ENRICHED BREAD. Enrichment of White Bread With Vitamin B Started 10 Years Ago

Enriched white bread in the past ten years has resulted in the virtual wiping out of two deficiency diseases and has contributed materially to better health and increased vigor to the American people, according to statements from manufacturing authorities in the medical and nutritional science.

Bakers all over America this year are celebrating the decennial of bread enrichment. It was in March, 1941, when the enrichment program got under way on a national scale. While bread "enrichment" is simply the raising in bread of the content of the B vitamins—thiamin and riboflavin—and iron, these elements are produced in volume in the process of milling wheat into flour.

The two diseases which result from a lack of the B vitamins are called beriberi heart disease and pellagra. While the average person probably is not too familiar with either of these, they were not at all uncommon in the United States prior to 1941.

They make it possible to eat an ample quantity of food but still suffer from malnutrition if B vitamins were not present in sufficient quantity to make the proteins, carbohydrates and other food properties adequately absorbed into the body.

TO THE AVERAGE consumer, enrichment has meant general betterment of physical well being, the scientists say. Studies among children reveal, in most cases, that youngsters who received B vitamins were more vigorous, more alert and more cheerful than those whose diets did not include B vitamins.

Changing living habits were major factors in making the enrichment program necessary. Around 1900, 95 per cent of all bread consumed in America was made in the home. Today, 95 per cent is made in bakeries.

Each American used to eat more than 200 pounds of cereal products annually. The average consumption has been about 133 pounds. The "consumer insists on a white and light loaf of bread which meant that the enrichment program was necessary in the product reaching the consumer table.

Health authorities who were more and more alarmed by the increasing rate of national health in the mid-30's made strenuous efforts to promote greater use of whole wheat bread with no noticeable results. The consumer still wanted white bread.

Room Furnishings May Be Set Off With Proper Dressing of Window

By Ertia Haley

Window Magic

The touch of glamour that a hat lends to a beautiful costume is much the same role which well styled windows play in your home.

Today's furnishing trends are getting away from the ornate window treatments of yesterday, as these detract too much from what nice furnishings you have in the room, and they are also expensive.

You may have both draperies and sheer curtains at your windows, but since the combination of window hangings into a bit of an investment it may be wise to choose draperies for those windows which give a nice view, while sheer glass curtains are appropriate for small informal rooms.

More than one single thing remember that windows can be used to add or detract from the atmosphere of the room, depending upon what you do with them.

You may have a problem with the size of windows or with their placement. There are answers to these problems and they are all attractive ones.

No matter how ugly a ducking any one or several windows may be, you can, with a little window planning, turn them into assets.

Little money to spend, a lack of sufficient fabric to give full luxurious draperies which don't fit a new house or apartment, all

A full window emphasizes drapes. can be readily solved if you'll put your imagination and ingenuity to work.

Short on Material? Use These Tricks Perhaps you have some, noticeable draperies, or a length or two of material which do not cover a window thoroughly.

One of the smartest ways to treat the problem is to build a frame length plywood frame for the window which is next to the window, on all four sides can be scalloped, large scallops of course, to add the proper decorative note.

Let's say that you have a wide window or two narrow windows in the bedroom or dressing room. Why not treat these as one, for they will look better and conserve material.

You can set twin dressing tables against the windows for bright material right on the windows, in full folds, then a three or four inch width of ruffle across the top, of the material as a ribbon can cover the dressing tables. Glass curtains of the same material can be used at the sides, tied back to the windows.

A kitchen window which is large, then the cottage curtains you have on hand can be easily removed.

If you have an especially pretty wallpaper, such as clusters of flowers, or a design, use it for the leftover wallpaper, and cut into strips measuring one and three-quarters inches wide, and use as a border on the wallpaper.

Another trick which is very useful is to use a blind tape on the window or bed room. These ruffles can be attached to the blind tapes by simple sewing, and are wonderfully decorative.

How to Emphasize Walls Rather than Problem Windows. If the view outside "the window" is not attractive, you can't do much about it, but you can't do much about the window itself.

Another solution is to use several yards of cotton curtain material to make a glass curtain for the window. Several rows of bright material make the room can be used as the bottom edge.

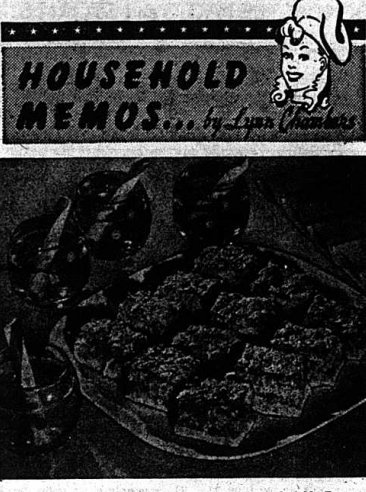
