The idea for the new center which was to cost roughly \$50,000.00, was conceived in April, 1950, and by October 1 this year was completed and cavapied by its new tenants. The local station has a payroll of about \$425,00 a week and employs on the average of thirteen persons. Mr. Gay, is assisted as manager by Mrs. Gay and his daughter, Miss Elizabeth Gay. Others making up the personnel are Miss Gracie Taylor, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Kirby. Mrs. Hazel Price, Cleve Simpson, Miss Mable Proctor, Mrs. Nadine Creech, Mrs. Billie Rimer, Mrs. Elizabeth Rowe and Dave Stallsworth.

## Corruption of a Small Town: Case Study
