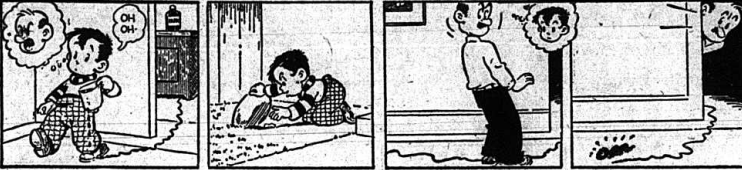

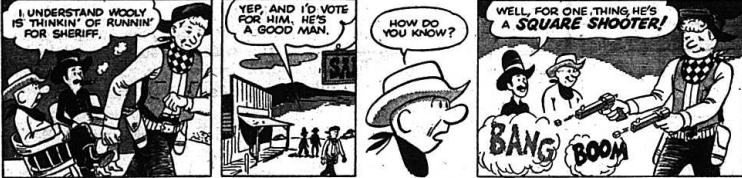

Polio Cases for 1951

ANN ARBOR—Approximately 27,000 cases of polio will occur in the United States during 1951, a University of Michigan school of public health statisticians has predicted.

"There are a number of reasons for supposing that 1951 will be a far less severe year for polio than the record year of 1949 during which about 45,000 cases were reported," Dr. Fay M. Humphreys indicated.

Dr. Humphreys' "epidemiologic" is based on figures supplied to him through the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Inc. by the United States public health service which receives weekly reports from the various state health departments throughout the nation.

Since June, 1950, he has been making a continuous statistical study of the areas and number of polio cases occurring in the United States. His studies are sponsored by grants from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, Inc.

Youth Rally

I HAVE just spent an evening beyond the Iron Curtain. It's not hard to do here in Berlin where no guard, patrol the line between the Russian and American sectors and when it is so faint a White House press card and look reasonably important, you can attend even the most exclusive of the Communist youth shows.

Rally No Flip

To read the headlines in American newspapers you get the impression that the Berlin youth rally was a flop. It wasn't. No rally which brings 2,000,000 people together from all parts of the world is a flop and it's no use kidding ourselves.

Ami, Go Home!

If you arrived early enough and found a White House press card, a U. S. military pass or even a District of Columbia police pass, an American could go to the most popular and packed performance of all the North Korea. Seeing the Korean show gave some idea of the propaganda that has been put before congress was subjected to. The highlight of their performance was a dance opera in which a Korean beauty, her child killed by American planes, is the heroine. The scene which really brought down the house was that in which she threw three grenades into an American camp. Three Americans then tear her clothes half off and take turns beating her while she takes from her blouse the flag of the Peoples Republic. Then, just as the Americans tie her to a tree preparing to shoot her, a shot rings out and Korean guerrillas come to her rescue. The heroine then shoots an American officer at point-blank range.

At this point, the audience goes wild; there is 20 minutes of applause; the Korean actors get curtsias call after this. The call and Russian ladies rush up to embrace the embarrassed Korean orchestra leader. The Korean ladies, chanting "Ami, Go Home!"—the slogan of derision for Americans—then go on to the Adriatic to the Baltic.

This is a sample of the propaganda drilled in on the youths at the rally and there's no use in kidding ourselves about its effect.

West Point Firings

The cheating of the 90 cadets at West Point was played up in the European press. The media in the street didn't pay too much attention to it. But among top-level Europeans and the many Americans over here, there was considerable reaction.

Threat of Inflation Increases As Price Index Hits a New High

INFLATION THREAT—With the government's report that the consumer's price index rose to a record level last month, the dangers of inflation are becoming more acute.

The average home owner seems to have the feeling that runaway inflation is dangerously near. If each group in the nation's economy continues trying to get ahead of every other, then the economic situation may explode into a mad race that will have disastrous results.

A Beautiful Shoot
Gen. James H. Fleet reports that a Russian spy will be able to withstand any new Communist attack. He said news reports are that the spy is "not new, just fresher. If we can get him out into the open, we would have a beautiful shoot."

PRICE CONTROLS—While the average home owner views the price picture with increasing fear, President Truman asked congress for more major changes in the new price controls law.

WESTERN POLITICS—Democratic party representatives from 15 midwest states, as far east as Ohio and as far west as Wyoming, the great farm belt that came to President Truman's rescue in 1948, met at French Lick, Ind., to discuss possibilities for 1952. Their conclusions were striking to the average home owner.

THE NEW FEAR—The latest news from Korea would indicate the Chinese Communists are best with a new fear, that of world condemnation for breaking off the Korean peace talks. It is the only reasonable basis for hope.

JAPANESE TREATY—On Tuesday 34 nations gathered at San Francisco to sign the proposed peace treaty with Japan. Russia is represented but she does not expect her to sign the document.

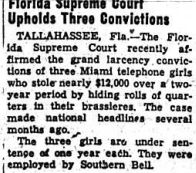
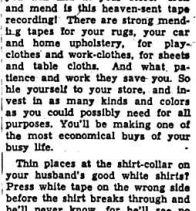
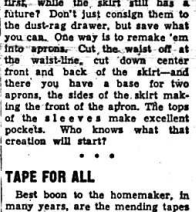

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ROCKCASTLE FACTS and STORIES

The Rockcastle political pot boiled fast and furiously over a period of several years, culminating in a violent flare-up during the county election campaigns of 1897. D. P. Bethuram was county judge at that time and was a candidate for re-election upon the Republican ticket, being opposed by the Democrats with popular young R. G. Williams as their standard-bearer.

The Bethuram family had always been strong politically and Judge D. P. was ably backed by several sons. Foremost among these were B. J. and L. W. Bethuram, both of whom became well-known attorneys and officials during their lifetimes. The Williams family, upon the other hand, had been Democratic leaders for years and young R. G. was liked and respected by members of both parties. His election depended upon the corraling of a substantial number of Republican

votes to overcome the admitted strength of that party. It looked as if the tide were running in his favor, partisan and inter-partisan feeling was at a fever-heat and the possibilities for serious trouble grew stronger as the summer advanced. James Maret, as editor of the Signal, campaigned strongly thru his columns for the Democratic ticket. Serious charges were brought against the incumbent county judge during and before his term in office. In speeches made at Pine Hill and Brodhead youth B. J. Bethuram, campaigning for his father's ticket, countered with attacks upon the character of the Signal editor. Maret immediately filed suit for \$10,000. damage for slander and defamation of character, all of which did not improve the public state of mind. Supporters of both factions became more and more estranged and the columns of the county newspaper flared and crackled with vituperation. Election day troubles were anticipated at all polling places and many voters who went to cast their ballots prepared for almost any eventuality. Singleton Valley, in the eastern section of the county, had been the scene of serious disturbances upon several occasions. It was the voting precincts of the Mullins and Langford families who were violently opposed politically and otherwise.

The morning of the November election, as voters began to assemble at the little Singleton Valley schoolhouse to cast their votes, found numerous members of the Langford and Mullins clans were already much in evidence. Henry Langford was the uncompromising leader of his party and Sheriff W. G. Mullins headed his followers by virtue of his years and official position. Conflicting stories have been told as to just how the trouble arose but it had been brewing long that both sides were amply prepared for it. Hot words passed, pistols and Winchester sprang into play and the battle was on. Several men who were present as participants or innocent bystanders have given their versions of what happened and the points upon which they all agreed are the only ones which shall be printed here. Monroe Pennington, Doctor's correspondent, told he was innocently hitching his horse upon a nearby hillside when a bullet cut a limb directly over his head. Our old friend and informant, Willis Siem, was caught with his defenses unarmed and not particularly interested he stood amid whistling bullets, too scared to move, but he never got a mark. Black powder was in common use and the air roared from all sides. Men were falling; one had his life saved by being knocked down with a fence-rail just as he was fired at from three different points, the bullets whistling harmlessly over his prostrate body. The firing ceased as suddenly as it had begun and three members of the Langford faction lay motionless upon the ground.

County Agent's Notes

FIRST CASH CROP
The Strawberry crop in Rockcastle was the first crop to be harvested and sold. The growers produced \$9,644.10 worth of strawberries. The farmers produced a crop valued at \$4899.50. The 4-H club members produced a crop valued at \$4,944.60. The making a total of \$9,644.10. The farmers sold on the city and local markets and received \$4,298.50 for their berries. This brought to the growers \$8,032.10 in cash for their spring strawberry crop.

The growers used at home and gave away \$1,612.00 worth of berries valued at market price. This is being liberal with the neighbors. The best thing about this crop is that the growers had berries to use at home and some to share with their friends. The 4-H families used more berries at home than did the families which didn't have 4-H members carrying a strawberry project. In other words when daddy raised the berries, he put them on market and used less at home.

Yes, it takes good ground, fertilizer, certified plants, clean packing and marketing which all means work and some expense for cups, crates and marketing. This too has to be done to produce good tobacco. Why not have an acre of strawberries to bring in some cash in the spring and an acre of tobacco to bring in some more cash in the late fall? Strawberries are another cash crop for the farm.

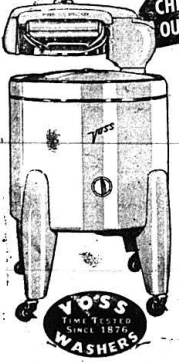
