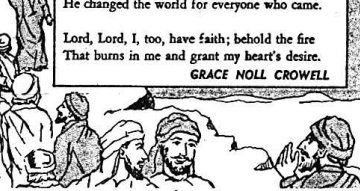
