Jean King had been a smash hit over Dayton's WING for two years as the purveyor of a frank- ly sentimental style designed to appeal to lonesome listeners. She acquired a large listening audi- ence with a honey-voiced ap- proach that goes something like this:

"Hi, baby. This is your Lone- some Gal who loves you better than anyone else in the whole world... Gee, I missed you over the weekend..."

But after two years in the east, Jean's sinuses were taking a beating from the weather and she packed up and headed for Holly- wood. Although stations there were skeptical about her possi- bilities, she "packaged" her shows by tape recording for sub- scribing sponsors and then put it on KRLD, Los Angeles. It was then heard on four stations and grossed \$185 a week. Today, it has more than 50 outlets in major cities in the U.S. and Canada and stands to gross a cool \$150,000 to \$200,000 in 1951!

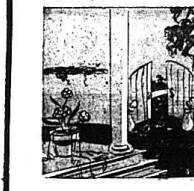

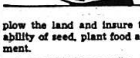


Taft Strength Falls

IMPARTIAL GOP observers, who watched the jockeying of Taft and Eisenhower forces at the San Francisco Republican strategy meeting, came to the conclusion that Taft lost ground. There were three reasons for their conclusion: 1. Taft did not show up to greet the politicians. The senator had come tired at Chairman Guy Gabrielson for opening up the conference to all candidates; so ended up by giving the gathering the cold shoulder. If he had attended, shaken hands, slapped a few backs, been one of the crowd he might almost have sewed up the nomination.

Liberty Gardens Vital to Defense

The Department of Agriculture has approved a plan of the National Garden and Food Preservation Committee for a national Liberty Garden campaign in 1952. The general plan is to encourage the cultivation of home gardens as insurance against shortages, to relieve transportation facilities, enable labor force production, and maintain health and moral values. On the local level the all-out program provides for using all available space to produce the whole population to the need for gardens. Teach novices how to make gardens, make suitable land available in city, town and suburban areas.



During the San Francisco meeting it was also noted about that Taft had reached his high point and that the slide downward has definitely begun. Others counter that the Eisenhower forces are poorly organized and it will take a lot of fumbles on Taft's part to lose.

Military Waste

The full scandal hasn't been told, but three U.S. air bases in French Morocco have suddenly been abandoned in the middle of construction. Over one million dollars had already been spent on the three bases—when suddenly the Pentagon changed its mind and decided not to build them.

Stalin Gets Discouraged

If we set metacouraged over government waste and efficiency here at home, it might pay to look at an official report from Moscow, that Marshal Stalin has severely criticized Russian shipyards in the Baltic to find out what's holding up his plan to build a powerful fleet of super-battleships. American observers report that Stalin was furious at the excuses his admirals gave for not giving for Russia's failure to turn out a single new battleship since 1933.

Well-Suited Congressman

Some strange things have gone on in the offices of congressman. There was the late senator from Florida, Park Trammell, who slept in his office, never rented a hotel or apartment in Washington. Then there was his opposite number from New York, Charles Buckley, who became known as the "phantom congressman," because he was rarely in his office, or, for that matter, in Washington. Buckley is still in congress, but his attendance record is much better since he became chairman of the public works committee.

Other congressmen have used their offices, furnished free by the taxpayers for the congressional seasonal employees or as propaganda mills for lobbies, while, during prohibition, several house members were accused of boot-legging. However, Congressman Pat Sutton of Tennessee has come up with a brand new idea. Sutton has made a profitable sideline of selling men's suits in his capitol hill sanctum. The Tennessee suits were sold to his father-in-law, who has a store in Lawrenceburg, Tenn.

Attorney General McGrath has held one single press conference since he took office. Many editors wonder why he isn't willing to answer questions like other officials.

The warnings were given, the minister said, in retaliation against his recent sermon denouncing alleged organized gambling operations in this city and implying that such operations existed because of graft in official circles.

German Youth Groups Warn of Militarism

HANNOVER, Germany.—A resolution warning against the revival of militarist and nationalist tendencies in Germany was adopted here by the Bundestagung (Federal Youth League) in which Protestant and Roman Catholic youth groups are represented. The resolution voiced "increasing concern" over the growing number of veterans' organizations, which "constitute a grave danger to the democratic order."

We don't want to be late in buying these things for the spring picking nor do we want to be late in getting plants to set this spring. Strawberry plants should be set between March 15 and April 15.

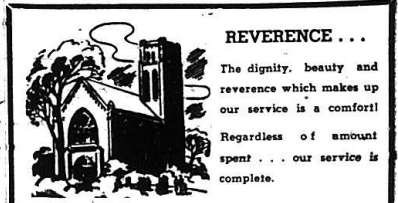
