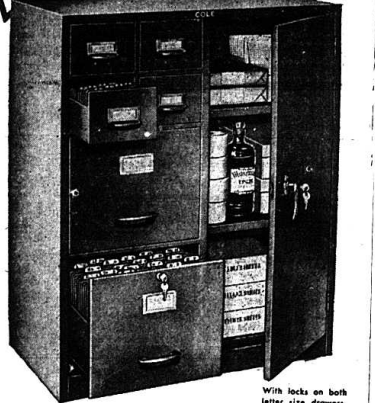

GRAY THEATRE OPEN AGAIN

After remaining closed for a period of two weeks the Gray Theatre at Brookhead will reopen Sunday, April 29.

Mr. Gray announced the closing of his theatre in protest against an ordinance passed by the city board of Brookhead on April 4, assessing an amusement tax of \$100 a year against his show house and the Brookhead Fair grounds.

Mr. Gray claimed that the ordinance was discriminatory inasmuch as no other business institutions were assessed. It was reported today that the ordinance had been settled by compliance with the ordinance and Mr. Gray announced the reopening date of the theatre, this week.

County Agent's Notes

More 4-H Strawberries Being Planted
15,000 more strawberry plants have been distributed to 4-H members this spring in Rockcastle County. A total of 4-H Club boys and girls have signed up to put out 1/4 acre each of strawberries this year, which will considerably increase our county's strawberry acreage.

A few failures have occurred since strawberries were commercially introduced in this county in 1947. However, more and more farmers are becoming aware of the value of strawberries as a cash crop in Rockcastle and the mothers and dads of 4-H members are making greater efforts to help their children succeed.

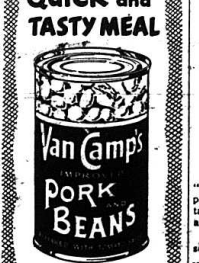

Need Claimed to Keep GI's Abroad
If Continent to be Fully Guarded; Berlin Stocks Up for Emergencies

EUROPE: Just in Case
The demands of the cold war are being met by steadily more vast and insistent. First and continuing is money—American dollars to stem the tide of communism and protect itself—so the theory goes—by protecting Europe.

NOW IT IS MEN Europe wants. American's to guarantee the continent. A permanent garrison of American troops in western Europe ends—ends as the Atlantic pact defense, several European experts believe.

THE EXPERTS quoted argue that American troops would provide on-the-spot leadership for Europe's defense forces, and would serve as a reassurance to France if German troops eventually are too powerful in the western European defense.

At present, as the pact alliance rounds out its first year, its 12 member powers have about 22 divisions of varying strength and effectiveness among them.

The normal complement of a division is 15,000 men, and a total of 330,000 potential fighting men ready to meet any attack upon the pact signatories.

Under such a setup it is conceivable that America might have to bolster the defensive line, but the question is how sincere is Europe in efforts to rehabilitate and protect itself?

BERLIN: Fear Crisis
In the event of a crisis such as that precipitated by the Russian blockade in 1948, Berlin was ready. The west has stocked the city's shelves with enough food and supplies to make a mockery of any new blockade.

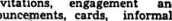

Emergency Pasture Keeps Milk Output High When Summer Heat Dries Up Grass



Well-fertilized pastures insure continued high milk production. NOW is the time to plan for emergency pasture that will keep milk production high next summer when droppery weather dries up your regular pastures, advises the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee. A few acres of Sudan grass seeded in late spring can be a life saver when bluegrass fades in July and August, or if there is not a sufficient acreage of legume-grass mixtures to give dairy cows all the succulent, nutritious forage they need. Agronomists say the best time to seed Sudan grass is about two weeks after corn planting. It should not be grazed until it is 18 inches high.
