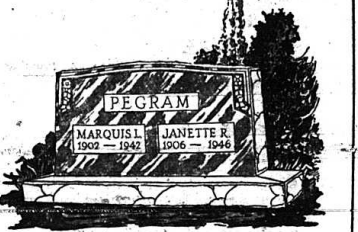

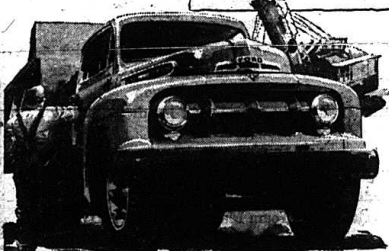

President Truman in presenting his budget to congress said it was a good thing and did the job of the government. It is evidently Congress is going to accept Mr. Truman's dare. Several Democrats and Republicans at least have promised to do so. Senator George of Georgia, chairman of the powerful Senate Finance Committee, which will handle the tax bills to pay for the budget, said it could be cut \$3 to \$4 billion without harm.

KOREA: Rads Counterattack

With stunning force and complete blood-curdling methods, complete with suicidal charges, bugle-blowing, bell ringing, whistle-blowing, and hand-to-hand combat, Communists launched a counterdrive against U.N. forces in central Korea. The counterattack stalled the U.N. advance that began late in January and which had approached Seoul.

HOLLYWOOD: Unpleasant Publicity

Hollywood, that land of make-believe so often in the headlines, appeared in line for considerable mortification, because of unpleasant publicity. The new avalanche began to roll when the House of Representatives committee announced plans to investigate certain Hollywood actors that would "inevitably" result in the removal of the names from Hollywood. In 1947 the committee investigated Communist influences on the movie capital in long and sensational hearings with the result that 10 writers and directors were removed from the list of those for refusing to answer whether they had ever been Communist. All went to jail.

EDUCATION: College Enrollment Drop Is Expected

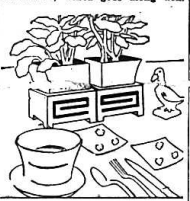
Mobilization is having a drastic effect on colleges throughout the nation. A recent survey of American universities and colleges revealed that most institutions prepared to lose 25 to 30 per cent of their students before the end of this year. Such a drop in enrollment will reduce a sharp setback of the school year, possibly as many as 20,000 to 25,000, who will be displaced from their jobs or will be replaced when they leave for military duty or war jobs, the survey revealed.

IRAN: Red Gift to Royalty

Joseph Stalin's gift of a \$150,000 mink coat and dog set studded with black diamonds to Iran's Shah of Shah and his new bride caused a number of lifted eyebrows in diplomatic circles. 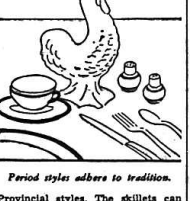

The ill feeling which flared between them looked as though it was a raiser for more trouble on the labor front, and raised one of the most difficult problems of any defense or war program.

Purpose of the labor leaders' call on Wilson was to keep the nation's civilian manpower program under the labor department. This has been the subject of a bitter backstage battle for some time, with Wilson and Gen. Lucius Clay, who was to take manpower away from Secretary of Labor Tom and Assistant Secretary of Defense Arthur Rosenbly, and with the latter threatening to resign if the labor problem is taken out of their hands.

Labor leaders also had good reason to fear General Clay and any manpower commission which he organized. They recall that during the recent war a board was set up in Germany as military governor. Clay demanded of FDR that there be no compulsory assignment of labor under a labor draft.

That was one reason why the five leaders went to see mobilization czar, Charlie Wilson, who was to set up their own manpower commission under civil service commissioner Arthur Flemming - with labor, however, at the helm. Wilson did not deny the story. Nor did he seem concerned when the labor leaders reminded him that he was setting up a board to control labor without consulting labor.

Ample Authority When reminded that labor was consulted equally with management during World War II, and that labor had a complete say in the office of production management, Wilson made it plain that he did not plan to follow this precedent.

"I have authority from the president," he said. "I am going to use that authority." Heaven's sakes! Arthur Flemming to head up the manpower committee. I intend to do so. And if he doesn't accept, I may head it up myself. "Well, we don't see a proposition like that," spoke up the president, Phil Murray. "We represent the men and women engaged in war production work. . . . The men and women should at least have an equal voice in the government's manpower policies."

Murray added that if Wilson became manpower chief in addition to his top job as mobilization boss, it would be the same as a man "taking charge from himself."

Note—Other labor leaders attending the meeting were: Dan Tracy, president of the National Electric Workers; Al Hayes, president of the international association of machinists; George Latta, chairman of the railroad labor executive association; and James Carey, CIO secretary-treasurer.

In the Dutch parliament, Communist seats have dropped from 56 to 27. In the Soviet Union, the Communist seats lost 10 of their 11 parliamentary seats. In Belgium, they lost five out of 12 seats in the low estate house and two out of 20 in the Senate. . . . In Denmark the seats dropped from 78 elective posts to only 24. . . . The Dutch Communist newspaper is now down from 100,000 circulation to around 100,000, while the Communist press of France has taken a similar tumble. . . . Most amazing development however, is in Italy, where two top Communist senators have resigned from the party.

Military Settlement

CIVIL DEFENSE Knowledge of Biological Warfare Is Vital Link in Civil Defense

WASHINGTON, D.C.—With an enemy which places no value whatsoever upon the lives of individuals, which has no moral scruples as to the means it uses to achieve its ends, it is not only peril faced by the American people in an all-out war with Russia.

Biological warfare against people and against animals is one of these perils. This sort of warfare which can spread a wide variety of disease including a number of viruses, rickettsias, bacteria, fungi, protozoans and soluble toxins, may be waged from within by saboteurs, from without by enemy planes and can be disseminated through a variety of means, including those which are food, air and water. These infectious diseases taken in by persons through inhalation, absorption or contact with contaminated objects, can be disseminated by aerial bombs and other munitions, by release of infective aerosols from aircraft, from ground devices, taking advantage of favorable winds, or by release in ventilating systems of large auditoriums. Particularly effective is contamination of water sources.

In addition to humans, biological warfare against animals can be effective since meat, dairy and poultry products are an important source of food for both military and civilian personnel. Production of wool and leather, might be curtailed and important biological and pharmaceutical products such as rennin, liver extract and insulin, entirely dependent upon animal glands and organs, could be cut off.

Such animal diseases as foot-and-mouth disease, swine fever, and rabies, which are highly contagious and appear to have greater possibilities for damage in this country. In addition to humans, biological warfare against animals can be effective since meat, dairy and poultry products are an important source of food for both military and civilian personnel.

Patterson... billion that 23.9 cents out of each dollar we earn during the next fiscal year, beginning July 1, 1951, does the President ask congress to take away from us as federal taxes to pay for rearmament and the expenses of the government? That is an important question to each American.

Now the President is insisting we pay the cost of rearmament as we go, and not increase the national indebtedness, and he figures a tax of 23.9, or less than 24 cents out of each earned dollar will accomplish that result.

What the total may be depends entirely on the total of the national income, the earnings of Americans as individuals, corporations, stockholders or bond holders, farmers, and the earnings of the national government. He did not say, but it was undoubtedly true, that the 27
