Dear Mr Hoffman:

I am in receipt of a letter from Walter C. Herdman, Assistant Attorney General of the Commonwealth of Kentucky in which he states as follows:

"Under KRS 87.150, relating to Fifth class cities, it is provided that the city clerk shall be required to make a quarterly statement in writing showing the receipts and expenditures of the city for the preceding quarter and the amount remaining in the treasury. In conjunction with this Section it is provided under KRS 61.290 that with the exception of

counties containing a city of the first class, and cities required by law to publish an annual audit of their affairs (cities of the second, third and fourth class) every public officer of the city whose duty it is to collect, receive and have the custody, control or disbursement of public funds are required at the expiration of each fiscal year to prepare an itemized sworn statement of the funds collected, received or disbursed by him during the fiscal year just closed, and such statement or the audit report shall be published in full in the newspaper in the county having the largest bona fide circulation.

I am just wondering why this law is not carried out in the City of Mt. Vernon and why their statement was not published in The Signal, as it should have been.

Dear Mr Baker:

After making inquiry of various members of the city council of Mt. Vernon as to the reason why their 1938 financial statement was not published in The Signal we were advised that they had been in-

formed by the mayor and clerk that "The Signal's price for publication would be too high." That last time it was published in this paper the cost was between \$50 and \$75. That it should be let out by competitive bidding.

Here are the facts. The last statement published by the city was in 1943. The cost to the city was not \$75, but \$23.

If we have been correctly informed the council not only failed to save money by submitting to bids. (The Signal was not asked to make a bid) but lost money and also failed in its intentions since it is not a job to be let by bids.

We would also like to refer to Sec. 87.030 (3) which reads: "Every ordinance shall be signed by the mayor, attested by the clerk, and published at least once in the newspaper having the largest circulation, which is published in the city." Also: Sec. 87.220—"All advertisements that are required by law to be published by a city of the 5th class shall be published in the newspaper having the largest circulation, which is published in the city."

Sec. 424.030 KRS provides that "rates allowed publisher are 50c per single column inch set in 8 point solid type." This was the rate charged, with no stretching.

Interpretation of these laws should be easy. Mr. Baker, since the Signal is the only newspaper printed in Mt. Vernon or Rockcastle county and has the largest bona fide circulation of any newspaper coming into the city or county.

A SIMPLE STUDY TABLE for a school child's room of study corner

Place the desk against a light tinted wall; a light wall can reflect 20 per cent more light on the work surface than a dark wall. No need to repaint—a simple tackboard, made at home and mounted above the desk will do the trick. It will also serve as a spot for mementoes, and as a handy bulletin board. Mount on the tackboard two inexpensive pin-up lamps with diffusing bowls and opaque shades. Install 100-watt bulbs. Keep the lamps 30 inches apart.

Be sure to measure their height from the desk carefully to make certain no direct light will fall in the child's eyes. Finally, put a light colored desk blotter on the desk to avoid harsh reflections from its surface.

Remember, when you provide your children with a properly lighted place to study, you not only help them to learn, but you help protect precious eyesight as well.

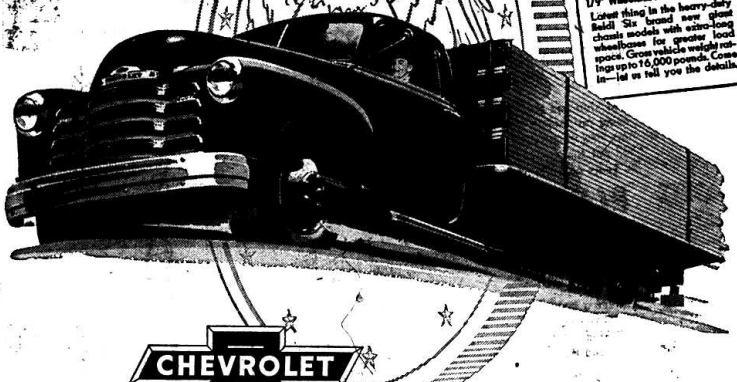
