**Tobacco Plant Bed Treatment** Bluestone-Lime mixture applied twice to the surface of the soil of the tobacco bed (1) when the plants are first set, (2) before the plants are the size of a dime, will prevent wildfire and (3) before the plants are completely in the plant bed.

To prepare Bluestone-Lime mixture: (1) Fill a clean 50 gallon sprayer with 34 full of water strained through a cloth. (2) In one container thoroughly mix 4 pounds of fresh commercial hydrated lime in 3 gallons of strained water. (3) In another container dissolve 3 pounds of powdered bluestone in about 4 gallons of water. (4) Pour the lime paste into the barrel of water and stir vigorously. While stirring, add the bluestone solution slowly. (5) Add enough water to make 50 gallons.

Apply without removing the cotton cover, with an ordinary sprinkling can. Stir each time the sprinkling can is filled. Use 1 quart per square yard. Fifty gallons will treat 200 square yards, or 200 running feet of bed 9 feet wide, or 150 running feet of bed 12 feet wide.

Ditch around the bed to keep surface water off from flowing over it. Cut weeds instead of pulling them; or make another application of bluestone-lime after pulling weeds.

Caution: Bluestone-Lime does not injure plants, so don't wash it off. Don't mix nitrate of soda with bluestone-lime.

## ROCKCASTLE FACTS and STORIES

By RALPH GRIFFIN

It was in the early part of November, 1877, when the Klux Klan again made a foray into Rockcastle. This was about ten days following the wholesale lynching recounted in our last issue. Whether some of the members of this necktie party had their blood-lust whetted and thirsted for more, or whether they felt that there were still scores to be settled here is a matter for conjecture. At the time it was accepted as fact that about half of the same, raiding party was abroad seeking trouble upon a night which was to become known in Rockcastle and adjoining counties as the occasion of The Battle of Sand Hill.

Nothing is known of the band's movements, where they assembled or of any depredations committed until suddenly appeared in full Klan regalia at the little cabin home of Irvine Gilmore, a negro. Gilmore lived near the Old Wilderness Road, about two miles east of Mt. Vernon upon what was to become later known as the Klansmen intended to kill her husband and that they would later come for her. At last she heard one of the men exclaim, "Let the nigger alone—his dead—let's go on and get old Liberty!"

From what she had seen and heard the woman knew that many of the band were drunk and heavily. She had already seen demonstrated the violence of which they were capable. Liberty Langford must be warned if possible! Unbarring her cabin door the woman rushed out the moment when the thud of hoofbeats told her that the gang was leaving. She rushed to her husband and found that he was still alive and feebly moving. Hastily releasing his bonds she administered all the first-aid of which she was capable, being rewarded within a short time by seeing him restored to full consciousness.

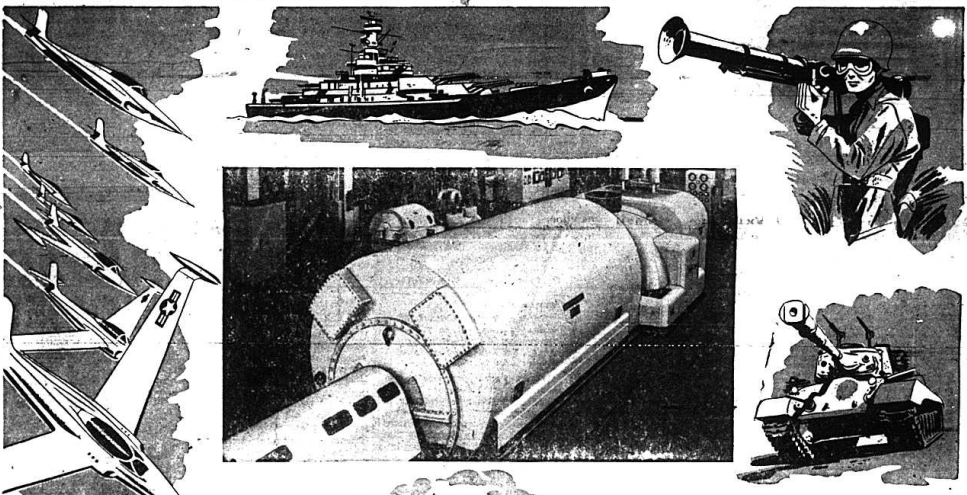
