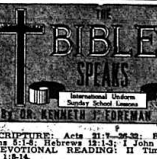

And that is morale—that combination of hope, confidence and confidence which spurs the soldier, airman, sailor, marine or coast guardsmen to give his best for his country and his service, and himself. The man who has it, whether in peace or war, is a match for a dozen without it.

The maintenance of good morale is a primary military responsibility. All commanding officers recognize the importance of such factors as pay, food, shelter, religious facilities, training, sanitation, medical care, proper discipline, leave, recreation, and welfare activities. They recognize also another factor, in any kind of emergency, the serviceman's morale, affects the service man's deep personal concern as to the welfare of his fellow soldiers.

And that is where the American Red Cross comes into the picture. Its importance to the well-being of the servicemen of our democracy was one of the compelling reasons for my leaving private life to assume leadership of this great organization.

A young married man, ordered to overseas duty, was aboard a transport about to sail when the Red Cross field director at the port received a wire from a Red Cross chapter in a distant city. It stated the man's wife had been rushed to a hospital, gave the doctor's diagnosis, and urged the man's immediate presence. The field director phoned the commanding officer of the replacement center.

The CO alerted with his post surgeon as to the seriousness of the diagnosis, had leave papers prepared, and approved a Red Cross loan for the trip home. But when the field director arrived at the dock, the ship's gangplank had already been raised and it seemed impossible to get the serviceman off. An alert crane operator on the dock offered to help, swung the long arm of the crane up over the rail, and lowered the man to the dock.

In another instance, a 20 year old draftee seriously burned by an explosion, was flown from Japan to a military hospital in the United States. Although he could see, his face and eyelids were in need of much plastic surgery. His hand muscles were contracted. He was in great pain. The doctors and nurses were there with their skill and considerate attention. But also at his side were those team mates of the medical staff, the Red Cross chapters, a recreation worker, and their trained volunteer aides.

The boy's mother, who spoke no English, was anxious to visit him. He wanted to see her, but wished to wait until more plastic surgery could lessen the shock of his appearance. The Red Cross helped him in planning for his mother's visit and in writing letters to her. Then it assisted him and his mother through the trying experience of her visit, and helped him keep his courage up when he realized that his hands were permanent.

Later, the Red Cross planned with him and his family for his vocational and social adjustment on his return to civilian life, and assisted him in filing his claim for pension. All this involved many cooperative activities with doctors, nurses, and rehabilitation personnel of the hospital, and constant correspondence with the Red Cross chapters throughout the country.

I cite these stories to show that the servicemen have in the Red Cross an understanding counselor and present friend throughout the military, but not an organization of a great civilian agency one helpful arm extended into the servicemen's setting, the other reaching into the home.

Stalk Disposal—The destruction of corn stalks and other refuse in which borers over-

winter is a cultural practice that is desirable and is especially effective when done according to a community work plan. Clean plowing is still the best procedure to achieve this end and may be done either in the fall or spring. A disk or a stalk shredder is not recommended, but should not be substituted for a plow properly adjusted to bury stalks in place.

Insecticides DDT and Ryania are the two materials which have given to date most satisfactory results. Of these, DDT is more available and less expensive.

1. 50% Wettable DDT powder may be used in high pressure-high gallonage spray equipment in field or market sweet corn. Use 3 pounds per 50 to 100 gallons of water and apply to one acre. A wetting agent should be added to high gallonage sprays. Low pressure-low gallonage sprayers may also be used.

2. 2 to 5 gallons of water-amount of DDT (3 pounds per acre) in not less than 15 gallons of water per acre.

3. DDT emulsion sprays may be used in low pressure sprayers. Use 3 quarts of a xylene-based, low boiling point emulsifier in 5 to 10 gallons of water and apply to one acre. For airplane spraying also use 3 quarts per acre and apply to 100 gallons of water.

4. DDT dusts. Use a 5% dust at the rate of 40 pounds per acre and 10% dust at the rate of 20 pounds per acre using either ground or air equipment.

5. Ryania sprays are best used in high-pressure-high gallonage equipment and are recommended for use or market sweet corn at the rate of 6 pounds of 100% Ryania to 75 to 100 gallons of water applied to one acre—Ryania sprays or dusts do not leave an objectionable residue on fodder fed to livestock.

6. Ryania dusts may be used for either field or market sweet corn. Use a 40% dust at the rate of 30 to 40 pounds per acre with ground or air equipment.

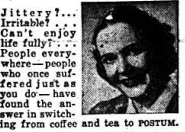

FIRST AID TO THE AILING HOUSE
BY ROGER C. WHITMAN
QUESTION: How would you remove a spot on an office floor about 2x2 feet, caused by dragging feet when spinning in chair from desk to typewriter, without sanding the whole floor? The floor has had a coat of stain and two coats of shellac.

ANSWER: Take off the remains of the shellac by quick wiping with denatured alcohol. Then apply one or two coats of fresh shellac, thinning them down with denatured alcohol, about one-half feather out the strokes. Do not expect perfect results, if you intend to do over the whole floor at some time, you might consider a penetrating floor wax or penetrating floor seal. These finishes are not apt to show scratches.
