County Census To Be Taken During The Month of April

Bill M. Cash, Brookhead, has been appointed crew leader for Rockcastle county for the forthcoming population census. It has been announced by George Pigg, district supervisor, Somerset, crew leaders training class will be conducted by a technical expert from the Census Bureau Field Staff. This class is scheduled to be conducted daily from March 16th through Wednesday March 22nd at the District Office, Somerset, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m.

After a week of training the crew leaders will be dispersed to their respective counties and will in turn train enumerators to be selected for instruction during the last week in March.

Applications for employment as enumerators are still being accepted and it is expected that all enumerators will be selected by March 24th.

Roll for 1950 enumeration jobs must be citizens of the United States, have a high school education or furnish evidence of comparable experience, be in good physical health, and of excellent character and between the ages of 21 to 65.

Applicants with veterans preference who meet the requirements will be given priority over non-veteran applicants.

Applicants for enumerator jobs in rural areas must have an automobile available.

The actual field work will begin April 1st and carry through the month of May. This census will cover Housing, Farming and Population.

Mt. Vernon - Somerset Road Contract Let

The State announced late today it had contracted for improvements to Kentucky's highways that would cost \$2,132,751.30.

The announcement by the Highway Department calls for repairs to 109.162 miles of roads. Federal funds will be used in financing part of the improvements.

The state projects include the letting of the contract for the Mt. Vernon-Somerset Road from the Hicks-Freeman Construction Company of Prospect, Ky., for \$71,185.32.

This new highway joining No. 10 will lead from the entrance of the Herndon farm, south of Mt. Vernon and join the newly constructed highway at Wabed, a distance of 3.216 miles.

The project will be finished this summer and will offer a fine new road into Somerset.

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS Miners Cited on Contempt Charge; Compromise Reached on Oleo Bill; U.S. - Bulgarian Relations Severed

PIT MENGE

Federal Judge Richmond B. Keech wrote a new angle into the continuing fight between the United Mine Workers and the operators. The judge cited the miners themselves for criminal contempt on grounds that the 370,000 UMW members willfully and wrongfully ignored his back-to-work order.

THE NEW ANGLE was that this time the UMW's boss, John L. Lewis was not even mentioned in the citation. Observers pointed out that the citation could lead to heavy fines against the union. On two previous occasions, Lewis was named defendant when strike issue came into federal court.

There was some speculation that omission of Lewis' name from the citation might mean that the government felt that Lewis had been really sincere when he ordered his miners back to work—but movement officials would comment on the subject.

Judge Keech's action came as the miners' griped that the coal beds, with many homes' coal bins nearly empty. In the meantime, violence flared in the eastern Kentucky coal fields as roving mobs wrecked equipment at several mines and beat up at least 11 miners. Ten were taken to the Knott county jail and one was attacked in Harlan county.

SIXTEEN AUTOMOBILES were seized in the past few days. A number of mines, Kentucky state police reported. Twenty-eight bullet-belted miners were fired into a mine man's car. Two more were killed and two automobiles belonging to miners were overturned.

As for the hope of a compromise attempt to end the mine walkout, no one would say how effective it would be. It was recalled "if there is no limit on the penalty, no compromise may impose for contempt, but the Constitution forbids 'unusual and excessive' punishment, and the present fine imposed reduced the UMW's contempt fine from three million dollars to \$750,000.

Red Cross Did an Efficient Job for Troops Despite False Rumors, Gen. Marshall Found, Investigating Wartime Gripes of Our GI's

By General George C. Marshall G.I. COMPLAINTS, during and after the war, frequently reached the office of the chief of staff of the army. As military head of the army in those days, I had frequent so-called "stampalings" made of soldiers' reactions in this country and in all overseas theaters. Many adjustments or corrections of our policies were made as a result of the information so gathered.

Most of the gripes were directed against phases of army discipline and regulation. Some were concerned with real or alleged grievances of a new class of officers. Food was brought in, and the picture was made and I kicked against officers enjoying privileges which were not general.

The Red Cross did not charge for such items as cigarettes, chaparral, produced garments or other articles. On a number of occasions Red Cross supplies were mixed up with army supplies in the hastily organized warehouses or open field dumps and subsequently offered for sale, but not by the Red Cross.

Occasional stories that the Red Cross sold blood or blood plasma are manifestly untrue. The Red Cross did not administer blood; it acted only as the blood collection agency for the army and navy.

It seemed to be a surprise to some ex-servicemen to learn that the Red Cross had no authority to grant leaves. This function is reserved exclusively for the military authorities. The Red Cross does, however, very bona conditions by request whenever it appears that a soldier or sailor is unwell. I found for home conditions on the matter of loans, I found that the Red Cross disbursed about 74 million dollars in loans and free grants to our soldiers and sailors between 1941 and 1945. These loans, non-interest bearing, and these grants were for emergencies.

WHO SHOULD BE BAPTIZED?
 Lenis E. Kineman, Minister
 Mt. Vernon Christian Church

We have discussed the subject of baptism in relation to the New Testament from of baptism and also its nature in regard to the remission of sins. We will now attempt to give the New Testament answer in regard to the subject for baptism, who should be baptized? Turning to our New Testament for our answer, we

find, "He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." (Mark-16:16). Paul, and Silas in answer to the Philippian Jailor's inquiry said, "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved." "And he took them the same hour of the night and washed their stripes; and was baptized, he and all his, straightway." (Acts 16:33). On Pentecost, as recorded in Acts 2, the people were told to repent and be baptized. Paul was told to arise and be baptized, but not before he had believed on the Lord Jesus Christ. A careful study of all the recorded conversions in the book of Acts will reveal that all first believed in Christ, repented, confessed him, and then were baptized. We are left to conclude, then, that all those who are baptized must first believe on Christ, else Christian Baptism remains an empty rite to them. There is no Scriptural ground for infant baptism, because an infant cannot believe in Christ. Baptism of infants can be found nowhere in the Scriptures and those who contend for such do so on inference only, which is not and never can be authoritative for such a practice. Study the 7th, 8th, 9th, 10th, 16th, and 18th chapters of Acts for a better understanding of Christian Baptism in regard to conversion. "Many Corinthians hearing, believed, and were baptized" (Acts 18:8).
