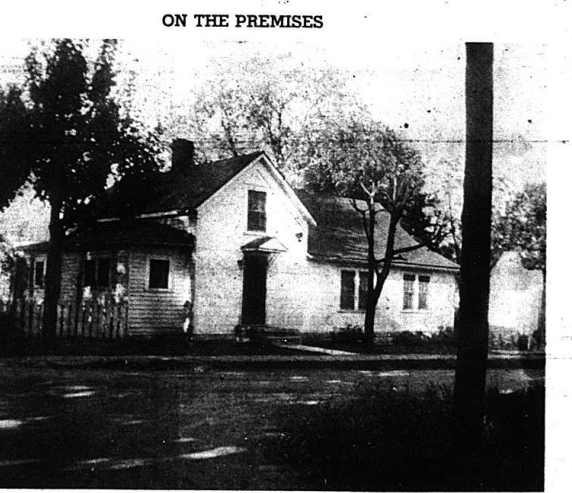

ICE cube trays should always be washed, after defrosting, with warm soapy or detergent suds. Rinse them thoroughly before refilling with clean water. Accumulations of dirt and slime frequently clog the drain pipe in refrigerators. Remove the pipe and clean with a tablespoon of borax or baking soda a pint of water. Baking soda dissolved over the ice, in ice refrigerators, keeps the drain pipe sweet and clean.

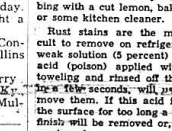

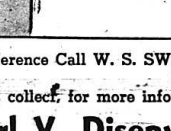

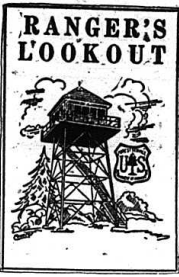

Through Editor Schumacher's interest in conservation and desire to keep the public informed it will be possible for us to report to you things of interest that happen on and to your National Forest. Particularly those happenings of interest on the Rockcastle Ranger District.

The Rockcastle District is one of six that make up the Cumberland National Forests which is entirely within the State of Kentucky.

Today there are 152 National Forests in the United States. Did you know it all the National Forest land was divided among the people in the United States each person would have a piece of forest land the size of a football field? This forest land of yours is managed on the following policy: "The Greatest Amount of Good to the Largest Number of People in the Long Run." To understand the organization better you should know that the National Forests are managed by the United States Forest Service. The Forest Service is a Bureau in the Department of Agriculture. Each forest is under the direct supervision of a supervisor. Mr. H. L. Borden is Forest Supervisor of the Cumberland Forest with headquarters at Winchester, Kentucky. Each Forest District is managed by a Ranger and one or two assistants. The Rockcastle Ranger District is managed by Ranger S. G. "Spud" Hile with Paul Gilreath and Paul "Red" Sampner as assistants. The district headquarters at Berea is responsible for 68,647 acres of National Forest land.

Probably the most important job of forest management is keeping fire out of the forest. A forest fire must be seen and action taken to put it out before it is small or a serious loss of timber, homes and possibly lives might develop.

To keep fire out of the National Forest it is necessary to protect another 90,000 acres of privately owned land within and surrounding the forest. This protection covers land located in Rockcastle, Estill, Lee, Owsley and Jackson Counties. The man who sees the fire first is the lookout. He is in the fire lookout tower every day that the forest will burn. Every smoke that rises, he must decide whether it is a forest fire, tobacco bed, rubbish or sedge field burning.

These lookouts must know where everyone lives, each road, stream and hollow location are: Luther Vanzant in New Hope tower in Rockcastle county; Frank Roberts at S-Tree tower in Jackson County; Stanley "Tad" Fields at Old Orchard Tower in Lee County. The Drip Rock tower in Estill county will have a new lookout this fall.

All of these towers and the Forest Fire Wardens are connected to a National Forest operated telephone system with a switchboard and dispatching headquarters at McKee. Switchboard operator, Mrs. Winnie Moran is the lady who gets the district organization jumping when a forest fire is reported. More about the operation of your National Forest will be reported at another time.

Lookout Frank Roberts was to tough to let a serious illness get him down for keeps. He will be back on S-Tree tower this fall.

Lookout Tad Fields used up eight of his nine lives when faulty brakes caused his car to crash over an eighteen foot bank. His car was a total wreck and Tad is still here to tell the story. Someone told Tad the Lord must have been with him

Tad said, "I really didn't have time to find out, but if he was he really travelling."

Forest Fire protection and Management on the Rockcastle District could not be handled efficiently without a good telephone system for communication. Today there is approximately 170 miles of telephone lines throughout the District. From the District central switchboard at McKee these lines reach out to Fire Towers and Fire Warden's homes. In emergencies it is possible for folks living nearby, to call a doctor or other assistance. This telephone system in the past has been instrumental in saving a life where an accident or serious illness has happened. This spider web of lines has the habit of getting out of order. Paul Gilreath is the doctor that cures the District telephone ailments.

The recently organized Cooperate Rural Telephone Cooperative is building exchanges and lines throughout this area. They will be taking over many miles of Forest Service lines and make telephone service possible for the first time, to a great many people. Other than feeder lines the Forest Service will be going out of the telephone business when the Cooperative starts operation.

Since October 5 to 11 is National Fire Prevention Week it might be well to review one of the Kentucky Forest Fire Laws. 149.300—Fires not to be set near woodland or brushland during certain hours: Exception—During the months of

March, April, May, October, November and December even though precautions required in KRS 149.290 shall have been taken it shall be unlawful for any person to set fire to, or procure another to set fire to any brush, leaves, grass debris or field containing dry grass or other inflammable material, capable of spreading fire, located in or within two hundred feet of any woodland or brushland except between the hours of 4:30 P. M. and 12 o'clock midnight, or when the ground is covered with snow. The fall forest fire season is here. Help Keep Kentucky Green!

CHIEF OF ARMY ORDNANCES VISITS BLUE GRASS ORDNANCE

Maj. Gen. E. L. Ford, Chief of Army Ordnance Corps, and Brig. Gen. John H. Hinrichs, Chief of Field Service Division, Office, Chief of Ordnance, visited and inspected the Blue Grass Ordnance Depot, Sept. 30th, and October 1st. This was the first time that the Chief of Ordnance has ever visited the depot since its origin more than ten years ago. The generals arrived at Blue Grass Field in Lexington at 1:45 P. M. (CST) September 30th, on Eastern Airlines Flight No. 453 from Washington. The visiting parties were available for a short news conference immediately after their arrival in the airport restaurant. The generals were met at the airport by the newly assigned

commanding officer of Blue Grass Ordnance Depot, Col. Ray O. Welch. He was accompanied by members of his military and public information staff.

The generals viewed operations at the depot Tuesday afternoon and before their departure Wednesday. Pertinent Information Concerning Chief of Ordnance. The present international crisis has ballooned the operations of the Army Ordnance Corps into one of the biggest businesses in the world. Maintaining the flow of Ordnance material from the development state through to the point of issue to our Army, our Air Force, our Marine Corps and in some measure to our Allies overseas, presents problems so complex as to stagger the imagination.

The job of Army Ordnance, the Chief of Ordnance administers and controls is of great magnitude. Included in the assignment is to develop, manufacture, procure, store, issue and maintain the infinite variety of weapons, ammunition, vehicles and all related equipment for these Armed Forces. Pertinent Information Concerning Chief of Field Service Division. In supporting the work of the Chief of Ordnance, the Chief of the Field Service Division administers and directs the operations of more than one hundred field establishments—arsenals, depots, districts and industrial plants—which employ an aggregate of approximately one hundred and sixty thousand persons.

Actual operations are fully

decentralized to the field, and the departmental overhead, in Washington, is the lowest of any of the technical services—slightly over one percent of

total Army Ordnance strength. The average annual quill in Kentucky is over three million birds.

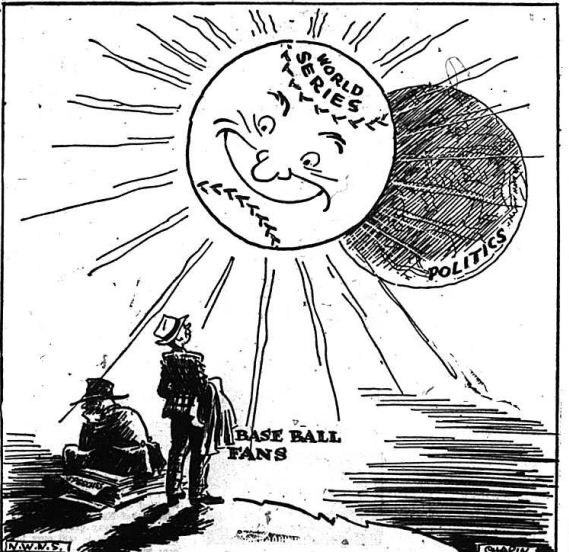
