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County Agent's Notes

The Early Bird Catches The Worm

Clyde Linville is "The Early Bird." He may not have caught the worm, but he has the early garden. We certainly will have to give him credit for carrying out the idea with his garden. His garden is now furnishing the family with vegetables and has been for two weeks in spite of "bad" weather. "A red ground," and "too cold for vegetables to grow." After all he has caught the worm or beat him to the first crop. The

Linville's are now eating the products from their garden which might have been divided with the insects had they waited to prepare soil, plant the seeds and cultivate under the weather was right, the ground dry and mellow and warmer temperatures. Garden insects will soon start their destructive work. Precautions with insecticides and a duster spray are the only defense measures to be used to stop their onslaught. It may be too late to get a duster or spray

and insecticides if put off too long. Prepare now and begin now to dust or spray to save the garden. A circular on How to Control Garden Insects, can be secured at the County Agent's office by calling or writing for it. Army Worms Dr. W. A. Price, Entomologist at the Ky. Agricultural Experiment Station, has the following to say about the army worms: A rather heavy flight of army worms at this time indicate that there will be outbreaks of this pest in certain parts of the state this year. It is anticipated that they will be in evidence in fields of barley and grass within a few days. Small worms may be found now in greatest numbers at the base of plants where the growth is rank. It is suggested that farmers examine their fields now to determine the location of the pests and the extent of the infestation. The worms can be killed readily with a treatment of Chloridane used as a spray or a dust at the rate of 1 1/2 to 2 pounds of actual Chloridane per acre. Toxaphene at this same dosage and in the same form may also be used with equal success. Crops treated with these chemicals should not be harvested or pastured sooner than 30 days after the application. It is necessary to apply the insecticides only to that portion of the field where the worms are operating.

If for any reason it is not advisable to use Chloridane or Toxaphene then poisoned baits should be employed. This is made by mixing while dry, 25 pounds of bran with 1 pound of poison and adding enough water to moisten. Broadcast this mixture, in late afternoon, at the rate of 12 pounds per acre.
