**TO PICK OUT quality celery,**  
 select stalks of medium length and thick stems free from damage. The exterior should be smooth with dark green leaves. Limp or stringy stalks with dry brown tops should be avoided.

**Good cauliflower has a creamy white color.** It's clean, feels heavy and is firm. Outer leaves should be fresh and green. Avoid those with dark spots or yellowed leaves as this indicates age.


Fresh fine cabbage has no discolored veins, and is well trimmed. It is to test for heaviness. It should feel heavier than it looks. Cracked or water-soaked carrots will not give you the most for your money; neither will those which have green on top of the carrot. The color should be a bright, fresh orange and the skin smooth, firm and clean.

**RECIPE OF THE WEEK**  
 Toasted Flat Cookies (Makes 3 dozen)  
 1/2 cup shortening  
 1/2 cup granulated sugar  
 1 cup brown sugar, firmly packed  
 2 eggs, unbeaten  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 1 cup shredded vanilla  
 1 cup sifted flour  
 1/2 teaspoon soda  
 1 cup rolled coconut, toasted  
 1 cup sliced oats, toasted  
 Combine shortening, sugars, eggs, salt and vanilla and beat thoroughly. Sift flour and soda together; add to first mixture with coconut and oats; blend together thoroughly. Drop level tablespoonfuls on greased baking sheets. Bake in a moderate oven for 10 to 15 minutes.

If fresh mushrooms are exposed too long to strong light, they will lose weight and wither. Brown mushrooms are more flavorful than white ones.

Green onions at their best are tender and crisp with fresh green tops. Avoid those with damaged tops or necks as these indicate age. There are many different kinds ofokra. Some are two inches long while others are four. Some are green, others are whitish green. Some are smooth, others are grooved. All should have fresh pods that snap easily.

### Rockcastle Farm Service will cater to farmers' needs in seeds, feeds, fertilizers and other accessories.

Bill Norton and Wayne Stewart will open a new Southern Co-Op which they are naming the Rockcastle Farm Service. It is located on Williams Street, just off West Main some distance to the rear of Chaney's Grocery. The opening day of the store will be on Saturday July 12th. The building is newly constructed and is 32x60 feet, built of cement blocks with a blue asphalt roof. Mr. Norman Whitaker, a young man who was a junior year in high school, then got married, is to be the manager of the store.

Both Mr. Stewart and Mr. Norton are connected with the Mount Vernon high school as teachers in the department of vocational agriculture. Mr. Stewart is the head of the department and has served in that capacity for the past five and one half years. He is a graduate of the Mt. Vernon high school later entered Berea College where his studies were interrupted for thirty-one months due to military service. He was a staff sergeant in the air corps. Mr. Stewart returned to Berea after the war and received his degree of B. S. in 1930. Wayne was a very active member in 4-H Club work. 
