RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Here is a dish which will have the family asking for more. Much of the preparation may be made long in advance, the pineapple being added before the final heating, suggests Mrs. Fear Haak, food specialist at the University of Kentucky.
HAWAIIAN PORK SKILLET
1 pound cubed pork shoulder
2 tablespoons chopped onion
1 1/2 cups water
1 cup sliced carrots
4 ounces broad noodles
2 tablespoons cornstarch
2 tablespoons brown sugar
1 tablespoon salt
1/2 cup pineapple juice
1/4 cup lemon juice
2 teaspoons soy sauce
1 cup diced pineapple
Brown pork in heavy skillet. Add onion and brown lightly. Pour off any excess fat. Add water to meat and onions. Bring to boil and add carrots. Cover and simmer gently 30 minutes. Cook noodles in boiling water until tender (about 6 minutes). Drain and rinse. While noodles are cooking, combine cornstarch, brown sugar and salt. Stir in pineapple juice and soy sauce. Gradually add meat and continue cooking until smooth and thickened. Fold in noodles and pineapple. Heat thoroughly. Makes 4 servings.

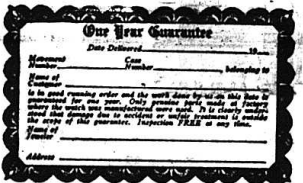

Build Bigger Crop Yields for Defense Program. By Using More Plant Food, Brannan Urges

SECRETARY of Agriculture Brannan's recent statement that fertilizer is one of the most vital tools for boosting crop production to meet America's emergency food and fiber needs, was cited by the Middle West Soil Improvement Committee as a reason why farmers should give plant food a top listing in any soil management program.

Mr. Brannan pointed out that the threatening international situation and our own mobilization program have created a new and sudden demand for a greatly increased farm output. This new demand, he said, comes at a time when farm production is already at a high level and virtually every acre is under production.

The application of increased quantities of fertilizer, he said, is the farming practice which provides one of the biggest opportunities for increasing all agricultural production in behalf of the defense efforts.

"Although the total acreage of cropland was not increased significantly during the past 30 years," he added, "farmers found several ways of increasing production to keep pace with our growing population. Mainly this was done through mechanization, improved crop varieties, better pest control, fertilization and improved cultural practices."

County Farmers Build Bridge Across Clear Creek

The farmers also had two long pieces of steel railroad ties which reached clear across the creek. These served as supports for the other logs. The abutments were built of solid white oak. Within a short time the bridge was built and today is ready and safe for all kinds of traffic. Some of the farmers not only donated their time and skill but also donated money and lumber. Other expenses are being covered by the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court. It is really amazing what a community can do when it is united.

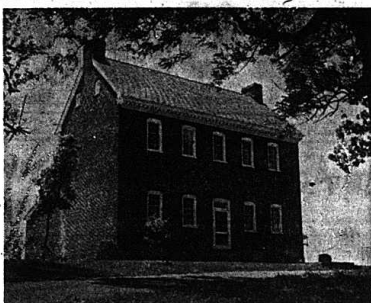

"I REMEMBER" BY THE OLD TIMERS

From Newt Hatter, Pigeasville, Mo. My mother about September would get ready to weave cloth. First she would card and spin the yarn on a big spinning wheel, then gather walnut hulls and sage grass, etc., to dye the yarn. Then she would weave out a hundred yards of linen cloth from which she made blankets. Then she would put in another warp of a hundred yards for jeans.

From Mrs. David McKullen, Bessemer, N.J. I used to watch the farmer make sorghum molasses. A man would feed the cane into three round cylinders, turned by a long pole, propelled by a mule, and the juices would come out of a spout into a bucket. The juice was put in a long vat to cook. It cooked a long time, and sometimes I'd go down to the vat after some molasses for taffy.

From George H. Briggs, Los Angeles: As a small boy I hung round the harness shop of an uncle much admired. Each autumn he would bring in great rolls of buffalo hides. The farm people would buy these for use in the winter as robes, rugs or material for coats.

From Clarence Coleman, Louisville, Ky.: Well do I remember back in the Gay Nineties when as a young sprout of from 12 to 15 years, I made my big money selling May apple root, for which I usually received in the neighborhood of a penny a pound.

From the Old Cox, Chicago: I remember when the nickelodeon was a national institution and a stringer known as the Flatbush Bruisers, "the gal with the tassel on the tassel," who made popular the song, "The Pitcher of Beer." If you remember these, my hearties, you are no younger than I!

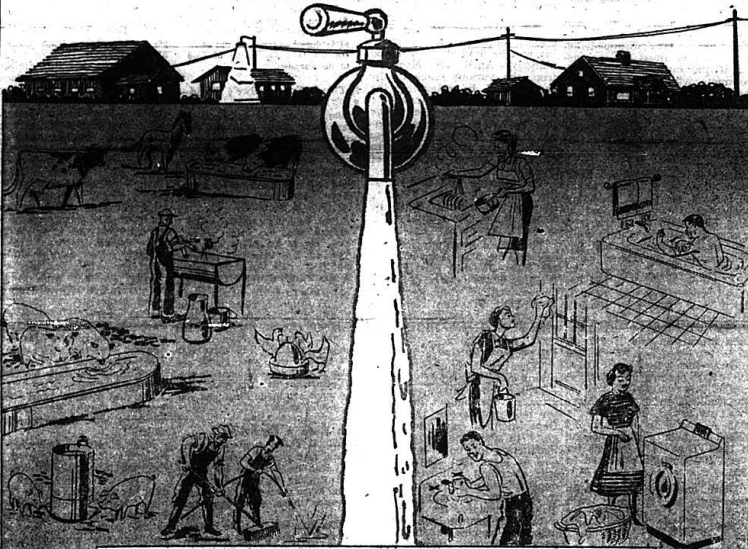

On Kentucky Farms

The goal for the tame hay is 60 million acres, the same as harvested in 1951. This acreage should produce about 93 million tons. Production at these levels will meet requirements in 1952-53 and maintain adequate carry over stocks.

Effort should be made to increase yields and quality of all tame hay and pasture. Practices to get increased yields include use of improved varieties of grasses and legumes, use of adequate amounts of fertilizer, and improved cultural and harvesting methods.

Because of short feed supplies, farmers should extend their supply of feed grains and hay by making larger use of straw, fodd'r, crop residues, and other normally waste-routhages.

Consult local agricultural authorities for methods of increasing yields and quality of hay and pasture.

Blame for Erosion Rests on Poor Soil Management Methods

The blame for soil erosion usually rests on poor soil management rather than on washing of the land, declared Dr. L. D. Baver, formerly with the Ohio State Agronomy Department.

"When we ask the question, 'How serious is soil erosion?' he said, 'we probably have phrased the question wrongly. A better question would be 'How serious is poor soil management?'"

Poor soil management, he said, affects more people than soil erosion. "Good soil management," he said, "is well as rolling and hilly areas. Good soil management on the rolling lands includes more than erosion control."

"Good soil management," he said, "is closely allied to good farm management. You do not put grass on a

hillsides just to control erosion? You make the countryside look green. Grass is planted there to make feed for a cow that will produce milk that will help rear a better boy or girl."

He pointed out that good soil management on restore exhausted land to profitable crop production. He cited tests at the Ohio Agricultural Experiment station at Wooster, where six inches of surface soil was removed from impoverished land. By good soil management, the sub-soil's fertility level was brought above the average for Ohio. At Raleigh, N. C., where he formerly was dean of the agricultural college, land that could produce only 10 bushels of corn per acre was changed into pasture. The soil was limed and fertilized with phosphate and potash. Now it grows grass pastures yields digestible nutrients equivalent to 25 bushels of corn per acre.
