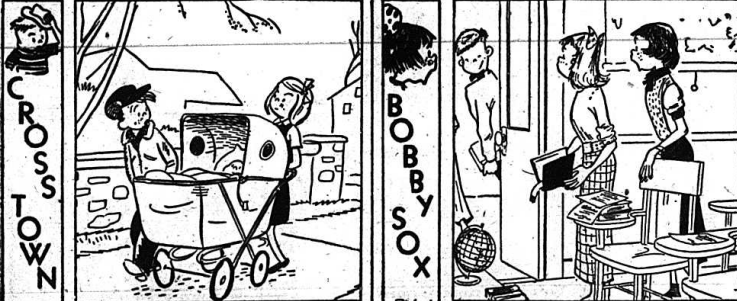

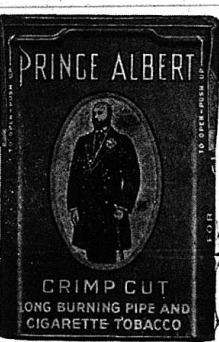

## ROCKCASTLE FACTS and STORIES

This column has been a bit heavy for some time. It requires a deal of checking and cross-checking if our stories of old-time violence are to be correct, and it is most assuredly the intention of this paper that they shall be accurate. Even when we do our best, some good friend has his feelings hurt, occasionally, that is when we wonder whether it is worthwhile to dig up these old tales.

There is but one excuse for them, aside from the possible entertainment of our Signal readers. One of these days some ambitious chap is going to compile a county history, and this column may save him a lot of digging. If that happens, all of these old stories may have been worth the telling.

At this writing, however, we feel no inclination to pore over musty old records. The tang of Fall is in the air, children are back in school and many of our oldsters would gladly join

them there. Since we cannot, it might be well to try and recall the school days of forty years ago.

It would be trite to say that times have changed considerably, but the children probably do not realize how much. Today we see them on their way to school in cars, school buses, upon bicycles and roller-skates. They are clean and well-dressed. Arrived at school they find ample, pleasant and well-equipped facilities and necessities. There is a gym for all age groups, with enough teachers and supervisors to see that each child gets proper attention and instruction. Health and sanitation are not left to chance, accident and suspension. There are drinking fountains and the children can wash their hands without walking over the hill to the town branch.

When Judge S. F. Bowman was a school teacher in the part of the building which now houses Charley Nicely's store, things were different. There were some rough desks and a blackboard, with an old map of the World hanging on the wall. The school-room had central heating; that is, there was a big pot-bellied cast iron heater in the center of the room. It roasted the children who chanced to be seated nearest the stove and froze the ones in the farthest corners. On particularly cold days pupils prigger drag their benches up close to the stove and thaw out occasionally, if they didn't make too much noise in the process.

A bucket of drinking water sat in the corner and a common dipper hung nearby. Anyone fidgety enough to bring his own drinking cup would have been

hooted out of school. The more personal sanitary facilities were housed in two small buildings some distance from the schoolhouse and to the windward. They were considered modern for that day and age. One was presumed to come to school clean enough so that no washing was required during the day. Should accidents occur, such as a bloody nose, the Spout Spring was always available. The boys who were in the best standing school were permitted to carry the drinking water from the same source.

The thing which comes most vividly to mind concerning the schoolroom of the past was its

smell. In the Fall, when windows and doors could be left open, this aroma was indistinct. With the coming of Winter, with closed doors and a roaring fire, there is nothing on earth with which to compare it. Trout tried to explain why our old-time schoolrooms smelled that way. He mentioned the wet clothing which had been handed down from father to son without benefit of drying. The boots and shoes which had tramped around barnyards doing chores before school time. He called attention to the fact that it was supposed to be bad luck to bathe in the winter time, and that the swimming holes were all frozen over anyway. But Allan overlooked one thing—the bag of asafetida which was suspended from each youthful neck, male and female.

No mother of forty-old years ago would have been so foolishly hardy as to expose her pride and joy to the schoolroom without a bag of this sickness and accident insurance upon his person. The druggstore was the source of school supplies, and when the druggist made out his Fall orders to his suppliers, it was very simple. He merely wrote for one hundred slates, 200 slate pencils and all the asafetida available.

Mothers didn't believe in germs and feared no insect less than a honey-bee, but they did recognize the fact that children got sick from some Act-of-Providence. Her nose told her that any Providence in its right mind was going to remain a

safe distance from a child who was properly fortified with asafetida. The theory must have had its merits, for we were a remarkably strong (?) and hardy lot.

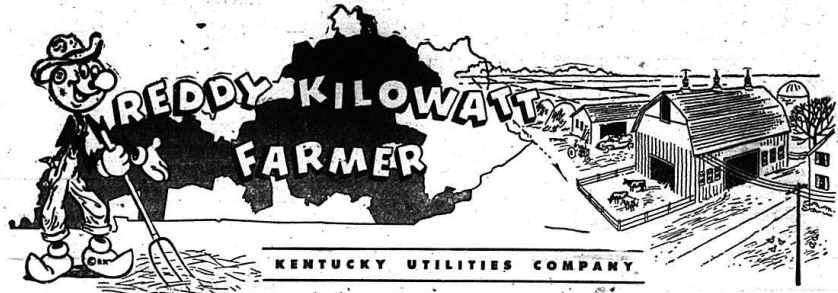

Poor Farm Lighting Termed Dangerous
If the average farmer will look around him and pick out the one thing that most needs modernization on his farm, he's pretty apt to find it's his lighting.
Even on farms where electricity is widely and soundly used, lighting in the home, in the farm buildings, and in the yard will very likely be inadequate. And since the lighting system is usually the foundation of the entire wiring system, few farmers can make efficient use of electricity without a good lighting plan.

Alfalfa Losses Go When Drier Installed
Losses that sometimes took half the alfalfa crop have been eliminated since a snow hay drier was installed, says Clay Truitt of the C. V. Whitney Farm near Lexington.
The Pierson-Moore drier used by Truitt is a portable unit, using a five-horsepower motor and an oil burning heater to speed up drying in damp weather. Most farmers, however, find it more practical and economical to mow dry hay with unheated air. Except in very moist weather the results are comparable.

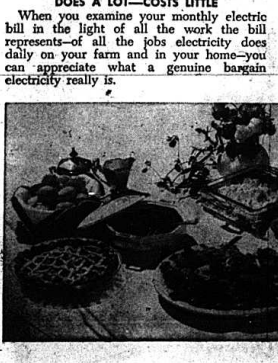
