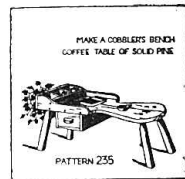

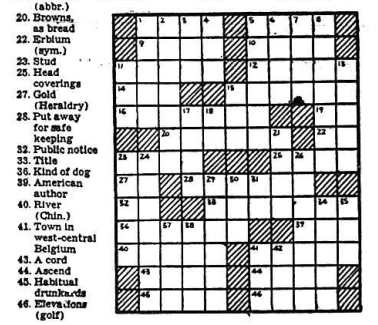

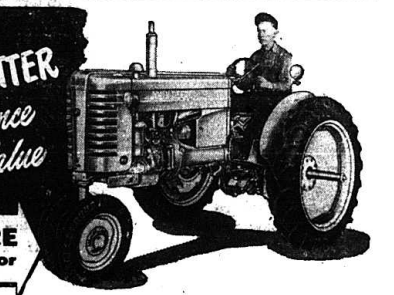

## ROCKCASTLE FACTS and STORIES

By RALPH GRIFFIN

The late W. B. Sigmom was a continual source of yarns during his lifetime. Unfortunately, some of his best ones would not pass the censor. Not that he particularly liked the office story; he just loved a good yarn, lurid or otherwise. He was our good friend and we have missed him very much.

From many others we find the following Civil War tales among the notes which were taken from conversation with Willis.

Mr. Harrison Branaman, a resident of the "Wide section" was a member of the "Home Guards." He acted as a lookout and scout, doing valuable service for the Federal cause. One day he was out alone when he unexpectedly met with a body of Confederate soldiers. Before he had time to draw his pistol, he was covered by a dozen rifles, seized and his pistol taken from him.

Being warned that he was a prisoner and that any attempt to escape would mean instant death, Mr. Branaman was forced to ride along with his captors in the direction of Cumberland Gap. He was very docile and went along without resistance, comforted by the thought of a small size yet large caliber derringer type pistol which he was wearing beneath his shirt and which had been overlooked in the search of his person.

Becoming careless the soldiers strung out along the road for a considerable distance, leaving Mr. Branaman to the rear in company with two guards. Calling their attention to some object by the roadside, the captive drew his derringer, covered the men and exclaimed: "Either I get away right now, or one of you dies!"

Hastily raising their hands the guards expressed themselves as being inquired with the idea that escape was decidedly the more preferable of the two choices. They rode away with uplifted hands until Mr. Branaman had time to wheel his horse and flee around a nearby bend in the road, and eventually back to his home.

The Cumberland Gap before the war was a great place. At least they fired no shots, gave no thought to escape, and were not pursued at all. In telling the story Mr. Branaman always said, "By rum, they were as glad to get away as I was!"

A small boy living in the Roundstone section was surprised while riding his father's prize saddle-horse near Green Hill. These soldiers made an exchange, taking the boy's steed and giving in exchange an indescribable looking away-backed plug. The boy took it all very philosophically and pursued a slow return to his father's barnyard, where he shouted, "Hey, pap—I jest swapped horses— I give the other 'n' what a skinnin' I give the other 'n'!" The story stops there but it is so surmised that there was another "skinnin'" within the next few moments.

Logue Sigmom joined the Union Army, served several months, was captured and endured hardships in a Confederate prison camp. He eventually escaped and returned to his home near Boone's Gap.

A few days after his return a Confederate sympathizer by the name of Higgenbottom came swaggering along the road, identified himself as a Union man, beat Higgenbottom to the draw and shot him dead.

Sigmom stepped out into the road, identified himself as a Union man, beat Higgenbottom to the draw and shot him dead. In 1885 he took a train for Mt. Vernon.

In some manner the time of his arrival became known and a number of men, who had solemnly worn the blue were on hand to meet the train. Bond was promptly executed at the courthouse, with dozens of volunteers ready to sign. The defendant was tried shortly thereafter and found "Not Guilty," whereupon he returned to his home in Indiana with an easier mind.

Mr. Albert Albright got us into this Civil War business to accompany one of his classes. Since the class has probably never seen a Spanish American War by now, we will also care a moratorium on the Civil War. Maybe we will come back to it but for the time being we want to wrap up and hang some more people.
