Growing With Mt. Vernon

*Congratulations from Mt. Vernon to Greyhound*



On this page will be found the congratulatory cards of many leading business and professional people who wish to extend congratulations and best wishes to the owners and operators of the new Greyhound bus station.

The idea for the new center which was to cost roughly \$50,000.00, was conceived in April, 1950, and by October 1 this year was completed and occupied by its new tenants. The construction job, done wholly by local contractors, was in process four months. It was built to specifications by Alex Milen, local merchant, and owner of the new building. He procured the services of Jack Crawford to draw the plans, W. C. Dowell, contractor, James Price, electrician, Cap Reynolds, heating engineer, and John Ramsey, bricklayer, and the combined labor of these men produced one of the finest and most modern bus stations in this part of the state.

Of brick and concrete block construction with a 35x70 interior it is modern in every respect, well lighted and heated by an oil-fired hot water system. There is ample space in front which faces Main Street and the main driveway at the south side can accommodate eight buses at one time. Just across this drive is a service station, nearly completed, which is 35x42 and will house a couple of the busses. This also is owned by Mr. Milen and will be operated by local men. By spring the whole surface surrounding the two buildings will be black-topped, Mr. Milen said.

The catering company which owns the fixtures and equipment is made up of officials of

Greyhound Company. Guy Hugolette, president Southeastern Lines; W. O. Jones, vice-president; T. W. DeZonia, vice-president; Lexington and L. E. Barnes, supervisor, Lexington, have all had a hand in the consummation of the deal and have shown a keen interest in the Mt. Vernon bus center. It was officially opened to the public last week with a deluge of flowers and visitors and Mr. Tommy Gay, the local manager, has had a busy time serving the twenty-two bus schedules a day and the local outside trade at the restaurant.

The local station has a payroll of about \$425.00 a week and employs on the average of thirteen persons. Mr. Gay is assisted as manager by Mrs. Gay and his daughter, Miss Elizabeth Gay. Others making up the personnel are Miss Gracie Taylor, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Kirby, Mrs. Hazel Price, Cleve Simpson, Miss Mable Proctor, Mrs. Nadine Creech, Mrs. Billie Rimer, Mrs. Elizabeth Rowe and Dave Stallsworth.

In order to make room for the new station it was necessary to remove from the site an old landmark, the former residence of the Williams family and lately that of Mrs. Matt Bethurum. At the time of its removal, last November, The Signal published a story of the old house and a photograph of it on the skids. Removal of the old house intact was quite an accomplishment because it was done, chimneys and all, without apparent damage. It now occupies a new foundation at the rear of the lot and is the home of Mr. and Mrs. Gay.

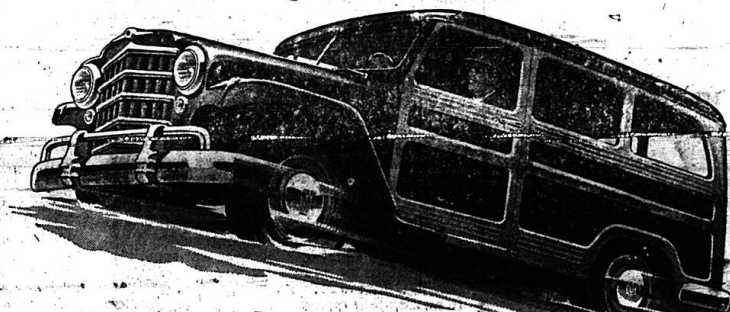

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**Farm Topics**  
**Mulching Will Not Prevent Freezing Leaves, Grass, Straw Are Good Materials**

Even though many gardeners have used mulches for years and are aware of its value, they are not sure of their reasons for mulching. It is not to prevent plants from freezing, as often thought, but to prevent quick freezing and thawing.

It prevents drying out of plant tissues, and freezing and thawing from heaving plants out of the ground. It also prevents plant development too early in the spring when buds might be harmed by late frosts.

The gardener looking for mulching materials could try leaves when available in quantity. They

are satisfactory for perennial borders and beds, rock gardens and around evergreens and shrubs. Straw is another good material, especially good for strawberry beds. Cat straw is preferred over wheat and others.

Peat Moss is often used and does an excellent job of preventing temperature fluctuations, but has a tendency to crust on top. Grass clippings are good, too, if available in large quantity.

Brown corn cobs have recently been put into use as a mulch, especially for roses. This material is reported to also improve the soil by stimulating the growth of micro-organisms.

**200-240 Pound Hogs Will Bring the Best Price**

According to livestock specialists, both underfinished and overfinished hogs are likely to sell at larger-than-usual discounts this fall.

The 1951 pig crop of about 105 million head is the second largest on record, and there is no longer a weaker labor market.

As a result this will mean more price differential for type in live hogs. Hogs that are too heavy or too fat will probably have to take a larger discount than last year.

Specialists believe farmers should feed out hogs over 190 pounds. Discounts on lightweighters are such that farmers can hardly afford not to feed them out.

With so many hogs starting to market, packers can be rather choosy about the type of hog for which they pay top prices. Both the underfinished and overfinished animals will sell at a disadvantage.

Try to sell as many as possible between 200 and 240 pounds.

**Filling Up**

1 uncoked medium ham hock (1/2 pound)  
1 No. 2 can baked beans, without tomato sauce  
1 large onion, peeled and chopped  
1/2 cup catsup  
1/2 tablespoons brown sugar  
1/2 tablespoons dry mustard  
1/2 teaspoon black pepper  
1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce  
4 clove garlic

1 No. 2 can pineapple chunks  
Remove meat from ham bone and add to beans which may be placed right into the casserole. Stir in onion, then pour in catsup and syrup from pineapple. Sprinkle over all the brown sugar, mustard, pepper, onion and Worcestershire sauce. Dot four chunks of the pineapple with the cloves and reserve for last. Sink ham bone into center of the bean mixture and arrange pineapple around the bone. Place the pineapple with cloves on last. Cover and bake in a moderate (350° F.) oven for one hour, remove cover and bake about 15 minutes longer until brown. For a crowd, multiply recipe according to number of casseroles.

**LYNN SAYS:** Refrigerate Foods To Speed Preparation  
If you don't want to do all your food preparation before a meal, many good things can be mixed in advance, then refrigerated until cooking or grilling time.

Meats like those for waffles and biddiecakes can be made in advance then refrigerated, provided they are lightly covered to prevent drying in one of the trays. If desired, they can be thawed with a little milk before using.

**Cattle Grubs Cause Big Meat and Hide Losses**

Not less than 12 million pounds of the most valuable part of the beef carcass are rimmed out around grub holes from cattle slaughtered in the U. S., according to livestock specialists. **THE BIBLE SPEAKS**  
**God's Untuned Harp**

Lesson for October 14, 1951  
**CAN** the perfect God make use of an imperfect man? He has to; there is no other choice. God is the perfect musician; his melodies and harmonies are flawless; but he has to use imperfect men to play these on the harp of humanity, twanging strings as silly as they are. He can never long well-tuned.

One such doubtful string was young Jacob. He improved immensely later in life; but at the time of the incident depicted in Genesis 28 he was a very rough diamond indeed. His own home was too hot for him. His father had been bitterly disappointed in him; his twin and only brother had been born to him in the first chance. He was a swindling liar, leaving home on the run.

If he had treated his neighbors with the same lack of consideration he had shown toward Isaac and Esau, there must have been "many a dry eye" when the news reached home that Jacob had left town. As a matter of fact, he kept on, for some years after this, being the best of sheep trader he had always been.

His dream at Bethel did not convert him, as is sometimes thought; if it did, his conversion waited 30 years to "take." If the reader will examine Jacob's life in Gen. 28:20, he can see that it does not convert a very lofty view of religion on Jacob's part. Jacob makes his promise to the Lord with a large IF attached; if the Lord will prosper him, keep him safe, bring him back and so forth, THEN he will give the Lord ten per cent. Who would not pay a ten per cent commission for such protection and prosperity? No, we cannot say that Jacob at this time was saintly.

**God's Purpose**  
AND yet God spoke to him, made promises to him. Was this only a concealed dream of Jacob? It was a dream, of course, as the writer says (Gen. 28:21); but it was the dream only the kind of thing that psychologists call "wish-fulfillment," with no meaning except to show what Jacob had been thinking about? Or did the dream stand for something real?

The general belief of the church is that God, really did have a concern for this man and did speak to him through his dream, even though it was the kind of dream which perhaps only a Jacob could have had.

But how could the perfect God make a covenant or come to any terms with such a man as Jacob then was? The answer is probably in the story itself and in what followed it. God had a purpose far beyond Jacob's mind. He had a plan for him; too, but it fitted into a far greater plan for mankind. "In these shall all the families of the earth be blessed." God, we believe, to Jesus Christ and what he has meant and will mean to the world. Without Jacob, and the race which would call him their ancestor, Jesus would not have been.

**God's Harp Has Many Strings**  
ONE of the most remarkable titles for God in the Bible is the "God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob" (Exodus 3:6). We might expect the first name; we are astonished to hear the others two.

Abraham, of course, was a great spiritual father. He was great in other ways too; a man who would be outstanding in any age, in any place,—one of the great religious geniuses of all time. Of course God is the God of such men, we expect it.

But what about Isaac and Jacob? Isaac was a nonentity, a weak character, far from bright. Even his sons were second-hand. As for Jacob, a changed man, as a times his life, and crooked record remained a fact. The Bible does not try to conceal it.

**FIRST AID TO THE CRACKING HOUSE**  
BY ROGER C. WHITMAN

**Walls Cracked by Earthquake**  
QUESTION: "After a recent earthquake I noticed that the outside plaster of my house was cracked all over on all four sides of the house. What can I use to fill up these cracks?"  
ANSWER: I suppose you mean "stucco," when you speak of "plaster." If the stucco had only a few large cracks; they could probably be repaired. Since it is cracked all over, you may need to have it stripped off and new stucco applied. Large cracks should first be widened and deepened, then patched with a cement mortar. The usual mortar mixture for stucco repair is one part Portland cement, either white or gray, and three parts clean, coarse sand, with just enough water to make a workable mixture. Or you can get a ready mixed patching mortar—which is not the same thing as patching plaster. When widening a crack for filling, cut into it so that the groove is wider at the bottom than at the surface. Brush out all loose cement, and then soak the edges well with water. Pack with mortar, and just before the patch sets, work the surface into place to match that of the stucco. Keep the patches wet for three or four days so that the cement will cure. Sometimes a white stucco wall can be matched with a white cement and a light yellow building sand, or white cement and a light yellow building sand. For a more durable finish, you can coat the whole wall with a dampproof cement paint. Very narrow hair line cracks can be filled by painting the stucco with the cement base paint. Get your materials from a dealer in building or masonry supplies. A stucco repair man would know what would be best to do.

**Hot Tamales Pie**  
(Serves 6)  
1 1/2 cups water  
1/2 cup evaporated milk  
1 tablespoon fat  
1 cup ground raw beef  
1 cup tomatoes  
1 pint tomato catsup  
Measure meat into heavy saucepan. Add water and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Boil until mixture begins to thicken, then add milk and continue boiling 8 to 10 minutes, stirring constantly. Chop onion and cook slowly in fat until yellow. Add meat and cook until red color disappears, then add tomatoes, pimiento, catsup and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Turn into casserole which has been lined with 1/2 of the mix. Cover with remaining mix and bake in a moderate (350° F.) oven for 45 minutes.

**Cherry Upside Down Cake**  
(Makes 9-inch round)  
1 1/2 cups well drained fresh, canned or frozen cherries  
1/4 cup light cream syrup  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup butter  
1/2 cup shortening  
1/2 cup white sugar  
1 egg, beaten  
1 cup sifted cake flour  
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 cup milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1/2 cup raisins, apricots, cinnamon and butter in saucepan and simmer 10 minutes. Cool. Pour into a well-buttered 9-inch round or square pan. Cream shortening, add sugar and egg and beat until fluffy. Sift together flour, baking powder and salt and add alternately to creamed mixture with milk mixed with vanilla. Pour over cherries. Bake for 25 to 30 minutes in a moderate (350° F.) oven.
