THE CORNERSTONE of the cap-itol was laid September 18, 1793. The north wing of the old building, con-taining the senate chamber, now known as the old Supreme Court known as the old Supreme Court room, was constructed between 1783 and 1800. The senate chamber was ready for occupancy for the second session of the sixth congress which met November 17, 1800. The south wing, containing the house chamber, now known as Statuary Hall, was constructed between 180 and dust session of the such constructed session of the tenth congress Octo-ber 20, 1807.
