K. U.'s principal electric generating plants are the Lexington, Paducah, Tyrone, Pineville, Green River, Noone, Kille, Graham and Eastington steam-powered plants and the Dix Dam hydro-electric station. The largest plants, Tyrone, 18 miles from Lexington, and Green River, near Central City, were built since the war. An additional unit to double the capacity of the Pineville plant is scheduled for completion next May.

A 28-year-old Kentucky corporation with headquarters in Lexington, K.U. has no holding company connections. Seven of the nine members of its board of directors are Kentucky businessmen.

Principal officers are: R. M. Watt, president; Washington Reed, vice president; E. W. Brown, vice president and director of operations; and A. A. Tuttle, secretary and treasurer.

The list of towns where K.U. is acquiring C.P.S. electric properties includes Warsaw, Gallatin County; Owingsville

Bath County; Columbia, Adair County; Stepstone and Howard Mills, Montgomery County; Owenton, Pleasant Home and Long Ridge, Owen County; Crab Orchard and Preachersville, Lincoln County; Pine Hill, Brodhead, Livingston and Mt. Vernon, Rockcastle County; and Jamestown and Russell's et'l Springs, Russell County. Prior to acquiring the above towns K.U. served electric customers in 490 Kentucky towns.

AMERASIA CASE

McINERNEY, the assistant attorney general, was testifying in secret before the Tydings committee regarding the Amerasia documents in the Amerasia case.

Republican senators pricked up their ears. This was just what they had been looking for. The newspaper chain, now used for libel by one of the Amerasia defendants, has been claiming Communist. They knew each other well.
