Griffin once worked for the L. & N. Mr. Griffin wasn't there for the L. & N., either. He wasn't even vice-president. Mr. Griffin was only a section hand for the L. & N. It was during the summer vacation preceding his last year at high school that Father Griffin decided that "Young Unreliable" was old enough to start earning his board and keep.

Through that moment that dawned on the L. & N. Railroad became acquainted with the "Young Unreliable." Today Ralph Griffin can look back on his store as a railroader with only a slight chuckle, but in those days it was no laughing matter. The alarm clock went off at the first twitter of the birds and the sun was just topping the hills, and before the first snow was over the new overalls were soaked with tar and perspiration and the smell of hot mandanna smelled of creosote fumes.

It was all in a day's work and only after the second day did Mt. Vernon's Ralph W. Griffin decide not to become president of the L. & N. Railroad.

Scheduled for full operation in six months, Berea Rubber will relieve the near-overload condition of Parker's Cleveland Rubber Division. Annual output of the new plant is valued at \$1,500,000.

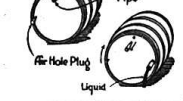

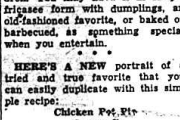

### ROCKCASTLE FACTS and STORIES

By RALPH GRIFFIN

Since many of our readers have probably never read these accounts of the Battle of Wild Cat Mountain, this column feels justified in using verbatim two eye-witness reports. They are taken from Battey & Perrin History of Kentucky.

Col. John Calhoun describes the fight as follows: "In less than twenty minutes the rebels, who were concealed in the woods, commenced firing when at almost the first fire Private McFarren, of Company D, was killed. In ten minutes more of the enemy appeared in front of our positions to the south, at a distance of half a mile, in the valley. They were in large numbers, and were over half an hour in passing by an open space in the woods, when they formed again in line. They soon came near us under cover of a wood, which we however rallied and formed again in good order and fought with good spirit. The enemy engaged was composed of a portion of Gen. Zollicoffer's command, and consisted of two regiments of Tennesseans, under the command of Col. Newman and Cummings. They charged up the hill upon us and were met by a galling and deadly

Our 'sustained' nearly exhausted. Under these circumstances I deemed it proper the next day to fall back. Enemy's camp said to be 7,000 strong, with strong reserves near at hand."

The Union loss in the engagement, as officially reported, was four killed and eight hundred wounded. Stories have been told in Rockcastle, back in earlier days, of large numbers of Confederate dead being thrown into the river and carted away by their own troops, for the purpose of concealing the actual number of those slain, but these official reports doubtless cover the situation about as it actually happened. As an interesting personal sidelight, my father, J. F. Griffin, always claimed to remember having heard the cannon firing at Wild Cat. He described the fear which the sounds caused in his immediate family, particularly the terror of his mother. Dad was hardly four years of age at the time but it is possible for the mind to retain an impression, even at that age, if it is vividly enough implanted. He was always so certain of his facts that I never questioned him.

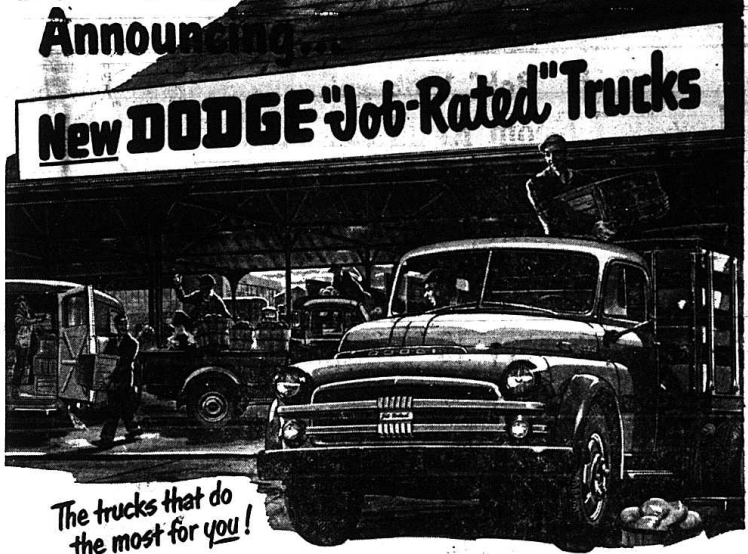
