Hoover Revives the 'Great Debate'; Association Reports on Farm Labor

Military Training

IT'S a safe bet that congress will not legislate a universal military training program for 18-year-olds during the present session. Probably a "standby" law for future emergencies will be enacted-but that's all.

The proposed UMT bill now before congress would provide for 18 months of service including six months of basic training, for all 18-year-old youths in peacetime after the present selective service law has expired.

However, the Georgia congressman pulled the rug out from under the scheme when he couldn't get a single solid backer among his Democratic and Republican colleagues.

Eisenhower Smeared The smear which President Truman predicted for his friend Dwight Eisenhower has already started—in Maine and California.

Here are some typical smears: "The Communist party did not officially support Eisenhower for the presidency, but gave him a great ovation and boost."

"The Soviet gangsters decorated Eisenhower with the Order of the Suvorov which is given to those who serve the Soviet cause. What service did Eisenhower perform to warrant this great honor?"

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Later Maline's Sen. Owen Brewster, a member of the Taft inner circle, got hold of the above smear sheet and refused to have it circulated in Maine.

Brain Disappears Next scandal to explode into headlines will result from a leaner commodity office report trying to trace \$3,800,000 worth of government grain that has mysteriously vanished from southwestern storage bins.

So far the investigators report: 1. Warehousemen have been peddling the taxpayers' grain for their own private profit.

"From our examination to date," the report declares, "it appears obvious that a conservative estimate of shortages in grain alone, would exceed \$3,800,000."

Forced Action

Though "shortages" were known to have existed in early 1951, the report complains that "action in regard to the known irregularities has had to be literally forced on the commodity office."

GREAT DEBATE

Ex-President Herbert Hoover, in a major radio and television revival of the "great debate," and possibly an important issue in the 1952 presidential campaign.

Hoover's last major speech was December 20, 1950. In it he criticized the administration's foreign policy and the handling of the Far East conflict.

FARM WASTE—The National Planning Association, a nonprofit, non-political organization of leaders in industry, agriculture, labor and the professions, reports the productive effort of 2,000,000 farm families in the nation is being wasted.

CRISIS AHEAD—In a report on the government's year-end effort to hold prices and wages in line, government officials report moderate success, but warn of a crisis ahead.

UMT FIGHT—One of the final fights shaping up in the present Congress is universal military training. Congress has approved UMT in principle, but has not authorized machinery to set it into operation.

ASIA—There seemed to be a general feeling in Washington and Korea that trade talks between the Communists and United Nations forces would be held in the near future.

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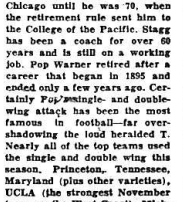

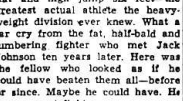

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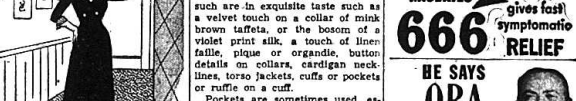
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Car Comfort Is Aim of Americans

Higher Production Is Goal of U.S. Farmers

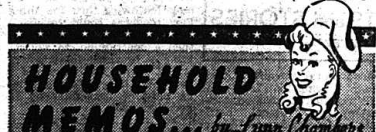

ROCKCASTLE FACTS and STORIES

During the days of early basketball in Mt. Vernon there was one virtue which had to develop from scratch, and that was sportsmanship. Such is not a natural characteristic of mankind as can easily be proven by observing one's own small children at play. The early Greeks knew the meaning of the term and the knights of Medieval England called it chivalry; it remained for modern sports to develop the conception to its present standard. Maybe, in the light of recent revelations, it would be better to speak of the standards which are supposed to exist.

Be that as it may, Professor Houston introduced our school to the meaning of the term and Professor Irvine developed it thru the medium of basketball. In recent years many boys graduate from the local High School without ever having indulged in a fight; maybe they still happen upon the school grounds occasionally but it has been years since we have seen an old-fashioned slug fest.

In earlier school days it was a rare week when your average lad didn't bring home at least one black eye. A fight was the accepted method of deciding all differences of opinion. Boys fought over their marble games, they fought over balls, tops and girls. They fought because they didn't like the color of the other fellow's cap or the cut of his britches. If they just absolutely couldn't find an excuse for a fight, they fought anyway.

When a fight started a ring of interested spectators formed

to lend moral support to their chosen champion. Like the chain reaction of an atomic explosion, the original battle could be depended upon to start a dozen more.

When practice basketball games began these primitive instincts were still in full flower. If a fellow guarded you too closely and prevented a goal shot, you slugged him. When the opportunity presented you tripped him, or gave him a knee or an elbow when it would do the most good. Such practices brought on more fights. Professor Irvine refereed the games and he refereed the fights when they couldn't be stopped, but all the time he preached sportsmanship.

Eventually the man's lectures began to have effect. There was no revolutionary overnight change, of course; there were dirty player or boys with uncontrollable tempers upon every team of the day, but they came to be in the minority. If memory serves correctly, Mt. Vernon teams always played pretty clean ball, although there were several who never succeeded in bringing their tempers under control.

There comes to mind one boy in particular who played upon one of the early teams and whose name has not been previously mentioned. This chap was a good fellow and an excellent player, but he seldom got thru a game without being benched for slugging an opposing player. He always swore that he didn't mean to and that he wasn't even conscious of hitting the blow. He was continually finding himself benched, nursing a skinned knuckle and wondering what happened.

Back to our first team, there were several scheduled games with Brodhead in the beginning season. The trip to this neighboring town was made by a horse-drawn hack, which belonged to Mr. Gene Brown, the livery man. This conveyance was so primitive to an extreme, being a covered spring wagon

with slightly padded seats running lengthwise thru the thing. Moderns could survive a trip to Brodhead and back in such a contraption, to say nothing of breaking the trip with a ball game. Our boys did it and lived, but you can still tell an old-time hack-rider by his peculiar walk.

The train schedule was such that Brodhead could come to Mt. Vernon and return by rail. Giving them credit for being intelligent beings, it is presumed that this is the way they usually came. This gave them the advantage of being in better physical condition for the game, as well as being able to bring more "rooters" to cheer them on. Are they still called "rooters"? Anyway, that is what they used to be called. Brodhead was always short of this commodity, since the hack would only seat about a dozen.

As of today, the early games with Brodhead were hard-fought, with possibly more school-pride than was necessary being evidenced by both sides. As of now, it was a nip-and-tuck proposition, thruout earlier years, with first one team on top and then the other. When either team lost it was customary to place the blame upon the referee. This last, of course, was a peculiarity of that day and age.
