Face Lifting Brings Old Pastures Back To Thrifty Growth

PURDUE University agronomists recommended a "face lifting" in September for old, rundown, weedy permanent pastures. A good renovation program supported by liming and the use of commercial fertilizer can bring a pasture back to lush, vigorous production, they say. First step in the program is a soil test for acidity and applications of limestone as needed. The job of making a seedbed on old sod can be satisfactorily done with a disc harrow or field cultivator, the agronomists say. The operation can be eased considerably by working the soil in one direction and then working it crosswise. New grasses can be seeded any time in September. Timothy and annual blue grass are the best grasses to supplement blue grass. How much these grasses increase pasture output depends on the legumes to be used in the mixture and the amount and analysis of fertilizer used. The agronomists say that a good legume seed mixture of 100 pounds per acre is two pounds of red clover, three pounds broadleaf trefoil and a quarter pound of Ladino clover. The agronomists stress that a good application of commercial fertilizer is essential in pasture renovation. They recommend adding 400 pounds per acre of 0-20-0 or 0-20-20 fertilizer at the time of seeding. The phosphates and potash fertilizer helps get the seeding off to a good start, provides nutrients the legumes need, and boosts pasture production.

Adding Plant Food to Fall Seeded Wheat Gives More Bushels at Less Cost Per Acre

Now is the time to begin to plan for fertilizing your fall seeded wheat. Adding the plant food will give you extra profits through more bushels of grain per acre at a lower cost per bushel. It will increase yields of alfalfa, sweet clover and grasses following wheat in the rotation, reports the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee. Many Midwestern farmers are getting from 40 to 50 bushels of wheat per acre by using good management methods, applying plenty of mixed fertilizer and growing the new, stiff-strawed, heavier producing varieties of wheat. Typical of what can be accomplished—where all these factors team together, were the results obtained by Harold Pirie, last year's wheat growing champion of southwestern Indiana. Pirie produced 57 1/2 bushels of wheat per acre. Then after combining the grain, he got a lush stand of alfalfa and sweet clover. Pirie had his soil tested; the preceding fall to find out its plant food needs. At seeding time he added 400 pounds per acre of a mixed fertilizer containing nitrogen, phosphate and potash. Early the following spring he top-dressed the wheat with extra fertilizer. The nitrogen gave the wheat new life and gave the legume

Farage Yields Upped 50% Per Cent With Lime and Fertilizer "GET REBLES with fertilizer if you want to make the most profit from crop and pasture land," advises Ray Wetherell, Fairchild county, Ohio, dairyman. He says it is cheaper than paying for extra land and labor. Wetherell practices what he preaches. He used about 100 pounds of fertilizer last year, reports Dr. D. R. Dodd, Ohio State University extension agronomist. Wetherell has found that 6 pays to add just as much fertilizer to pasture land as to crop land. By re-seeding a partly rundown permanent pasture two years ago, he increased production fivefold. On this field he seeded a nurse crop with a mixture of alfalfa and timothy. His 4-year rotation includes corn, small grain and two years of legume-grass crop for hay, grass silage and pas-

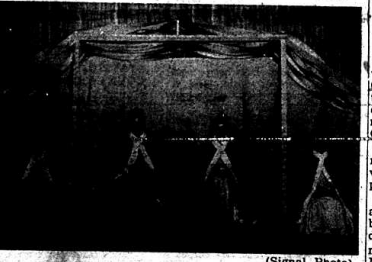

Know Your County

To familiarize Rockcastle Countians with agencies, organizations and groups working to make Rockcastle County a better place in which to live, the Signal this week is initiating a new feature—"Know Your County."

One of the organizations working for the betterment of the community is the Save the Children Federation which, a few weeks ago, sponsored the Negro play at the Mt. Vernon School.

Proceeds from the "Save the Children" plays are used in carrying out the school programs sponsored by the organization. At the last regular meeting of the County Federation also voted to buy playground equipment for the Livingston school, with the Livingston P. T. A. to match the federation's donation. The federation also voted to pay half in buying eye glasses for four Rockcastle County children. The Mt. Vernon club will match the donation for glasses.

Clothing Store
The SCPF also maintains a used clothing store in Mt. Vernon, where dresses can be bought for a dollar, heavy coats for as low as a dollar and shoes for 35 and 75 cents. Baby clothes, children's garments and other wearing apparel are sold by the pound.

The purpose of the store is to help needy families secure needed wearing apparel, and others are invited to patronize the store as the money is turned over to federation headquarters to purchase other items provided by Save the Children.

Mist of the clothing is shipped from larger cities, but local donations are accepted. The store is open each morning from 8 o'clock until noon and all day Saturday. Storekeeper is Mrs. Warren Carpenter.

Baby Layettes Provided
The Save the Children Federation is an international organization which a hundred dollars of the money is used in the county, national headquarters is set up to help those in war-torn countries. Baby layettes are distributed all over the world, as well as in Rockcastle County.

In the county the layettes are made by home economic students. At present home ec students in the Mt. Vernon and Livingston schools are working on 16 layettes, with each school to complete eight. The federation supplies diapers and shirts and flannel for the home ec students to make gowns, bibs, kimonos and other items needed to complete a layette. Baby clothing is also kept on hand in large supplies at the SCPF store. The store is located in the County Administration Building.

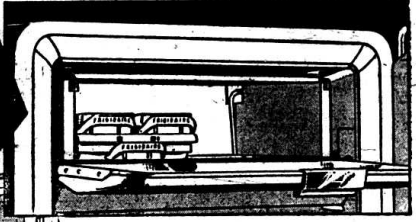
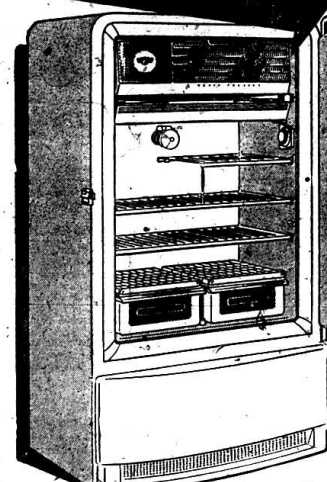
