Tomato Blight Control

Tomato Blight is a germ disease spread by the wind and by muddy water splashing on the plants during a driving rain.

The control is covering the entire plant with copper or some other material recommended by the Experiment Station, enclosing the plant in what may be called an "armor" that is proof against the entrance of the germs. As the plant grows, cracks occur in the armor which must be repaired and new leaves from that must be covered. So here is the program for control:

any of the following: Copper-A or COCS, or Kopper King or Basic Copper Sulphate or Hydro-K or Dithane. The materials come in two strengths. One is 45% to 52% for making spray and the receipt for its use. Use two level-tablespoons per gallon of water. The second one is the dusting kind which runs from 5% to 7% which is used for spraying for controlling blight. Spraying is more effective than dusting. Start spraying when you set the plants and spray once a week until you have sprayed at least 10 weeks. 15 weeks would be better. Remember that the plant must be wet all over from top to bottom and through the center part. Put spray in the thickest part of plant and wet it thoroughly.

Yes, it's a regular job but if blight strikes as hard as it did last year we will have to do a good job of spraying with some form of copper material and do it regularly, to get a crop of tomatoes.

Bordeaux mixture is being used by many gardeners to control tomato blight. It is made from Bluestone, Lime and Water. 4-4-50. This means 4 pounds of bluestone dissolved in a container and 4 pounds of lime dissolved in another container and mix these together and add enough water to make 50 gallons of this mixture. Stir thoroughly while pouring these materials together. The 4-4-50 reduced down to smaller quantities would be 1 pound of bluestone, 1 pound of lime and 12 1/2 gallons of water. This would spray the average tomato patch. This should be used while fresh tomatoes are still on a vine just as other materials. Always make up a fresh batch each

week for use. Don't use a metal container for dissolving bluestone. It will eat holes in metal containers. 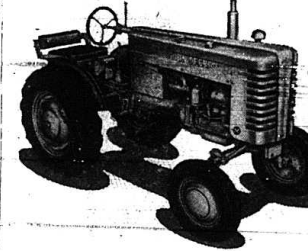

Their first thought was of Liberty's son, James Langford, who lived a mile across the hill in another direction from the tavern. Staggering off up the road toward James' home, Gilmore was met, by his brother, Sydney, and George Middleton, also a negro. The two latter had heard the band of horsemen pass their homes and, see if everything was all right were slipping up to Irvine's to be with him. They carried rifles and were welcomed by Irvine as valuable enforcements.

Notes were quickly compared and it was decided that Sydney should make all speed to James Langford's home and bring back help as quickly as possible. Middleton would stay with the injured man. Further action should be left to the white man's supposedly superior intelligence.

Traveling through brush and brambles with the best speed of which he was capable Sydney had hardly covered half of his journey when he heard firing in the direction of the Langford tavern. He feared that any assistance would now be too late but hurried on to his destination. There he found the James Langford family already aroused by the sounds of the fusillade.

James and a nearby neighbor, Mike Pitman, had already armed themselves and were just leaving the house when Sydney arrived and gasped out his story. Two small sons of the family, Tip and Elzy, begged to be taken along and permitted to fight but their father decided against it. They were left behind and told to guard their home, while the three men set out upon the return trail with a full complement of

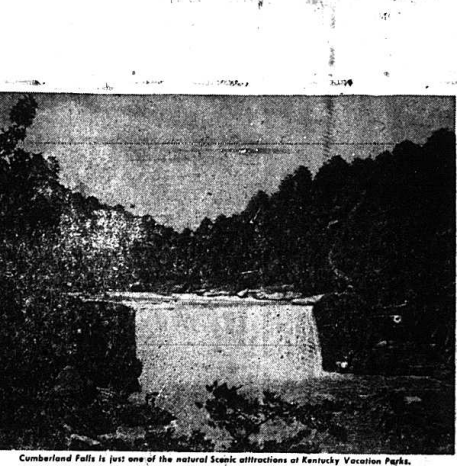
